Economic Development Directorate

1. Trade & Investment

- Acorn Life is opening a new branch in Limerick with the creation of 20 jobs.
- A number of jobs have been announced for Abbeyfeale by the HSE (three jobs) which has opened a primary care centre; Gourmet Green, a restaurant and wholesale distributor of healthy option foods (six jobs), and; Kennelly Murphy Architectural Engineering and Planning Consultants (six jobs).

2. Strategic & Forward Planning

- Two submissions were made on the draft Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy for the Southern Region on behalf of the Elected Members and the Executive.
- Chief Executive reports were prepared and issued to the Elected Members of the Newcastle West Municipal District on the proposals to extend the life of the Newcastle West and Abbeyfeale Local Area Plans.
- The Council successfully secured €23,000 from the Heritage Council under the Heritage Plan Programme for four projects for 2019. These are the Samhain Festival, Castle and Tower House Project; Amazing Lace – A Project to mark the anniversary of Limerick Lace, and the Control of Giant Hogweed on the River Loobagh. These projects will be delivered by the Physical Development and the Social Development Directorates during 2019.

3. Limerick Local Enterprise Office (LEO)

- March began with a very busy Local Enterprise Week from 4–8 March, numerous seminars, workshops and clinics were operated throughout Limerick.
- Limerick's National Enterprise Awards 2019 took place on Monday 4 March, in the Strand Hotel where Colm Cussen of ABS Engineering was named Entrepreneur of the Year 2019.
- LEO Limerick attended the Network Ireland International Women's Day 2019 event in Thomond Park Stadium 'Building Resilience' on Friday 8 March.

- Applications closed for Irelands Best Young Entrepreneur Competition on 15 March, Limerick received over 50 applications.
- Limerick's County Final for the 2018-2019 Student Enterprise Programme took place on Tuesday 26 March.
- LEO Limerick had an information stand at the Mid-West Regional Skills Careers Fair on Wednesday 27 March.

4. Digital Strategy

- Three days of meetings were held in Limerick on 20-22 March for the H2020 +CityxChange project. The meetings were attended by representatives from Limerick City and County Council, Trondheim Kommune (Norway), University of Limerick and NTNU (Norwegian University of Science and Technology). The purpose of the meetings was to strengthen the co-operation between Limerick and Trondheim as Lighthouse Cities, and develop a better understanding between organisations of the project requirements across energy, community engagement and platforms.
- The Head of Digital Strategy gave a presentation on Smart Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) policy to the Senior Forum. This policy covers the use of CCTV in Council Buildings, as well as CCTV in public spaces. Pending approval from the Senior Forum the policy will then be presented to the Limerick Joint Policing Committee for their review.
- A public consultation platform, known as "My Point", has been procured by Digital Strategy for council use. This solution will be integrated as part of the My Limerick digital service platform. Initial user training for the new platform was held this month, with the first consultations expected to be published on it in April.
- Limerick was represented by the Head of Digital Strategy at the South by South West (SXSW) Conference in Austin, Texas, USA on 10 March. Limerick chaired the knowledge sharing panel on "How Technology Can Balance Urban/Rural Development" with members of the European Union Commission, City of Boston and Dell. The event was organised by the European Commission representatives in the USA. The event was also an opportunity to strengthen the Austin-Limerick relationship formally initiated this January.

Tourism

Minister Patrick O'Donovan officially unveiled the Shannon Estuary Way Drive in March 2019. The Shannon Estuary Way Drive is a looped drive off the Wild Atlantic Way created to encourage visitors to stay longer and explore other parts of the region. There are five viewing points on the West Limerick side of the Shannon Estuary Way – Ringmoylan Pier, Ballysteen Pier, Bolands Meadows, Kilteery Pier and Glin Pier. The route takes visitors into Limerick City to explore further, and then back out to N18 to enjoy the Shannon Estuary. Fäilte Ireland have been working on this project with staff from Limerick City and County Council since early 2018.

