Domestic Waste Refuse Waiver Scheme

- Total number of waivers issued for Limerick City and County Council for April 2018 was 52 waivers approved, 12 were refused.

2. HAP Shared Services

The Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) Scheme is one of the key elements of the Government's policy on social housing. The HAP Shared Services Centre is the national customer contact and financial transactional-shared service for HAP.

Limerick City and County Council operates the HAP Shared Services Centre on behalf of the 31 local authorities along with the Dublin Regional Homes Executive.

There were 35,723 active HAP tenancies at the end of April 2018. A weekly average of 353 HAP tenancies have been set-up during 2018.

The weekly tenant debit is almost €1.6 million and the April landlord payment run was almost €26 million.

There are currently 56 people working in the HAP Shared Services Centre.

3. Social Development

Community Leisure and Emergency Services Strategic Policy Committee

The draft Limerick Integration Plan 2017-2021 "Belonging to Limerick: Connecting People and Communities" sets out the proposals by the Integration Working Group following an extensive consultation process to engage with and support the new communities now resident in Limerick. The plan focuses on diversity advantage and the members of the Strategic Policy Committee recommended that the plan go before full council for consideration.

Mo Foley Walsh, Healthy Limerick Co-Ordinator presented on the following strategies:

- National Physical Activity Plan.
- Get Ireland Walking.
- Phase 1 of Play Strategy for Limerick City and County.

LOCAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (LCDC)

Social Inclusion and Community Activation Programme (SICAP) Launch

The national launch of the new Social Inclusion and Community Activation Programme was held in the Southill Area Centre in Limerick on 20 April. The Minister for Rural and Community Development, Michael Ring, TD launched the national programme, which is committed to funding of €190 million on social inclusion and activation measures up to 2022. The allocation for Limerick is in excess of €2 million, which is managed by the LCDC.

Healthy Limerick

The Healthy Limerick Steering Group organised a small grants scheme for communities in Limerick city and county to promote social connectedness at a local level. It is also a pilot to demonstrate the feasibility of running a small grant fund through the local authority/LCDC structure, with learning to be shared with Healthy Ireland in the Department of Health. Eighteen groups (all but two are volunteer-led) were approved for grants of between €400 and €1,000.

LEADER Funding

The LCDC Local Action Group (LAG) continued the delivery of the EU Leader Programme 2014-2020. Letters of funding offers to the value of €3.5 million have been issued to various project promoters in Limerick.

CLÁR Programme

CLÁR is a targeted investment programme for rural areas that aims to provide funding for small-scale infrastructural projects in areas that have experienced significant depopulation. The aim of CLÁR is to support the sustainable development of designated CLÁR areas with the aim of attracting people to live and work there. The funding works in conjunction with local funding and is based on locally identified priorities. A submission was made to the Department of Rural and Community Development seeking up to €400,000 for identified projects in CLÁR areas.

4. Customer Services

Owing to the critical front line role that Customer Services provides, staff from the department were among a group of wider council employees who were invited to represent the council at a function in Dublin Castle in April. This was hosted by An Taoiseach, Leo Varadkar and it acknowledged the public sector staff involved in the response to recent Storms Ophelia and Emma.

On the 24 April, Customer Services invited staff from the Operations and Maintenance Department to the Woodlands House Hotel to discuss items such as Freedom of Information, the 'My Limerick' platform of the limerick.ie website, the mobile version of Sugar Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system and Customer Services in general. The purpose of this exercise was to discuss with Operations and Maintenance what is new in Customer Services, how it affects them and how Customer Services can support them in the carrying out of their duties more efficiently. It was also an opportunity for the Operations and Maintenance team to provide feedback to Customer Services and share ideas on business improvements. Approximately 30 supervisors, engineers and support staff attended. The feedback received is being compiled so that Customer Services can better support the crews on the ground.

The Housing Maintenance digital process went 'live' on 11 April. This process is of great value to Customer Services staff as they can now view the full history of a housing maintenance case, specifically communications between supervisors and contractors. This provides Customer Services staff with the most up to date information to relay to the customer.

Customer Services handled and processed 69 residential parking permits throughout the month of April.

