2. HAP Shared Services

The Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) provides housing assistance for households who qualify for social housing support, including many long-term rent supplement recipients.

The HAP Shared Services Centre currently administers the following transactional processes on a shared services basis for all 31 local authorities and the Dublin Regional Homeless Executive:



- Set-up and commencement of HAP tenancy
- · Payment of monthly landlord rent
- · Weekly differential rent debit
- · Collection of tenant rent
- Monitoring review and maintenance of HAP tenancies
- Recoupment management
- Reporting on various aspects of the transactions and data handled by the HAP SSC

At the end of October, there were 28,787 active HAP tenancies.

The weekly tenant debit was in excess of €1.2 million and the monthly landlord payment run was just under €20 million.

A Data Analyst has been appointed and will commence employment with the HAP Shared Services Centre in November 2017.

3. Social Development

Local Community Development Committee (LCDC)

The Local Community Development Committee met in October and considered the implementation of Social Inclusion and Community Activation Programme (SICAP) and LEADER, and in particular the criteria for the evaluation of LEADER projects. A representative of the LCDC attended a national seminar on NEETS – young people who are not in education, training or work and a regional consultation on the work of Pobal.

Drawdown commenced for the eight projects (€161,730) approved for Clár community safety measures in 2017.

The 15 Rural Outdoor Recreation projects (€135,270) are underway and expected to be completed for the end of 2017.

Healthy Limerick

Healthy Cities and Counties Network: Healthy Limerick represented at the meeting of this network in the Department of Health offices, Dublin.

Healthy and Positive Ageing Initiative (HaPAI):

Named collaborator in the University of Limerick, led application to conduct research around a Community

Intervention to Increase Physical Activity Levels in Adults Over 50 Years of Age in Ireland.

Comhairle na nÓg: Co-facilitated a workshop with the Limerick Comhairle na nÓg group in advance of this year's AGM. The Comhairle had previously agreed to explore how they might support Healthy Ireland at this year's AGM and for the coming year.

Public Participation Network: Hosted a Healthy Limerick information stand at the Public Participation Network Linkage Groups' meeting

Limerick Sports Partnership (LSP)

169,742km has now been covered by Beat the Street participants. Legacy programmes will be delivered across all communities where activity levels were low over the next seven months.

The LSP hosted the Company Marathon challenge where 13 companies took on the challenge to complete the marathon by running legs of 200m by 15 team members. Stryker retained the title with a great time of 1 hour 59 minutes.

The schools' Marathon Challenge also saw a repeat winner with Castletroy College retaining their title in 2 hours 1 minute.

All LSP community health and fitness programmes are up and running across the county i.e. Move & Lose, New Year New Start, Older Adult Fitness programmes at 7 Hubs, Men on the Move @ 4 sites, Women on Wheels, Sportshall Athletics, Activation Workshops, Community Walking, Desk to 5K, Nutrition Information Workshops. 4. Customer Services

On 16 October, we were hit by the Storm Ophelia.

Throughout the storm, Customer Services aided the citizen by extending the main telephone number until 8.00 p.m. with the aim of supporting customers' requests during and after the storm.

We also ensured information flow by working with the Communications/Twitter team of any trees reported down on roads so that the website could be updated to keep the citizen informed and, most importantly, safe

On the days and in these that followed, 335 cases alone were logged directly as a result of Storm Ophelia.



The call centre has continued its success, with our Customer Services Department receiving a total of 14,536 calls throughout the month of October.

This works out at approximately 730 calls per day, with the average response time being 11 seconds for calls to be answered.

With reception calls now being brought into the back office, through the call centre, this allows more focus on the citizen at the front desk, of which we had 2,288 between our Merchant's Quay and Dooradoyle offices. A total of 2,914 cases were logged throughout the month of October, the majority of which were for:

Representatives of the Customer Services Department attended the Social Directorate Workshop to raise awareness of Sugar CRM (Customer Relationship Management). There were also many staff changes within the organisation throughout the month of October, which were facilitated by the Customer Services Department, through training on Sugar CRM usage.

5. Library Services

- This year's Children's Book Festival Programme was jam-packed with book-themed entertainments and activities for the month of October. The festival this year was bigger than ever with events taking place in library branches throughout the city and county. All main branches had busy programmes with national and local performers.
- Marita Conlon-McKenna, an award winning Irish writer of adult and children's fiction, best known for her Children of the Famine series read to hundreds of children in The Granary and Watch House Cross libraries.
- Arran Towers of the "Tallest Smallest Theatre", performed 'Meeting Robert' an interactive puppet show with an anti-bullying theme in Dooradoyle, the Granary and Watch House Cross branches.
- Michael Moylan of Irish History Live, entertained invited school groups in the Granary, Dooradoyle and Watch House Cross libraries with his uniquely entertaining insight into medieval times and the

second world war with artefacts, fun facts and lots of audience participation.