Culture & Arts

St. Patrick's Festival

Limerick extended this year's festival to a three-day event to ensure that we continue to position Limerick as one of the main attractors to Ireland, outside of Dublin for the St. Patrick's Week in Ireland. The opportunity to add a Saturday evening event was supported by Metropolitan District GMA funding. A further development is the support of Fáilte Ireland, who recently announced that Limerick is one of the locations they plan to develop celebrations for 'St. Patrick's Week in Ireland'. This is in recognition that Dublin is at capacity at this time of the year and



supports the thinking around the role festivals play in growing international visitor numbers to Ireland. They recognise that Limerick hosts the second biggest parade outside of Dublin through the combination of a St. Patrick's Day Parade and the International Band Championship.

Fireworks Extravaganza

Limerick St. Patrick's Festival 2019 opened on Saturday 15 March 2019 with a dramatic fireworks display over the River Shannon and the official launch of the Panoramic Wheel at Arthur's Quay Park.

Limerick St. Patrick's Day Parade

Limerick was over the moon on Sunday 17 March 2019, as Grand Marshal Norah Patten, who is in the running to be Ireland's first astronaut, joined 40,000 spectators, 1,600 international Facebook live users and 2,000 energetic participants for this year's parade. This year's parade theme 'One Giant Leap' captured the imagination of all, as Limerick celebrations were aired Live on Facebook, on Virgin Media Television and RTE 6 O'Clock News.

Creative entries included Limerick-based Lumen Street Theatre who reflected the theme with a spectacular space entry and a giant rocket, preparing for lift-off with their very own Space Cowboy. Expressive Arts Drama School in conjunction with Artastic entertained the crowd with a colourful entry, while Space Odyssey's giant inflatables were a huge hit. Musicians from Limerick and Estonia entertained those gathered as they marched along the parade route. Members of the various new Limerick communities including those from Nepal, Pakistan, the Philippines and China created a fantastic atmosphere as they celebrated their cultural heritage as part of Limerick's celebration of the National Holiday.

International Band Championships

The 49th Limerick International Band Championship took place on Monday 18 March 2019 as 1,300 participants from 20 marching bands including 11 international bands joined together to compete at this year's championship. As Ireland's only international

band championship the event has grown from strength to strength with over 30,000 people attending on the day.

Museum of the Moon

In programming this exciting touring artwork by UK artist Luke Jerram, Limerick Culture and Arts Department worked in partnership with St. Mary's Cathedral to host the Museum of the Moon in Limerick. Over 11 days, an extension of the original seven-day run, the Cathedral welcomed over 11,000 people. Museum of the Moon also received significant press and social media coverage as well as many visits from local primary and secondary schools. Museum of the Moon measured seven metres in diameter, and featured 120dpi detailed NASA imagery of the lunar surface. The installation was a fusion of lunar imagery, moonlight and surround sound composition created by BAFTA and Ivor Novello award winning composer Dan Jones.

Open Calls

Limerick Theatre Bursaries 2019

Limerick City and County Council published an open call for applications for theatre bursaries covering research and development of new work and for the production capability to bring work to the next level of development.



- Limerick Theatre Research and Development Bursaries of €2,500 each (2 Awards).
- Limerick Theatre Production & Presentation Bursaries of €5,000 (2 Awards).

The closing date for applications was Wednesday 13 March 2019. Six applications in total were received. The Assessment Panel met on Friday 22 March 2019. Recommendations to be brought to the Cultural SPC.

Grants Under the Arts Act

Sixty-six applications were received with a total ask of €60,676.89. The total fund for 2019 is €20,000. The Assessment Panel met on Wednesday 13 March 2019.

Strategic Fund for Culture and Arts Scheme 2019

Three letters of support were issued in March. This scheme supports applications to national and international funding bodies to help leverage funding by offering a percentage of any funding awarded in the event of a successful application. Applications are accepted on an ongoing basis while there is an available budget.

Limerick Artist in Schools Programme 2019-2020: Invitation to Limerick Festivals for Expressions of Interest

As recommended in the recent Evaluation of the Artist in Schools Programme Limerick 2017/2018, Limerick City and County Council Culture and Arts Department announced an open call to Limerick festivals to submit Expressions of Interest to participate in the delivery of Limerick's Artist in Schools Programme 2019/2020. Closing date for Expressions of Interest was Wednesday 13 March 2019. Six applications were received.

