2. HAP Shared Services

- Limerick City and County Council operates the Housing Assistance Payment Shared Services Centre (HAP SSC) on behalf of 31 Local Authorities and the Dublin Regional Homeless Executive.
- Overall a total of 26,863 HAP tenancies have been set-up since project commencement in 2014. There are currently 23,843 active HAP tenancies.
- This year to date 8,633 HAP tenancies have been set-up, at an average of 332 per week.



- The HAP SSC will handle circa €230m in financial transactions in 2017, rising to over €600m in 2021, involving at that stage, 84,000 tenancies.
- There are currently 44 people employed in the HAP SSC with new colleagues joining us in the coming weeks.
- Redevelopment work in the HAP SSC offices on two floors of the Granary Building in Michael Street, Limerick completed in June, 2017.

3. Social Development

Local Community Development Committee

- The Local Community Development Committee (LCDC) met in June and received a presentation on the Age Friendly Initiative and a presentation on the work of Children and Young People's Services Committee (CPYSC).
- The LCDC received an update on Healthy Limerick and it was outlined that a funding announcement is expected in the region of €100,000 per county to deliver on Healthy Ireland targets.
- The Community Enterprise Sub Group has met once and has examined membership, terms of reference and the definition of social enterprise.

Healthy Limerick

- Four presentations were given to Council staff and University of Limerick Hospital's Group, Healthy Ireland Steering Group.
- Linked with the Health Service Executive with a proposed action around health literacy with the Right to Read programme coordinator in the Library services.

Community Leisure & Emergency Services Strategic Policy Committee (SPC)

The Community, Leisure & Emergency Services Strategic Policy Committee was held on 21st June. The following presentations were given at the meeting:

- Creative Ireland Limerick Cultural Plan by Sheila Deegan, Arts Officer.
- EVA establishment, funding and events by Matt Packer, Director of EVA International.

Suicide Prevention Strategy Group

A meeting of the Suicide Prevention Strategy Group was held on 21st June. A presentation was given by Mr. Gerry Linnane, Project Manager and Ms. Tanya O'Sullivan, Youth and Community Worker, Jigsaw on their new headquarters, which opened in Arthur's Quay on 19th June. They outlined the services that Jigsaw provides to the young people (age 12-25), who live, work and/ or attend school or college in the area

Africa Day 2017

On 19th June Limerick City and County Council held a recognition event for the volunteers of Africa Day 2017. Seventeen members were issued a certificate, presented by the Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Kieran O'Hanlon.

Pride Of Place

The following entries have been chosen to represent Limerick in the Irish Public Bodies (IPB) Pride of Place Competition for 2017:

Limerick Sports Partnership (LSP)

- Anna Grant has been appointed the Beat the Street facilitator. Beat the Street is a physical activity event that encourages schools, communities and workplaces to increase their physical activity levels through walking, jogging, cycling, skateboarding and rollerblading. The facilitator will work with schools and communities to ensure there is a legacy of increased physical activity.
- In June, the LSP delivered its Fitkidz Walking programme for 10 primary schools with 1,921 kids logging their walks over a five day period.
- The Limerick Go for Life team of 15 Older Adults went to Dublin for the National Finals and returned home victorious after winning the competition.
- The LSP linked with Smarter Travel to deliver a week of cycling activities for Bike Week 2017 involving over 1,000 participants:



- Family Day Cycle on the New Cycle lanes from City Centre to UL.
- Early morning Solstice Cycle to Lough Gur.
- Teens in the Wild Mountain Biking sessions in Ballyhoura for Limerick Youth Service and Foroige.
- Inclusive Cycling with Brothers of Charity.
- Couch to 30k five week programme in Partnership with Team Sophie Mul Cycling Club.
- Women on Wheels cycling programme and Tour de Burren 50 and 100k cycles.
- Bike Maintenance and workshops.
- All LSP community health and fitness programmes are up and running across the country i.e. Move and Lose, New Year New Start, Older Adult Fitness programmes at 7 Hubs, Men on the Move @ 4 sites, Women on Wheels, Sportshall Athletics, Community Walking, Desk to 5k and for more info email: info@limericksports.ie
- 4. Customer Services
- For the month of June, the Customer Services
 Department supported the Council in delivering
 services and supporting citizens, customers,
 councillors, communities and businesses who
 lodged 2,206 requests for service (cases).
- The customer footfall through Reception and Customer Services in Dooradoyle and Merchants Quay in June was 3,869.
- Customer Services (CS) was also involved with training other departments on SugarCRM, some of these departments included: Corporate Services; the Homeless Action Team; Social Development; Design and Delivery and Economic Development.