- Also well known writer Gabriel Fitzmaurice read from his work to a very appreciative audience in Kilmallock, Newcastle West and Adare libraries.
- A "Viking Talk" in association with the Hunt Museum was enjoyed by school groups in the Granary.
- Master storyteller Niall de Búrca visited Watch
 House Cross and Granary libraries while PigNut
 Productions show "The Trouble With Fairies" was a
 big hit in Newcastle West.
- Halloween events in Watch House Cross included story time with art and crafts, a Halloween Parent and Toddler Party and "Spooky Storytime".
- Also in the Watch House Cross branch, Limerick Women's Network held a health information day in the library on 19 October, topics discussed included cancer prevention, diet and nutrition, blood pressure and BMI. People were invited to try acupuncture and offered a blood pressure check. Classes running in the library this year in partnership with local community centres and the Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board include digital photography, word processing, ICT skills, maths, communication skills, and art. The ABC Startright programme is now running weekly in the library, this is an early intervention initiative focusing on the ante-natal to six years age group. Sessions include infant first aid, baby yoga, early experiences with nursery rhymes and songs.
- On 3 October, Newcastle West Library in association with West Limerick Resources launched the Rhyme/Story time Autumn Initiative. The event was attended by over 80 children from local crèches and Montessori schools. Storyteller, Ruth Marshall entertained the audience with her life like stories, this was followed by a sing along and art/craft session. An art exhibition "Scenes of Celtic Nature" by local artist Ian Clark was officially opened in the library by Councillor Francis Foley on 12 October. The artist uses acrylics and draws inspiration from the variety of Irish landscapes, castles, coastal scenes and exciting skies. On 31 October, the library held a mid-term break workshop "Messy Hands", the idea behind this workshop is to enhance child development through messy and creative play.



- The Granary Library's Evening Lecture Series continued on 3 October with "Jim Kemmy: 20 years in hindsight" by Dr. Brian Callanan. October marked the 20th anniversary of the death of Jim Kemmy. Brian Callanan's talk described the life and significance of Kemmy, reflecting also on the implications for our contemporary world. Brian Callanan is the author of the biography "Jim Kemmy, Stonemason, Trade Unionist, Politician & Historian". Kemmy combined all these with research into local history and other interventions in topics such as Northern Ireland, family planning, church or state relations and heritage.
- The Granary branch also presented an evening with Carol Drinkwater on 5 October, presenting her new novel "The Lost Girl". Local author, Roisin Meaney, spoke to Carol about the book, her life as a writer, actress and filmmaker. Carol is well known for her portrayal of Helen Herriott in the BBC TV series "All Creatures Great & Small".
- Dooradoyle Library was delighted to host the annual Autumn Exhibition of the Limerick Art Society, one of the oldest art societies in the country. Paintings by twenty four members were on view throughout the month. Works in oil, acrylic, pastel, watercolour and ink were all on display.
- The preschool story-time continued on Wednesday mornings during October with the numbers continuing to increase.
- A Saturday morning story-time by library staff for four to six year olds was launched in October and it is hoped to continue this throughout the year. Meditation continued on 19 October. Vodafone classes resumed and continue on Wednesday mornings in the Exhibition area.
- Kilmallock Library was delighted to host the Bank of Ireland Enterprising Town Competition judging panel during the month of October. The judging panel visited Kilmallock with the Local Enterprise Office to hear a presentation on the town from the Local Community. The judges, visitors and representative from the local community were hosted at the Library for refreshments, viewed the historic and craftwork exhibition at the Library, and met with local businesses before taking a Walking Tour of the Town. Kilmallock's Children's Book Festival featured writer Roisin Meaney, Gabriel Fitzmaurice, Trevor McCarthy (Kilmallock's own living Medieval Historian) and a very special guest for one day only the Big Friendly Giant from Roald Dahl's hugely popular tale the BFG.

6. Limerick Arts Office

Creative Ireland

Limerick Museum in association with Creative Ireland, created a pop up museum inviting the public to bring along historic objects relating to their community, including but not limited to old postcards, photographs or from local sporting events or businesses. The purpose of the pop up museum is to engage people of all ages and walks of life in a reflection and conversation about the meaning of objects in our lives and histories. The project will take place over six weeks in the months of October and November. In October the pop up museum took place in the following areas:

- Open call for International Mobility Award Call to allow artists to travel internationally.