Creative Ireland: Made in Limerick Grants 2019

The Creative Ireland Made in Limerick Grants scheme was advertised on Friday 1 March 2019. These grants are offered as part of the Limerick Creative Ireland Programme to deliver activities taking place in 2019. The closing date for applications was Wednesday 27 March 2019. Forty-five applications were received with a total ask of €159,940 and are being processed.

Limerick Culture and Arts Department: Programme

The County Limerick Youth Theatre

Limerick Culture and Arts Department met with County Limerick Youth Theatre board members on Tuesday 19 March 2019 as part of the agreed meetings under the shared MOU. It was agreed at this meeting to work in partnership to support building capacity around volunteering and work together to address issues of sustainability for the organisation. The County Limerick Youth Theatre is a key element of the Limerick Culture and Arts Department programme in the area of Young People, Children and Education, as outlined in in the Arts Council Framework Agreement.

Helium Arts

Helium Arts Creative Health Hub programme has begun in Limerick. Helium's artists, primarily based in Paediatric Outpatient Clinics, work closely with the medical community, giving children, young people and their families the opportunity to try out different age-appropriate creative activities and get to know the artists. From here, they have the opportunity to be referred by their doctors or parents to Helium's community programme, where they can participate in a series of workshops over 4-6 weeks. In Limerick, the programme began with artist Paul Bokslag attending the outpatient clinic at UHL three times a week since February and has engaged with over 60 children in this time through creative activities. Paul started the community workshops in St Gabriel's school in Limerick at the end of March. The Limerick Hub is taking place in partnership with University Hospital Limerick and Limerick City and County Council.

Bingo Wings

The Bingo Wings Project implementation phase began in March, with aerial development with practitioners taking place and two Circus Artist in Residence advertised. This project led by Limerick City and County Council is offered an Arts Council Invitation to Collaborate Award, with Donegal County Council Arts Office and Kerry County Council Arts Office and Fidget Feet Aerial Dance as lead artistic organisation.



Social Conversations: Topics that Matter

A series of public intergenerational conversations took place at Friars' Gate Theatre, Kilmallock on Tuesday 5 March 2019. Students from Kilmallock's Coláiste Iósaef and a group of older people from the area got together on stage for a chat about topics that matter to them. The public were invited to come along free of charge to hear what they had to say about issues like religion, technology, sexuality, and much more. Led by Sheila Quealey and supported by Ballyhoura Development C.L.G. and Limerick City and County Council.

Artist Studios: Online presence

Limerick Culture and Arts Department offered artists in our James Street Artists' Studios (eight artists) and Cappamore Arts Studios (four artists) the opportunity to put a short biography and some images of their work onto the Limerick.ie website to help support and promote their artistic practices. These went live on the Limerick.ie website in March 2019.

Places Matter Conference

The Arts Council | Local Government joint conference Places Matter | building inclusion in the arts, took place on Thursday 28 March 2019 in NUI Galway. The conference addressed inclusion and Ireland's rapidly changing demographic and asked; how can we ensure that the arts in Ireland reflect our diverse society? Are opportunities to take part in the arts meaningful and relevant to all members of our communities? Speakers included Nina Simon, Director, Santa Cruz Museum of Art and History. The voice of the artist is, as always, critical, and audiences were privileged to have electric contributions and performances by Limerick artists Denise Chaila and Rusangano Family.

Festivals in March supported by Limerick City and County Council

Fresh Film Festival

Fresh Film Festival took place from 25-30 March 2019 celebrating youth film for filmmakers and audiences aged 7-18. Fresh is supported by Limerick City and County Council through a grant awarded via the Festivals and Events competitive open call Grant Scheme. Fresh Film Festival annually hosts public

screenings, workshops, master classes, events and film productions. The programme's international reputation is reflected in the number of international entries to its International Category as part of the competition element of the programme. This year's programme highlights included collaboration with IFI Education for the screening of Keeper at the Odeon, Experimental Film Workshops held across the city, Femme Friday a celebration of young female filmmakers, an Industry Partner workshop, and Fresh After Eight screening a selection of the best shorts at Fresh 2019.

