These easy to navigate tours will help you explore some of Limerick's inimitable culture, heritage and unique experiences and activities. The route is designed so that you can complete it in its entirety over 4 days or take it in smaller one day chunks.



OVERVIEW Limerick City **DURATION:** 3 – 4 days

Two to three nights in Limerick is ample time to explore some of the sights as set out in this guide. Accommodation in Limerick is plentiful, diverse and offers excellent hospitality and high standards.

Limerick is also the Gateway to the Wild Atlantic Way, so use it as a base for exploring Ireland's longest touring route While you're here, make sure to engage with Limerick's locals - there is a reason why we are known as Ireland's friendliest county!

1. LIMERICK CITY

Where better to begin your **Experience Limerick Tours,** than in its city centre. Limerick is an ideal city to explore on foot or by the city's very own **Limerick** Bike Scheme. Limerick City, one of the oldest cities in Europe, is a Viking city dating back to the 9th of historical and cultural treasures. are a testament to its dramatic and captivating past. Explore King's Island

the Medieval Quarter of Limerick and to bring your Limerick why not take a walking tour, a horse drawn carriage tour or perhaps a kayaking tour of the city to see Limerick's medieval gems from a completely different perspective. There is a mind boggling amount of history to absorb here, including the 13th Century King John's Castle. Imagine a Norman soldier's life in this ancient fortress and take in some of the very hest views of the city from its medieval turrets. **St. Mary's Cathedral** is the oldest building in Limerick still in daily use and if the walls could talk what a story they would tell! Immerse yourself in Limerick's fascinating history at the nearby Limerick City Museum and at the Hunt Museum which houses over 2,000 works of art and antiquity including pieces by Renoir and Picasso. A fascinating Museum dedicated to Frank McCourt's life is on Hartstonge Street.

2. EAST COUNTY LIMERICK AND THE GOLDEN VALE

Ireland's Ancient East is steeped in history, legend, heritage and folklore and there is a wealth of experiences iust waiting to be explored throughout Limerick. Tour 2 takes you to some of the county's many highlights within the historic heartland of the Ancient East. Begin13km north-east of the city on the N7 Limerick to Dublin Road, in the lovely village of Castleconnell. Visit the Irish Harp Centre or perhaps try a spot of angling. Take a walk by Worrell's End or World's End, the quay that was used during the Great Famine in the 1840's as an embarkation point for emigrants fleeing Ireland for the New World

From here, continue by car to the village of **Murroe** where you will find the magnificent Glenstal Abbey (note - private property, however, visitors are welcome to walk in the grounds and to visit the church). Close by is the Clare Glens - a peaceful. wooded, walkers paradise Enhance vour East Limerick experience even further and check out the electric bikes from Go-Eco bikes in

Travel back to the main N7 road toward the city and take the R512 heading in the direction of Kilmallock. The picturesque driving route you are embarking upon is known as the Golden Vale Drive, which will take you through some of the most lush, green and rolling pasturelands in Ireland Continuing through Ballyneety and on to **Lough Gur**, 20km south of the city centre, is one of Ireland's most important archaeological locations, with a number of sites and monuments ranging in date from Neolithic to Medieval times. At the lake, you'll see the Grange stone circle (the largest stone circle in Ireland)

Heritage Centre. For lunch consider stopping off in the charming town of **Bruff** or check out what it was like to live in the 1900's at **Old Irish Ways Musuem.** Continue on to picturesque Bruree, famous for being the place where former President of Ireland, Eamon de Valera grew up. Make sure to stop off in the bustling Walled Town of Kilmallock, Kilmallock, also

known as the crossroads of Munster.



is an important Norman town and was at the centre of Ireland's political development from the 13th through to the 17th centuries. Nearby Kilmallock are the impressive villages and towns of Kilfinane, Ballylanders, Galbally, Emly and Pallasgreen

It is no secret that this whole area is steeped in history but it is also a playground for outdoor pursuits with a whole host of activities designed to get your adrenalin pumping. Brush away the cobwebs on the longest trail network of its kind at the Ballyhoura Mountain Bike Trails, try go-karting, go hill or mountain walking where the scenery really is a sight to behold or saddle up on the forest trails and mountain paths with Ballyhoura Horse Trails. If you have any budding environmentalists with you, make sure to visit Griston Bog **Outdoor Classroom**