Arts Office Programme

- The third in the Castleconnell Autumn Concert Series took place on 17 October. Tine Thing Helseth, Norway's internationally renowned trumpet star and pianist Gunnar Flagstad performance was infectious. Students from Cork as well as students from Limerick School of Music travelled to attend. The concert was programmed in partnership with Music Network Ireland.
- Catriona Quirke has been announced as Limerick's literature mentee for the Word's Ireland National Mentoring Programme open call and writer Niall Williams is the mentor. The mentoring consists of four meetings with between the mentor and the mentee over a period of up to eight months. The mentor will read the mentees work in advance of each meeting, and feedback and advise at each meeting. They may also provide information and advice on professional and publishing matters.
- Culture Night 2017 post-event report for Limerick submitted to Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht including the event in numbers:

Total Audience Count: 21,600 audience members

Total Events: 94 programmed events **Total Venues**: 78 venues/locations

This represents an increase of 12% in audience numbers from last year.

 Letters of Support were issued to individual artists and arts organisations for submission to the national open calls - Arts Council's 'Visual Artists Workspace Scheme' (Deadline 12 October) and Arts Council's 'Festivals Investment Scheme' (Deadline 26 October).

7. Limerick Museum

- Limerick Museum received 1.563 visitors in October.
- The Museum continues to benefit from the generosity of private donors and was in receipt of a large collection of historic Limerick newspapers dating from the 1770s to the 1830s. The Museum

- also received a collection of mid-nineteenth century letterheads.
- An exciting partnership with the Richard Harris International Film Festival was initiated and the museum hosted an exhibition of memorabilia relating to Richard Harris's life and career.

8. Limerick City Gallery of Art

- Elizabeth Magill's exhibition, HEADLAND, initiated by LCGA, alongside Landmarks and Lifeforms with work by Frieda Meany and Danny Osborne ended on 22 October having had over 12,000 visitors during the run. LCGA was the recipient of an Arts Council Touring and Dissemination Award to tour HEADLAND by Elizabeth Magill to the RHA, Dublin.
- Preparations are in progress for the next three exhibitions, the exhibitions include: 'Screendance' a collaboration with Light Moves Festival; 'Master of my Universe' by Theresa Nanigian, a touring exhibition from the Highlanes Gallery, Drogheda and the exhibition 'Known Unknowns' curated by Simon Fennessy Corcoran, LCGA's Shinnors Scholar will be officially launched on 2 November by Dr. Des Fitzgerald, President of University of Limerick.
- LCGA continued its Autumn programme of events with five events taking place during October with the programme running until Christmas. The programme contains work by local artists, writers and musicians with most events FREE. For the event Ode to Tress on the 19 October a newly commission performance was presented at LCGA by artist Mary Nunan and collaborators, the event was well received and it is planned to tour this performance in 2018.
- The RTE Contempo Quartet held their second concert of the Complete Beethoven Cycle on 5 October.
- Our successful Children's weekend workshops continue until mid October, there has been full attendance for the weekend workshops.
- LCGA loaned the artwork by Nano Reid to the Arts Council of Ireland for a temporary exhibit in Solstice Arts Centre.
- LCGA continued to facilitate the meetings and workshop by the Limerick Art Society in the HUB.



- Ongoing plans continue for the essential work on the building and will commence shortly.
- LCGA's attendance for October was over 7,200.

9. Planning and Environment

Litter/Waste Enforcement

- A total of 95 complaints were received in October.
- 41 on the spot litter fines were issued during the month.
- Legal proceedings were issued in one case under the Litter Pollution Act.

10. Environmental Awareness

Limerick Going for Gold Grand Final

The Limerick Going for Gold Grand Final was held on the 10th October, 2017 with a total prize fund of €76,000. The top prize of €10,000 in the Challenge Category was awarded to Adare Tidy Towns, with Abbeyfeale Tidy Towns taking 2nd place and a prize of €7,000 and Oola Tidy Towns being awarded 3rd place and a prize of €5,000. The competition encompassed groups from across Limerick City and County with the Limerick in Bloom Awards being incorporated under the Limerick Going for Gold banner.

Kilteely Tidy Towns won the overall Limerick in Bloom award and a prize of €5,000. Other winners on the night included Kilcornan Tidy Towns who were awarded €2,000 in the Tidy Towns Incentive Category, Caherdavin who won the Overall Residential Area/ Estates Category and received a prize of €2,000 and to celebrate National Reuse Month UL Environment Committee and Our Lady of Lourdes Community won an award for their reuse projects.

Annual Green School's Seminar

More than 70 Teachers from across Limerick schools participated in the Limerick City and County Council Annual Green School Seminar today in the Maldron Hotel. The teachers were treated to a range of workshops across 6 Environmental Themes, Litter and Waste, Energy, Water, Biodicersity, Global Citizenship, and Marine Litter.

National Tidy Towns

54 Groups participated in the National Tidy Towns Competition in 2017. Adare was awarded a Silver Medal along with the Limerick County award in the National Tidy Towns Competition 2016. Limerick City, Galbally, Ardpatrick, Kilmallock and Newcastle West have all been awarded Bronze Medals in this year's competition, with Adare receiving a County Award and Ardpatrick a highly commended and Galbally a commended award. Kilcornan Tidy Towns have received a Special Endeavour Award.