Féile Luminigh

The GALA Concert for this year's Féile Luminigh, supported by a grant from the Limerick City and County Council Festivals and Events Grant Scheme, was held on Sunday 31 March 2019 at the Millennium Theatre (LIT). Féile Luminigh aims to promote and encourage creative effort and practise in the arts of Speech, Drama, Singing and Instrumental Music. The concert brought together a beautiful evening of song, music, drama and poetry as award winners performed on stage. Féile Luminigh winners were awarded bursaries to support their continued education in their discipline of choice.

A Pathway to Cultural Confidence – Update on investment 2014-2019

Limerick Culture and Arts prepared a presentation for Full Council on 25 March 2019. The presentation covered the period from the designation of Limerick as the first National City of Culture in 2014 (a yearlong programme of cultural events and engagement), the Limerick 2020 bid for European Capital of Culture up to the recently established Cultural SPC with an overview of achievements through investment in Culture. Cultural investment has proved to be a powerful agent of solidarity for Limerick, has helped deliver on the revitalisation of Limerick, has supported Limerick's tourism offer and now, culture as a shared resource is energising and enabling the USP of Limerick City and County Council's collective ambition.

Health and Wellbeing

- The following Limerick community groups completed their activities funded with 2018-2019 Round 2 Healthy Ireland funding: Athea Arts and Crafts Group, Rathkeale Traveller Women's Group and Ballysteen Tidy Village Association.
- Limerick City and County Council, through Healthy Limerick, was represented on the judging panel at this year's UL Health Fusion Team Challenge. The challenge assists third level medical students to enhance their ability to work in multi-disciplinary teams when caring for people with complex or chronic healthcare needs.
- A multi-agency meeting was held to progress the action to support Tobacco Free Ireland in Limerick. The action supports the de-normalisation of smoking and protecting children from second-hand smoke.
- Limerick City and County Council was represented through Healthy Limerick at the March meeting of UL Hospitals Group Healthy Ireland Steering Group and at the annual members meeting of the Healthy Cities and Counties Network.

Age Friendly Programme

- Experts from Cliffrun Media held the 4th Acorn
 Tablet IT skills workshop in Newcastle West which
 was attended by 30 participants, the aim was to
 further enhance the IT skills of those on the Acorn
 Smart Ageing Tablet trial.
- Limerick was represented at a two day workshop for Age Friendly Programme Managers.
- Limerick was represented at a planning meeting with regard to the National Convention of Older Peoples Councils, taking place this year in Donegal in May.
- A meeting was held between Age Friendly Limerick and the local Library service to advance plans for Age Friendly Libraries in the City and County, following training on Age Friendly Libraries provided by Age Friendly Ireland.
- PLACE EE, An intergenerational workshop (workshop 9 of 12) took place on the 6 March 2019 with 29 participants in attendance. The younger participants helped the older participants to become more connected by learning computer, internet and digital competencies through skills exchange.
- PLACE EE, Intergenerational workshop
 (workshop 10 of 12) was held in Engine and had
 34 participants. It focused on cultural heritage
 and storytelling. The younger participants aided
 the older cohort to use web browsers to search
 for information pertaining to their interests, the
 participants were split into small groups and began
 work on individual projects.
- PLACE EE, The full group of participants (60) met in the Longcourt Hotel (workshop 11 of 12) on the 28 March 2019. Each group finished their individual projects which related to a cultural/heritage interest. A videographer was on site to capture the stories, songs, dance and interviews. This information is currently being collated and edited and will be uploaded to a cultural archive (online platform) to showcase the diverse and rich culture from the Republic of Ireland, along with our international partners from Iceland, Northern Ireland and Sweden.
- PLACE EE, A transnational report on the service provisions for older people living in rural, sparsely populated regions was completed.



 A PLACE – EE international workshop was held in Enniskillen 19-21 March 2019, attended by partners from Limerick, representing the Republic of Ireland, along with our international partners from Iceland, Northern Ireland and Sweden. Representatives from Limerick made a presentation to the international project partners at the event giving an update on work completed and research data gathered in the Limerick demonstrator area to date. The purpose of Learning Limerick is to work in partnership with relevant stakeholders to:

- Promote awareness of the importance of lifelong learning for every person, family, community and workplace in Limerick.
- Influence education and skills policy: locally, nationally and internationally.
- Position learning at the centre of development planning in the Limerick region, in all communities, sectors and settings.