- Customer Services conducts an online satisfaction survey on a monthly basis with our customers.
 The responses are very valuable as they empower the citizen to recommend changes and give their opinions on services the Council provides. The following are some survey responses received from our customers during the month:

5. Library Services

- The Granary's, "Rock Record Round Table" met on 9th June and was delighted to welcome special guest, D.J. Nicky Woulfe, who has been a collector of music and music memorabilia all his life. He has been part of the entertainment scene in Limerick for over 40 years.
- To celebrate Bike Week, Green Schools Travel and the Limerick Smarter Travel School Project ran a Miniature Bicycle Competition where students from across the city were invited to make their own miniature bicycle out of recycled material. The competition generated a huge response with over 50 entries from schools throughout the city. Entries from the competition formed part of an exhibition which was displayed in the Granary Library.
- On the 15th June The Granary Library invited pupils, parents and teachers from St. John's National School to visit the library where they were entertained and encouraged to join the library and avail of the wide range of free services.
- School tours are a feature of June for schools and Dooradoyle Library hosted groups from Murroe and Knockainey National Schools. Story time, treasure hunts, word searches, crosswords and nursery rhymes were enjoyed by the pupils.
- Artist Gemma Lawlor exhibited her work early in the month and Multiple Sclerosis Ireland (Limerick Branch) launched an exhibition of their art work, with the official opening on 29th June.
- On 22nd June Dooradoyle Library took centre stage in the Crescent Shopping Centre to promote library services to the general public. The Summer Stars Reading Adventure for children and other



services such as free online magazines, e-books, training courses and newspapers were brought to the attention of shoppers. It is hoped to make this an annual event to bring the libraries to the attention of those who are not aware of the many services provided.

- The "Summer Stars" free reading club for children was launched in branches before schools finished for the summer. Best-selling author Roisin Meaney, did the honours in Kilmallock Library with the help of children from Scoil Mocheallog.
- During the month of June, Newcastle West Library hosted an art exhibition entitled "No Limits", created by Shanagolden vocational Training Opportunities Scheme. This year's exhibition displayed the work completed by first and second year adult learners, as part of the QQI level 5 painting class. Eimear Brophy, Adult Education Officer with Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board (LCETB) opened the exhibition. The library was delighted to be involved with "Second Chance Education" surrounded by first class artwork with "No Limits" to what can be achieved.

6. Limerick Arts Office

- The Cross Party Culture and Arts Working Group put in place by the elected members is in the process of finalising a report of recommendations to bring to the full Council meeting.
- Limerick Arts Office is working strategically with the County Limerick Youth Theatre and Youth Theatre Ireland on developing a sustainable model with stakeholders to enable the leveraging of investment for the County Limerick Youth Theatre into the future. A first draft memorandum of understanding has been circulated and discussed. The County Limerick Youth Theatre is part of the Limerick Arts Office Youth Arts Programme. Youth is a focus area of the Arts Council, Creative Ireland and of the Limerick Cultural Strategy Framework.
- The Arts Council/Communications Media Management Association (CMMA) agreement, A Framework for Collaboration (2016-2025) has a three year work plan (2016-2018) with the commitment that in 2017 the Arts Council will enter into a process of developing an individual Framework Agreement with each local authority. Limerick Arts Office responded to the expression of interest call to be included in the first phase of these framework agreements.

- In association with Words Ireland, a collective of seven Irish literature organisations have come together to create a National Mentoring Programme to provide paying work for professional mentors and support the development for emerging writers. Eleven literature mentoring relationships will be offered in Ireland, one in Limerick via the support of Limerick Arts Office.
- The Culture and Creativity Plan for Limerick as part of Creative Ireland was presented to the Community, Leisure and Emergency Services Strategic Policy Committee and unanimously agreed.