The Council's Annual Tidy Towns Seminar took place in February. Promoting community involvement in the improvement and enhancement of the local environment is a primary objective of the Council. Enhanced community involvement in the maintenance of their areas is delivered through the public spirit and initiative of community groups, tidy towns committees, residents' associations and local businesses. This community spirit comes to the fore in areas such as the TLC Campaign, National Spring Clean and the Limerick Going for Gold Environmental Improvement Grant & Competition.

The opening of the Exhibition "Red Ribbons and Other Stories" by Castleconnell Artist Clare Hartigan took place at Istabraq Hall during the month. Up until recently, the Limerick Museum was housed in this room but since the Museum relocated to its permanent home in the Old Francisan Friary on Henry Street, Istabraq Hall has been returned to its initial use, that of Limerick City and County Council's principal reception room. The exhibition is a trip down memory lane for Clare as she explores her relationship with Limerick. The exhibition will run for the month of November.

2. Investment

- STATS, the worldwide leaders in sports data and intelligence, announced plans to open a new office in Limerick, which will serve as its regional headquarters overseeing European, Middle Eastern and African (EMEA) operations. More than 100 new jobs are to be created by 2020 as part of this investment.
- Kirkland Investments has secured conditional planning permission to expand the Savoy Hotel, the city centre's only five-star hotel, into the neighbouring Mill Building at the Henry Street-Shannon Street junction. The €8m development will see 50 new construction jobs, and 25 longterm roles created.
- Regeneron Pharmaceuticals, one of the fastestgrowing companies in the global biotechnology industry, has announced plans to further expand its Limerick Industrial Operations and Product Supply (IOPS) bioprocessing campus with an additional 300 jobs and investment of \$100 million, bringing

the total expected employment at the site to 800 people and total investment to \$750 million.

3. Derelict Sites

4. Innovate Limerick

Innovate Limerick worked closely on two successful Town and Village Renewal Scheme applications as follows, the development of an E-Hub for Rathkeale which received €200,000 and Kantoher Development Group which received €100,000.

5. Marketing and Communications

- Limerick.ie sponsored and participated in Europe's largest gathering of travel bloggers (TBEX) in Killarney from 3 5 October 2017. Organised by Fáilte Ireland, the event attracted more than 600 delegates from around the world who have a combined social media reach to an audience of over 300 million world-wide. 3. Training Fire and Emergency Services

Emergency Services Driving Standard (ESDS) Training

Emergency Service Driving Standards were developed with the RSA and all emergency service agencies to develop a common driving standard for emergency service personnel. Limerick Fire and Rescue are delivering ESDS training for drivers of fire appliances through a combination of in-house instructors and external training providers.

During October five firefighters were trained to this standard for Emergency Service Driving. This level refers only to services who by law can drive using blue lights and sirens in emergency response situations. This training will progress over the coming months.

Breathing Apparatus Instructor Course

Three members of Limerick Fire and Rescue Service travelled to Newcastle in the UK to be trained as Breathing Apparatus Instructors. This two week course, which was delivered by Tyne & Wear Fire



Service, combines both the theory and practical elements of instructing Firefighters in the safe and effective use of Breathing Apparatus equipment.

Sub Station Officer Course

In early October Limerick Fire and Rescue Service delivered an accredited Sub-Station Officer Course in accordance with the National Directorate for Fire and Emergency Management guidelines. This course was held in Shannon Fire Station. In total 15 fire fighters from Limerick Fire and Rescue and three fire fighters from Clare Fire and Rescue were trained. The aim of this two-week course is to enhance the ability of fire authorities to deliver efficient and effective fire and rescue services by providing fire service officers with the skills and knowledge necessary to allow them to fulfil the leadership, command, training and officership roles assigned to them.

Inter Agency Information Management Officer Course

Personnel from Limerick City and County Council attended an Inter-Agency Information Management Officer course. Emergency Helpline Operator training was held in Dooradoyle. A new Emergency Helpline System has been set up following the installation of the new Jabber phone system.

4. Digital Strategy

CRM Integration with iHouse

- The Council's housing stock is now available for reference in the CRM and the CRM mobile app.
- Staff can easily identify a council property and list cases against that property.
- This is especially useful for our ground staff.

New GIS Data Set

- Users of Quantum Geographic Information System (QGIS) now have access to Prime2 data sets from the Ordnance Survey of Ireland (OSI).
- Prime2 is a standardised spatial referencing platform for Ireland.
- Each item in the data set (road, building, street light etc.) has a unique identity that can be referenced across systems.

Online Digitiser Replacement

 With the exception of planning applications and fire certificates, all GIS digitising activities that were done using the legacy MapGuide technology can now be done through modern GIS applications such as QGIS or MapBender.