Signing the MOU are the six core funding partners:

- · Limerick City and County Council.
- Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board.
- PAUL Partnership.
- University of Limerick.
- Mary Immaculate College.
- Limerick Institute of Technology.

The launch of the Learning Limerick Ambassadors also took place on 7 March 2019.

The ambassadors are a diverse group of individuals, who themselves have demonstrated that learning is for people of all ages and from all areas. They have a wide variety of needs and interests. Their main role is to help reach as many people as possible and inspire them to participate in learning, through promoting the idea of lifelong learning in their own communities, workplaces and neighbourhoods.

Plans are advancing for the 2019 Lifelong Learning Festival, taking place from 8–14 April 2019. Limerick City and County Council, as one of the groups supporting the festival, is represented on the organising committee, which met twice in March.

Integration

- A deputation from the Sikh community, supported by the Thematic Programmes team, addressed the March Newcastle West Municipal district meeting. A presentation on the life and work of local Templeglantine man Max Arthur Macauliffe was made and the Councillors support was sought for the hosting of a number of events to celebrate the life and contribution of Max Arthur MacAuliffe to Sikh culture and religion. The Councillors agreed unanimously to support the events scheduled to take place later this year.
- A representative of Limerick City and County Council was interviewed as part of a European study on impacts of Refugees and Asylum Seekers in European Territories.

Education

Learning Limerick has announced a further commitment to advancing Limerick's progress as a Learning Region. A partners' Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed on Thursday, 7 March 2019. This agreement is a strong statement of their intent to support the UNESCO Learning City-Region initiative for Limerick. All of the organisations involved in Learning Limerick work together to promote awareness of the importance of lifelong learning, and to influence education and skills policy on a local, national and international level.

They also seek to position learning at the centre of development planning in the Limerick region in all communities, sectors and settings. Learning Limerick is a member of the UNESCO Global Network of Learning Cities, which is an international policyoriented network providing inspiration, know-how and best practice.

Limerick Community Development Committee

The March meeting of the LCDC took place on Tuesday, 5 March 2019. €10,000 in funding has been allocated to Limerick Local Community Development Committee (LCDC)/Local Authority area. It is intended that small grants of about €100-€400 per event will be available from the LCDC. The closing date is Thursday 4 April 2019. The Big Hello! National Community Weekend 4-6 May 2019 was communicated on 26 March 2019. The event is about local communities coming together and organising events centred around food, sport, the environment or health and culture. The event is a celebration of the great spirit of community that exists across the country and an effort to help people who share communities to come together, get to know each other and deepen the sense of community in their area.

CLÁR Funding 2019

The CLÁR 2019 Scheme was communicated in local press and media on 21 March 2019. The CLÁR programme is a targeted investment programme which provides funding for small scale infrastructural projects in rural areas that have suffered the greatest levels of population decline. The aim of CLÁR is to support the sustainable development of identified CLÁR areas by attracting people to live and work there. The funding works in conjunction with local funding and on the basis of locally identified priorities. Limerick City and County Council has invited applications from Schools/Community Groups and Local Development Companies, for projects within the designated CLÁR areas, in respect of Support for Schools/Community Safety measures, Play Areas (including Multi-Use Games Areas) and Community Wellbeing Supports - Sensory Gardens. The closing date is 16 April 2019.

Environmental Awareness

- Limerick City and County Council Tidy Towns
 Seminar took place on 11 March 2019 with over
 100 Tidy Towns volunteers attending. This also
 involved a radio Interview on 104 West Limerick re
 the Tidy Towns Seminar. Dr. Christy Boylan gave a
 presentation on an overview of Tidy Towns with
 particular emphasis on landscaping.
- Think Exhibition the Think exhibition by students from the Limerick College of Further Education was launched in the City Library on the 28 March 2019. This exhibit highlights our dependence on single use items such as coffee cups and asks us to change to reusable items.
- International Women's Day presentation on the environment was given to the Federation of ICA guilds (ICA groups from across the city and county) and to active retirement groups in Castleconnell, Adare and the Probus group.