The call centre has continued its success with our Customer Services department receiving a total of 13,240 calls throughout the month of April. This works out at approximately 662 calls per day with the average response time being 17 seconds for calls to be answered.

A total of 2,935 cases were logged throughout the month of April, the majority of which were:

- Operations and Maintenance: 2,005 – over half of which being housing maintenance.
- Community Support Services: 376.
- Planning and Environmental Services: 238.
- Customer Services: 143.

The total number of callers to our counters at Merchants Quay and Dooradoyle was 2,888.

5. Library Services

- Read Your Mind launches in Limerick City and County Libraries.

Jigsaw Limerick in collaboration with Limerick City and County Library have launched Read Your Mind at library branches across Limerick.

Jigsaw Limerick is a free, non-judgemental and confidential mental health support service for young people aged 12 - 25 living, working or studying in Limerick. It provides guidance and support for young people who are going through a difficult or distressing time as well as providing advice and guidance for anyone who is concerned about a young person in their life. The Read Your Mind catalogue is available to help people find the right book for them; covering topics including anger, anxiety, autism, bullying, creativity, low mood, mindfulness, parenting and families, social media, and much more. It brings together an invaluable collection of 108 books on mental health that are available for free to young people, their parents, and friends at libraries across Limerick City and County.

The Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Stephen Keary attended a joint launch in the Granary Library on 11 April and Kilmallock Library on 12 April.

Libraries pride themselves on being at the heart of the community and this 'Read Your Mind' project offered the opportunity to collaborate with Jigsaw and make this excellent collection of titles available in Limerick to all those who need it. Self-help books are now recognised as a vital source of support for people experiencing mental health difficulties. This collection will be available to all in branch libraries in Limerick City and County.

- To celebrate Poetry Month in Limerick the Granary Branch in association with Limerick Writers' Centre hosted the following events: "Come Gather 'Round People" – the Poetry of Bob Dylan with Gerry Hanberry on 5 April, "Bringing out the Romantic in You: Shelley, Keats and Wordsworth with Dr. John McDonagh on 12 April and "Poetry and Politics" with Eoin Devereux and Kevin Higgins on 19 April.
- Also Limerick Writers' Centre presented "On the Nail" at the library – a literary evening with Jacqueline Saphra and Ron Carey plus limited "open mic" on 26 April.
- The Granary Branch hosted Eamonn Hehir music gig on 13 April. The concert celebrated 30 years of song-writing, performed by Eamonn accompanied by James Hanley on keyboards, John Steele on electric guitar and Jenny McMahon. All very well received by an appreciative audience of over fifty on the night.
- Continuing music events included the Desi Wilkinson traditional music session. He is currently a traditional musician in residence at Mary Immaculate College. Students from Mary Immaculate College joined him for the lunchtime concert.
- The library hosted the Limerick School of Music end of year concert on 26 April. This included a senior cello ensemble, a thirteen-piece guitar ensemble, string quartet and two junior ensembles on 6 April.
- The Library hosted "Irish Wildlife Exhibition Natural History" on 20 and 21 April. The Irish Quaternary Association (IQUA) invited the public to come along to the Granary Branch to their exhibition of extinct and contemporary Irish mammals recreating prehistoric landscapes with animal models, paintings and 3D maps including the mammoth, brown bear, giant Irish deer and arctic fox.

- On 17 April The Granary Branch hosted energy workshops for children in which pupils were introduced to Guzzler, the puppet who loves to waste energy. The workshops are a good introduction for children to all aspects of energy in our lives in a fun and interactive way.
- On 27 April The "Climate Hope Forum" was organised by An Taisce Green-Schools. The aim of the forum is to bring together students and teachers, local authorities and local councillors interested in climate change. Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Stephen Keary, Sinead McDonnell, Environment Education Officer, Limerick City and County Council along with students and teachers from six schools all attended.
- Dr. Brian Murphy gave a fascinating history lecture at Kilmallock Library on 17 April on foot of the publication of his most recent title "The Life and Tragic Death of Winnie Barrington". Brian's talk was very informative on the burning of Creameries in East County Limerick as part of the offensive of the Crown forces in 1920/1921. This talk was also held in the Granary Branch.
- Kilmallock Library was delighted to host an Information Talk from John McElhinney from Mental Health Ireland on Tuesday evening 3 April. The 'Mind your Mental' Health Information evening forms part of the Healthy Ireland in the Library Programme. John's talk was full of useful tips to help us take care of ourselves in our day to day lives.
- Spring into Story Time was celebrated in Kilmallock Library with a Little Reader Workshop on 18 April.