7. Limerick City Gallery of Art (LCGA)

- Senator Marie-Louise O'Donnell launched her report on Death and Bereavement at Limerick City Gallery of Art on 8th June. The launch was a part of an initiative held in conjunction with Caring Communities and included an exhibition of work by a local group who have focused on death and grief. The event was attended by over 200 people.
- The exhibitions, Reconstructing Memory by Clea van der Grijn and The Graeve Collection from The Model, Sligo, with a special selection of work from the Permanent Collection continued until 17th June.
- Preparatory work took place for the opening of two new exhibitions on 29th June. Artists, Ronnie Hughes, an Arts Council touring exhibition in conjunction with The Model, Sligo, and Chris Doris' works are presented on the upper and ground floor galleries.
- Local artist, Isabella Walsh, has an installation of her work in a gallery on the upper floor – this is part of a three year development of her work.
- An exhibition selected from the Permanent Collection is currently on display. The works selected are aimed at visitors to and from Limerick and aims to provide a gentle overview of the breadth of the collection with works by Yeats, Osborne and Henry included alongside Walter Verling.
- The Director/Curator selected work from the graduate show in Limerick School of Art and



Design (LSAD) for exhibition at the Limerick City Gallery of Art (LCGA) next year. The recipient of the LCGA award 2017 is Rachel Myles. This is the third student to have received this award, which aims to offer new graduates the opportunity to work in a professional context and to learn from the experience.

- Continued loan from the Permanent Collection to National Institutions such as the National Gallery of Ireland, The Hunt Museum, Waterford County Museum and Glebe House and Gallery in Donegal, with a total of 28 artworks out on temporary loan.
- Preparatory works continues with the Capital Works Programme with other departments within the Council.
- Total visitors to the Gallery of Art for June was 7,110.

8. Limerick Museum

- Limerick Museum has seen a dramatic increase in visitor numbers during its first full month opening in its new location at the Franciscan Friary. It received 1,738 visitors, which was a four-fold increase in monthly visitor numbers at its previous location.
- On 24th June 2017, the museum organised a Terry Wogan pop-up Museum as part of the festivities surrounding the unveiling of the Terry Wogan Memorial on Harvey's Quay. Members of the public with memories of Terry were invited to bring their memorabilia to the stand along the boardwalk. Fans from Ireland and Britain shared their photos, letters, souvenirs, family stories and other memorabilia relating to the beloved broadcaster.
- A number of donations have been received, including a Terry Wogan fan club pin and badge; a commemorative silver trowel used to lay the foundation stone of St. John's Church (now Dance Limerick) in St. John's Square and a First World War medal.

9. Planning and Environment

Litter/Waste Enforcement

- A total of 169 complaints were received in June.
- 23 on the spot litter fines were issued during the month.
- Legal proceedings were issued in two cases under the Litter Pollution Act.
- Legal proceedings were issued in three cases under the Waste Management Act.
- 17 warning letters were issued in relation to environmental issues.
- Three Statutory Notices were served under Section 18 of the Waste Management Act.
- Three Directions were served under the Waste Management Act.

Air Noise and Water Pollution

- 34 complaints were received in June.
- Two Statutory Notices were served under Section 12 of the Water Pollution Acts.
- One Certificate of Compliance was issued under Article 17 of the European Union (Paints, Varnishes, Vehicle Refinishing Products and Activities) Regulations, 2012.
- One warning letter was issued.

11. Public Interest Development Office

- Over 50 expressions of interest were received from community groups for the Town and Village Renewal Scheme 2017, which were shortlisted to 15 by a cross directorate team.
- 15 comprehensive Town and Village applications were submitted to Department of Arts, Heritage, Regional, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs along with two Arts Works applications.
- Two Living City Initiative clinics were held with the Living Cities Initiative Implementation team and two new applications received under the rented residential element of the scheme.
- A Riverway Design Crossing Enabling Review for Limerick, which was launched by the Netherlands Deputy Ambassador to Ireland, Thom Kulk, took place on 27th and 28th June. This included various statutory agencies involved in the river and was



preceded by a briefing session on 14th June. The review examined options for the Riverway project and will feed into recommendations for appropriate infrastructural provisions to capitalise on the potential of the River Shannon and to improve access and use of the river in the city. Engaged members of the public were invited to attend as well as a consultative group of elected members. As part of the review the Open Navigation Group hosted a flotilla of boats to provide river tours which ended at the Curragower boat club for refreshments.