Limerick Sports Partnership

- AGM held in March and the key findings from the LSP annual review showed the following:
 - €900.000 secured in 2018.
 - €400,000 secured locally from partner organisations.



- €137,000 secured in BIK.
- LSP delivered 132 courses and workshops to 3,761 participants in 2018.
- LSP hosted 58 events for 5,683 participants.
- LSP delivered 160 physical activity programmes and interventions to 11,247 participants.
- LSP delivered 5,684 volunteer hours back to communities through mentoring and leadership programmes.
- Limerick Sports Partnership hosted the Primary Schools Sports Hall Athletics and Get Going Get Rowing Limerick finals for 1,100 pupils.
- Woodlands For Health Walking programme has continued with Limerick Mental Health and Get Ireland Walking at key locations across the county.
- The LSP has placed 70 Physical Education undergraduates in 22 clubs and community groups promoting and developing physical activity programmes. Placement lasts for seven weeks.
- 25 schools have joined the LSP Great Limerick Run training programme in association with LIT students getting kids ready for the GLR Kids Run in May.

The LSP sports development officers continue to develop programmes for key target groups, Men – 30 to 65, Women – 30 to 65, marginalised communities, walking groups and general populations across the county. See www.limericksports.ie for more information.

3. Libraries, Gallery & Museum

Library Services

- Events to mark World Book Day, International Women's Day, St. Patrick's Day and Healthy Ireland at your Library programme were held in all main library branches throughout the month of March.
- On Friday 8 March 2019, the "100 Years of Women in Politics & Public life, 1918-2018" exhibition was launched by the Library and Museum service on International Women's Day at Merchant's Quay with over 190 people attending on the day. This major travelling national exhibition was curated by Irish historian and author Sinéad McCoole and gave a fresh and exciting insight into the experience of

- women in public life over the past century. It was a huge success and was viewed by over 1,750 visitors over its six-week run.
- Mental Health Ireland in association with Limerick Library Service Healthy Ireland programme presented a talk and workshop "Five Ways to Wellbeing" by John McElhinney in both Abbeyfeale and Foynes branches. The aim of the very well received talk was to equip participants with the knowledge required to understand and implement actions to support their own mental health and well-being.
- Foynes Library hosted a display from Foynes
 National School of their contribution to Team
 Limerick Clean-up Design a Bottle competition.
- World Book Day on 7 March 2019 was celebrated across all main branches with story sessions quizzes, dressing up as well- known book characters and many other activities designed to promote reading for pleasure.
- 150 children visited Kilmallock Library for activities on World Book Day. This month's Little Readers Workshop on 20 March 2019 focused on the theme of bees, using rhymes, stories, and drawings featuring bees and honey. Digital Skills classes for adults commenced on 5 March 2019 in conjunction with Ballyhoura Development CLG and Bruree IT. International Women's Day was celebrated with a talk to a mixed audience of forty men and women on "Living Life Well" by Eileen Sheehan.
- The regular Parents and Toddler groups marked St. Patrick's Day by wearing green costumes and sings songs and rhymes as Gaeilge.
- Newcastle West Library celebrated International Women's day with an evening of words and song to "inspire and gladden the heart". The line-up included, Anne Phelan from Castlemahon, who has, over the years, delighted and astounded audiences with her violin playing. Anne who is a member of the National Concert Orchestra drew on her extensive repertoire of classical, popular and traditional airs throughout the evening. Also performing was the Desmond School of Music Adult Choir. As the spoken word has played a huge role in women's struggles, to acknowledge this element, poets Jo Slade, Eileen Sheehan and local poet Shirley O'Regan, read from their collections. Jo Slade, a visual artist as well as a poet is a previous winner of the Michael Hartnett Poetry Award. Likewise, Kerry Poet Eileen Sheehan has visited



many schools as writer in residence with Limerick Culture and Arts Department and Shirley O'Regan published her first collection of poetry in 2018. The Library held a capacity audience on the night, accompanied by a wine and roses reception.