6. Limerick Culture and Arts Office

The Autonomy Project

Limerick Culture and Arts Office presented The Autonomy Project (funded through the Arts Council's Invitation to Collaboration scheme) comprising of professional artists and original youth performances to audiences in Limerick, beginning on Easter Monday for five days of events from 2-7 April. The performances of original works from Limerick's finest youth groups and leading professional dance, visual and sound artists exploring our autonomy in society took place in two venues.

The Autonomy Project @ The Sailors Home : This multi-genre installation performance presented original works by six leading artists: Visual Artist, Seamus Nolan (F**k IMMA), Performance Artist Fergus Byrne (Future Histories), Performing Artist, Deirdre Murphy (Capitalism the Musical), sound installation by Siobhan Kavanagh and Adam Gibney (Doom Opera and Synthesiser 7:(un)Certain), Dance Artist Lisa McLoughlin (Anima).

The Autonomy Project @ Dance Limerick. These performance film, dance and music showcased the original works created by our youth group partners: Limerick Youth Theatre, Dance Limerick, Music Generation Limerick City and GOSHH along with two outstanding professional performances, Goblom (Ella Clarke and Caitríona Ní Mhurchú) and Contemporary Circus Maleta Company.

As part of the project, an interdisciplinary conference took place in the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance at the University of Limerick on 20 April. Officially opened by Deputy Mayor Councillor Marian Hurley, the daylong conference included papers by leading Irish Artists, academics as well as contributions by the youth partners.

The Autonomy Project progresses Limerick Culture and Arts Office's Youth Arts Strategy, by developing and strengthening partnerships between four youth groups partners, Limerick Youth Theatre, Dance Limerick, Music Generation Limerick City and GOSHH (Gender, Orientation, Sexual Health, HIV).

Launch of Shannon Fisherman Documentary

Commissioned by Limerick City and County Council Archives under the Creative Ireland Programme in Limerick the documentary features fishermen from along the Shannon who recount their experiences of fishing for a living along the Estuary. Minister for Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, Josepha Madigan TD officially launched the documentary in Istabraq Hall on 6 April, with the Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Stephen Keary and many of the fishermen who worked along the River Shannon in attendance.

Éigse Michael Hartnett 2018

The annual Éigse Michael Hartnett Literary and Arts Festival takes place each year in Newcastle West, Co. Limerick, Hartnett's home-town and is supported by the Arts Council and Limerick City and County Council. This year it took place from 12-14 April and was officially launched by the Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Stephen Keary.

The opening night of Eigse also saw the joint winners of this year's Michael Hartnett Poetry award honoured: Macdara Woods for Music from the Big Tent (Dedalus Press 2016) and Mary O'Malley for Playing the Octopus (Carcanet 2016).

Integrated Dance Programme

The aim of this project is to introduce participants to dance as an art form whilst facilitating active and productive engagement in dance activities amongst disabled and non-disabled participants. The integrated dance programme covers a wide geographical area in County Limerick. The towns and villages represented by the schools are Rathkeale, Abbeyfeale, Dromcollogher, Newcastle West, Pallaskenry and Castletroy. The programme involves many agencies including, service provider management, care staff, transition year co-ordinators, teachers, transport providers and participants. For the 2017-2018 programme, there has been an increased number of students participating from 230 to 310 and the culmination of this year's work was hosted by Castletroy College on 16 April.

Riverfest Launch

The press launch for Riverfest took place on 10 April in House. This is the city's premier summer festival, and highlights announced on the day included sailing regatta, kayaking and water based performances on the river Shannon, the popular BBQ Competition, the Riverfestival village in Arthur's Quay Park, the Bon Secours Great Limerick Run and a spectacular fireworks display.

World Recipe Exchange

It has been almost a year since Ormston House received the research and development grant from the European Cultural Foundation followed by funding from Limerick City and County Council. Since then

they have worked on developing the programme, building the World Recipe Exchange community and bringing the international residents of Limerick city together while sharing food. The research and development phase is concluding and to celebrate their achievements, a small gathering with all those who helped make World Recipe Exchange happen over the past year took place on 19 April in Ormston House.