14. Veterinary Services

- 12 stray or wandering horses were impounded.
- The Dog Control Unit dealt with 55 dogs.
- 12 food samples were submitted during June 2017 for analysis under the National Residues and Microbiological sampling programme.
- The Dog Licence Awareness Campaign continued to be implemented by the Dog Wardens.

13. Digital Strategy

- The Limerick Digital Strategy Roadmap was finalised on the 8th June. This road map lays out the portfolio of programmes and projects that will be delivered by the strategy stakeholders, some of who including the Council, University of Limerick, Limerick Institute of Technology, Health Service Executive.
- Geographical Place Names.ie Policy was developed that allows community groups to use their townland name as the domain name for their website. Recently Cappamore.ie was assigned to the Cappamore community.
- Limerick.ie now has over 400 customers using the personalised services offered by My Limerick with over 60 customers having access to the My Cases feature.

15. Local Enterprise Office

- Lean for Micro, a joint programme with The Local Enterprise Office Clare, commenced with 11 companies participating.
- Women in Business Network held a cluster event,
 35 attended and the topic was "The future is bright with Digital Marketing".
- A new "start your own business" six week course commenced in June while a similar course which started in May is ongoing. 29 people are participating on these courses.
- Four students from Ard Scoil Rís Secondary School, who won the Best Innovation award at the National Enterprise Awards, participated in a week long residential Enterprise Bootcamp in University College Cork and won first prize in the "Dragon's Den" style presentation at the end of the week.

16. Limerick Smarter Travel (LST)

Limerick Smarter Travel ran "BeSpoke" Limerick's cycling festival as part of National Bike Week 2017, which ran from 10th - 18th June. Smarter Travel working in partnership with An Garda Siochana, An Taisce, Limericks Sports Partnership and the Road Safety Authority promoted a week of fun and free cycling events in Limerick's communities, schools and workplaces.

 The highlight of the week was the LST run Family Bike Parade which travelled down the new LST revamped river pathway from O'Brien's Park to the University of Limerick.



- For the third year running individuals and groups from across the community had the opportunity to avail of funding and support from LST to help them run their very own cycling inspired event. Ten community events were run during National Bike Week. To look back on the fun @LKSmarterTravel #bikeweekie #BeSPOKE.
- Limerick Smarter Travel in conjunction with the Hub Bike shop organised the "Dawn Cycle". The cycle set off from outside Penny's O Connell St at 05.15am and proceeded out to Lough Gur for refreshments and a quick break before making the return journey. A large number of early morning cyclists enjoyed this event, with LST sponsoring the refreshments in Lough Gur.
- A number of limerick Smarter Travel schools participated in National Bike Week, with over 1,000 cycling trips taking place. The schools completed for the LST Golden and Silver Bike Awards which were presented to the School with the highest and second highest numbers of students cycling throughout the week. St Patrick's Girls N.S were the winners of the LST Golden Bike Award and St Brigid's won the Silver Bike Award. Merit certificates were awarded to Gaelscol Chaladh An Treoigh and Milford N.S for their work in promoting behavioural change.
- National Cycle to School day took place on the 14th June. Almost 500 students cycled to school on the day and LST provided goodie bags and cycling workshops as prizes.
- Cyclists were given a number of opportunities to get their bike in shape during National Bike Week with LST organising a number of free minor bike repair events in Mungret, Castletroy, Corbally, Bedford Row and the Parkway Shopping Centre.
- Sharing the road/cycle safety events were organised by LST staff in conjunction with An Garda Siochana.
- Limerick City and County Council as a Smarter
 Travel Workplace took part in a number of Bike
 Week events. A lunch time cycle along the canal
 was organised and Merchant's Quay staff took part
 in time trials on a seven seater conference bike.

17. Environmental Awareness

Team Limerick Cleanup 3 (TLC3) Waste Characterisation Results announced

- Litter collected during the 2017 TLC campaign was characterised for the first time.
- The study is in line with the National Waste Characterisation Study.
- The intention behind this is to gather information from clean ups to help inform policy locally & nationally.