Continue along the N21 to Rathkeale, 11km west of Adare. In the 18th century, Sir Thomas Southwell introduced the Palatines to the area, a group of German speaking Protestant refugees who settled here. Today, the Irish **Palatine Heritage** Centre, highlighting

Further enhance your experience of Adare with a visit to the farmers market which takes place every Saturday, indulge in the finest afternoon tea, go horse riding, take in a day at the races at Limerick Racecourse at nearby Patrickswell, or go golfing in the area's world-class and much renowned golf courses. Why not further explore the open roads of Co. Limerick or the Wild Atlantic Way with a classic car or retro motorcycle hire from RetroVentures Ireland, located just outside Croagh village, just beyond Adare

> > attractive village of Athea. Hidden away in Athea village, behind the Memorial Hall is a

guirky and unique Fairy Trail, home to ten fairies who each have their own fairy door. There is also a worry-tree called 'Croga' which promises to take away any worries you might have if you place your hand on the plague attached to it! From here, continue to Newcastle West, the largest town in Limerick County. There's loads to do here including a visit to the almost perfectly preserved **Desmond** Banqueting Hall, take a stroll through the magnificent parkland of the Demesne or get some retail therapy in the town's excellent fashion and accessory

Stop at **Abbeyfeale** and explore this appealing market town, or get off the beaten track and explore on foot or by bike, part of the Great Southern **Greenway Limerick**, a unique 96km stretch of countryside which follows the route of the former Limerick to Tralee/ Fenit Railway line.

Continue through Mountcollins, Ashford and Broadford villages at the foothills of the Mullaghareik Mountains. Take note of the simple yet poignant memorial to the **Great Irish Famine** in the Church grounds at Broadford and the village library, which is one of the Carnegie libraries built by the American Carnegie Foundation in the early 1900's.

Finish up your scenic West Limerick Drive in **Ballingarry**, where the ruins of the **DeLacy Castle**, originally built by the Knights Templar and Knockfierna (the Hill of Truth) can be seen.

4. N69 DRIVE From the city, with Limerick Greyhound Stadium on your left, take the N69 to the very historic village of **Mungret**. In the general area of the village itself locations mentioned in Frank Mc Court's world famous book Angela's Ashes. From Mungret continue on through the villages of Clarina and Kildimo.

Continue on to Kilcornan, where you will find a cluster of fantastic family fun activities to keep you and your little ones entertained. Enjoy the great outdoors at the vast Curraghchase Forest Park, check out the selection of farm and exotic animals at Stonehall Visitor Farm or for something a little less sedate try a spot of **go-karting**. From Kilcornan, drive a short distance west (6km), hopping out of your car at **Askeaton** to soak up the local atmosphere and get a real sense of history. In medieval times, Askeaton was a stronghold of the Munster Geraldines, the Anglo-Norman Earls of Desmond, Here you will find Askeaton Castle, the Hell Fire Club, the ruins of the 14th Century Franciscan Friary and the ruins of the 13th Century St. Mary's Church. Don't pass up the opportunity to take a guided tour with local guide, Anthony Sheehy, who has been conducting tours of his home town for the last 30 years.

Take a short detour off the N69 to Shanagolden where adventure awaits in the form of Basecamp Action Adventure Park and get to grips with a whole host of action packed outdoor activities.

Continue on to **Foynes**, where a visit to the Foynes Flying Boat Museum

on the main road is an absolute must! The museum recalls the era 1939 – 1945 when trans-Atlantic air traffic between Europe and North America centred on Foynes, with flying boats using the sheltered strait between the village and Foynes Island. Foynes is also the birthplace of the Irish coffee, concocted for cold and weary seaplane passengers arriving ashore at

This part of Limerick is blessed with an abundance of beautiful gardens. Make sure to stop by Knockpatrick and Boyce **Gardens** as you're in the area

Continue west along the N69 through Loughill as far as **Glin**. Situated on the banks of the Shannon Estuary, Glin is the former seat of the Knight of Glin and is home to the lovely Glin Heritage Walks. From Glin continue on to **Tarbert**. The car ferry at Tarbert acts as the gateway between Clare and Kerry and indeed the Wild Atlantic Way. From here one can continue on the N69 through **Listowel** and

on to **Tralee,** Co. Kerry or take the ferry to Killimer in Co. Clare and discover what this beautiful county has to offer.