Letters of Support

Eight letters of support for organisations and individuals making applications to the Arts Council funding schemes were provided under the new Limerick City and County Council strategic funding award.

Festivals and Research Partnership with UL

Limerick Culture and Arts Office in partnership with the Kemmy Business School and Dr. Annmarie Ryan at the University of Limerick rolled out a Festivals strategic marketing for tourism project. This working partnership involved the strategic marketing for tourism students undertaking a programme of work that focused on Limerick festivals. The goal was to support locally based festivals in their strategic marketing activities, while at the same time exposing the students to the complexity of festivals as a cultural and tourism 'product'. The key focus of the project was to consider the following

1. the positioning of the festival
2. setting measurable goals in specific markets
3. devising of a range of strategies that will enable the achievement of those goals

In this project, the students based their work on the needs and goals of each festival, setting measurable targets and devising a strategy to help you achieve these. The final presentation and outcomes of the research was presented to each festival in Culture House on 16 April providing an information sharing and network opportunity for the four festivals that took part, Limerick Fringe, EVA International, HearSay, Limerick Literary Festival.

LEO Festivals and Events Development Programme

Limerick Culture and Arts Office are working with Limerick Enterprise Office to deliver bespoke professional development training for festival organisers. The curriculum for the training was confirmed in April and the 16 festivals are now registered to being the training course that will take place over six weeks. This programme is the result of a panel recommendation as part of the 2017 Limerick City and County Council festivals and events grant scheme.

7. Limerick Museum

The Museum received 1,487 visitors in April.

Dr. Fiona McDonagh, Mary Immaculate College brought a number of students of Contemporary and Applied Theatre Studies to the Museum on 12 April where they engaged with the exhibits as part of the module on Community Theatre.

Friends of Limerick Lace Group held two meetings in the Museum on 5 and 19 April.

An exhibition of paintings by renowned Irish artist Samuel Walsh opened in the Museum on 27 April and will continue until 1 June.

8. Limerick City Gallery of Art (LCGA)

- The RTE ConTempo Quartet held their monthly concert in the current series on 5 April which was well attended by around 35 patrons. The Beethoven Series of the 9 Quartets will continue until May. Negotiations are taking place to continue the series in the Autumn of 2018.
- EVA International 2018 was officially opened on 13 by Inti Guerrero with an attendance of over 300 people. The exhibition is presented in city wide venues and runs until 8 July. EVA International 2018 attendance to end of April was over 5200 visitors.
- EVA International hosted workshops with school groups from 23 April for two weeks as part of the Education programme.
- EVA International will host a series of events and tours over the coming months.
- Official opening at the Draoicht Arts Centre, Blancherstown, Dublin of the exhibition MAKing Art: The DRAWing Exhibition on 25 April which featured 23 artworks from LCGA's/National Collection of Contemporary Drawing for a temporary exhibition which runs until 16 June. Ongoing plans for collaborative projects between LCGA and Draoicht for a three year period.
- LCGA was awarded a touring grant from the Arts Council for our forthcoming exhibition with Anita Groener, tour to take place during 2019.

12. Digital Strategy

Smart City Exchange

- Digital Strategy coordinated the submission of Limerick's proposal for the +CityXChange project to the European Commission, in Trondheim, Norway on 5 April.
- The +CityXChange is a project proposal under the Horizon 2020 Smart Cities and Communities 2018 call developed in partnership with members from 7 EU countries, looking at how a smart city can better manage its energy usage and deploy new energy solutions in order to become a "positive energy" city. This is essential to counter climate change and make the city a better place to live, work and do business.

LITe

- The Limerick Information Transformation Electronic (LITe) project will transform how the council manages information. It aims to increase the use of electronic records and documents in order to provide more efficient public services.
- The procurement process for consultancy services has been completed, while procurement of associated plugins is at an advanced stage. An initial build of the "cloud" platform for our electronic records has also been completed and is currently in use by the LITe project team.