- 10% soft plastic wrappings (packaging) was the most common material
- 9% clothes
- 8% PET plastic
- 7% Aluminium cans
- 5% paper/cardboard packaging
- < 2% single use paper based cups including coffee cups

5. Investment

- The financial services company Northern Trust announced 400 new jobs for Limerick, which will be phased in over the next five years. This marks the fourth time Northern Trust has significantly expanded its operations in Limerick.
- Music retailer Golden Discs opened its new store in the city centre. At least eight jobs are to be created as the record retailer opens its store on Cruises Street.

6. Innovate Limerick

Innovate Limerick is progressing plans to develop a Sports Hub which will be located at The Engine, Cecil Street. They are currently preparing a funding application for Enterprise Ireland's Regional Development Fund to establish a National Sports Hub in the region. This project is in line with the Mid West Action Plan for Jobs and this funding would position Limerick at the forefront of sports innovation and initiatives. This is a strategic initiative to developing Ireland's growing sports industry which will also provide a fast landing facility for international companies looking to scale into Europe and provide a location for the organic development of sports entrepreneurs and sport research. Innovate Limerick has engaged with Kernel Capital as a private equity partner for the project.



7. Communications and Marketing

- Promotional campaign undertaken in Boston as part of collaborative effort from Mid West delegation to highlight Limerick's attractions for investment, tourism, trade and education.
- Twelve week digital marketing campaign underway to promote Limerick as a destination for weekend breaks targeting different market segments over the summer months.
- Commissioned promotional images/media library of West Limerick.
- Produced 10,000 new Experience Limerick driving route maps.
- A total of five Limerick.ie e-newsletters issued throughout June.
- PR support for launch of new Newcastle West Food Tours.

8. Housing Capital and Regeneration

General Housing Programme (excluding Regeneration)

- The proposed housing project for Kilmurry Court (seven housing units), Garryowen, was granted Part 8 Planning Permission at the June Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick.
- Two new funding schemes to purchase or lease vacant housing units were advertised in local media recently in a bid to source additional housing in Limerick City and County. These schemes are:
 - New Repair and Leasing Scheme, which is suitable for Landlords who can access up to €40,000 to upgrade their property and offset the payment over their rental payment for a specific period of time.
 - Buy and Renew Scheme, which targets older property in need of large scale works.
- The Housing Delivery Programme was presented to the elected members at the Meeting of the Municipal District of Adare-Rathkeale on 13th June.
 - Further to the Social Development Directorate's current investigations regarding the sustainable development of lands within the Council's ownership in conjunction with Approved Housing Bodies (AHBs) and private developers to develop mixed tenure and sustainable communities. a workshop on Viability Assessments was held on 20th June. Jerry Barnes, Chartered Surveyor and Town Planner, presented on his experiences of preparing an economic and market viability assessment of the Clonburris Strategic Development Zone (SDZ) Planning Scheme. Clare Holohan-Lee, Senior Property Asset Manager, discussed the various structures available to public landowners to secure and control development on their lands, in addition to the principles of development viability, methods of assessment and examples of development appraisals. This is part of a process to maximise the use of publicly-owned land.
- Part V mechanism has taken place. Part V is an important source of local authority housing, and the transfer of these houses is welcome.



Regeneration Programme - Capital

- The Thermal Upgrade Programme continues across the four regeneration areas with construction works commencing in Moyross (101 houses) and Southill (39 houses), having received approval from the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government (DHPLG). Approval was also received from the DHPLG for 39 houses in Southill to proceed to Tender.
- Approval was received from the DHPLG to commence construction of St Mary's Park Infill Housing (19 houses).
- Construction of the €3 million Moyross Community Enterprise Centre has commenced. This project will provide enhanced community facilities in the heart of Moyross.

Regeneration Programme - Social

- Consultation on Cliona Park Development six meetings to date met over 152 residents.
- Hospitality Sector 76 people completed courses
 to date 51 have gained employment and seven have gone onto further education.
- 46 people on Community Employment Schemes.

9. Local Enterprise Office

- Micro Enterprise Grant aid of €258,750 approved in June 2017 bringing the total amount of grant aid approved to date in 2017 to €477,450 for 23 clients.
- Two applicants were approved for new Technical Assistance for Micro Export grant of €2,500 each to attend trade shows abroad.