13. Veterinary Services

- 11 stray or wandering horses were impounded.
- The Dog Control Unit dealt with 20 dogs.
- 39 food samples were submitted during April for analysis under the National Residues and Microbiological Sampling Programme.
- The dog Licence awareness campaign continued to be implemented by the dog wardens.

14. Smarter Travel

Limerick Smarter Travel (LST) carried out a balance bike initiative supported by the Healthy Ireland Fund. LST collaborated with the Limerick Childcare Committee and the Healthy Ireland Smart Start Programme in order to best identify and form relationships with our target audience. It was decided that early years services in Limerick that had completed the Healthy Ireland Smart Start Programme, which encourages healthy lifestyle behaviours in early childhood, would be invited to participate in our initiative. Once signed up participants underwent a one-day sprocket rocket training class with a Cycling Ireland instructor. Sprocket rocket enables participants to teach young people to cycle in an environment where the emphasis is on the pleasure of participating and the joy of learning new skills, balancing, cornering, braking and pedalling. Two training sessions were carried out, one on 24 March and the second on 28 April. 17 early years services participated in the training and on completion; each service was presented with five balance bikes and five helmets. It is hoped that the provision of cycle training and resources at an early age will lead to an increased uptake and appreciation of cycling for the benefitting children into the future.

Innovate Limerick

- The Minister for Business Enterprise and Innovation, Heather Humphreys, TD visited ENGINE where Innovate Limerick show cased their projects to date and their plans for 2018.
- Dr. Janice O'Connell has joined the Innovate Limerick team as the Mid-West Tech Ambassador. She has formed the Mid-West Tech Network and holds monthly Rapid Talks at ENGINE. These talks include high profile guest speakers on topics such as Blockchain and Virtual Currency, Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning. 4. Housing Capital and Regeneration

General Housing Programme

- Under Rebuilding Ireland, the national target for new social housing is 50,000 units to be delivered by 2021, comprising a blend of built, acquired and leased properties. In April, each local authority received updated targets for 2018-2021, and it is expected that local authorities will focus their delivery streams in line with the ratios indicated. For Limerick City and County Council, the 2018-2021 targets are 1,365 units delivered by 2021, with 251 units to be delivered in 2018.
- During his most recent trip to Limerick, Minister of State, Mr Damien English TD, Minister at the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government (DHPLG), visited recently completed properties delivered under the Buy and Renew programme at Shelbourne Terrace and Treaty Terrace, Thomondgate.
 - The *Buy and Renew* programme is making a positive impact with six vacant units returned to use in recent weeks and a further 23

units at Sale Agreed stage. In addition, the complementary Repair and Lease scheme which also targets vacancy has a further six units in progress and an additional 11 units with Agreements-to-Lease signed and 43 units currently under consideration.

Regeneration

- The completion of Churchfield Phase 1 has provided 42 new houses in Southill. The construction of Churchfield Phase 2 (38 units) will follow and will serve to consolidate the heart of Southill
 - The official opening of the recently completed Churchfield housing development, Southill, was attended by Minister of State, Mr Damien English TD, at the DHPLG. The Minister met with new residents of the scheme and was brought on a tour of their homes followed by refreshments in the newly extended Southill Area Centre.
- The thermal upgrade programme continues apace with approval received from the DHPLG for the following contract
 - Approval to issue Tender for Contract for TU-SMP 113 (St Mary's Park, 29 houses).
- Limerick City and County Council provided the historic building on Lord Edward Street, which is part of the recently completed housing scheme, to EVA International for the duration of the Art Biennial. EVA's presence in this building is an important part of public engagement.
- Social Intervention Fund: an application for funding for 2018 has been submitted. All applications for this fund are assessed by an independent evaluation panel who submit their recommendation to the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government for approval.
- Completion of CCTV in Galvone Industrial Estate by Regeneration.
- Community Consultative Forum met with new Chief Superintendent Gerard Roche to discuss future policing review that took place on 15 January.

5. Water Services

- Watermain leak detection and repair contracts progressing in Limerick city.
- Lead replacement works progressing in Farranshone.

6. Forward Planning

- Variation no. 6 to the Limerick County Development Plan 2010-2016 (as extended) which proposes to incorporate changes to Chapter 8 in relation to Transport and Infrastructure was adopted at a Special Council meeting in April.