- On 7 March 2019, Newcastle West Library in conjunction with West Limerick Resources held a Parent and Baby Information event designed to advise parents and caregivers of the numerous supports and facilities that are available for babies and young children in the West Limerick area. There were demonstrations on baby massage and yoga, fun craft activities for toddlers, advice from a Lactation Consultant as part of Limerick City and County Council's Breastfeeding Friendly policy. Also present were Tusla, Parenting24Seven, Parenting Limerick and Limerick Childcare Committee. An exhibition of recycled metalwork and paintings was on display throughout March.
- Local artist Sahaja Budzilla uses junk metal to create mythical figures of power, grace, humour and beauty. Accompanying these pieces are some lovely paintings captivating the themes of his sculptures. The exhibition is supported by an informative presentation about the artist and his work.
- On Friday 22 March 2019, a painting workshop took place for the Knitting Club and other retired people, Limerick Artist Jean Ryan Hakizamana, demonstrated the skills of painting to the group, each participant completed a painting on canvas, a fantastic achievement, as this was the first attempt for some!
- The History Club from Scoil Mhuire & Ide visited the branch, to do some local history research on the town and surrounding areas.
- On 27 March 2019, The Irish Heart Foundation Mobile Unit visited the Library as part of the Healthy Ireland programme. Free blood-pressure checks and healthy heart information were provided. Queues commenced at early morning and continued throughout the day. The library was delighted with its success and happy to be associated with such a worthwhile project.
- On Tuesday 6 March 2019, the Granary Library hosted a concert by the singer-songwriter, Sarah McQuaid. Recently honoured with a Lifetime Achievement Award by the Ards International Guitar Festival in Northern Ireland, Sarah has also

drawn critical praise for her voice and her engaging rapport with audiences: "I've attended hundreds of concerts of all kinds, and her subtle mastery onstage launches her straight into my fave shows ever," wrote The Huffington Post. The concert was very much enjoyed by the attendance of about 60 people.

- On 21 March 2019, the Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor James Collins, launched the 'Think' exhibition at the Granary Library. Limerick College of Further Education (LCFE) has loaned the 'THINK' campaign to the Library. LCFE wanted to implement a better, cleaner, greener environment and the AD2, Art and Design group was asked to help in promoting this message in an awareness raising exercise and as a way of promoting a greener alternative for the college community. The THINK project group focused their campaign on recycling and on the increased use of single use throw away items such as coffee cups and plastic drink bottles. The installation is, of course, made entirely from recycled material. The exhibition runs through the first week of April.
- The Gramophone Circle had their monthly meeting on the 4 March 2019 and then on Friday 15 March 2019, Jack Little was the special guest presenter at the Rock Record Club. Jack played a very interesting array of music which was thoroughly enjoyed by all involved.
- Watch House Cross Library in collaboration with Salmon's Wake and the Ilen project held a very interesting series of evets in March. Salmon's Wake is a community educational programme, with a specific focus on the creation of a dynamic learning environment around the Atlantic Wild Salmon of the Shannon River, and their lamentable decline along with an age-old culture and industry they sustained. The programme is designed to cultivate positive relationships between the youth of Limerick, Ireland and those of Greenland. Watch House Cross Library hosted display panels from the Ilen Restoration Project and workshops with children from Thomond Primary and CBS Sexton St. This involved building replica Angling Cots and designing postcards to send to schoolchildren in Nuuk, Greenland. The Ilen is travelling 2,222 nautical mile from Limerick Docks to Nuuk Port, Greenland. The Ilen's progress can be tracked in real time by visitors to the library.
- WHC Junior Book Club met on 1 March 2019 and Moyross Threads held their Easter Craft Fair in the



- library on 27 and 28 March 2019 with all proceeds going to Down Syndrome Limerick.
- On the 21 March 2019, the library hosted the first of a 10-week iPad class for seniors.
- Dooradoyle Library continued its programme of book clubs, story sessions, and meditation classes.

Limerick Museum

- Limerick Museum received 2,598 visitors in March 2019.
- The exhibitions 'Women in Politics and Public Life, 1918-2018', 'Limerick's 130 Years of All-Ireland Successes' and 'Visible Reminders of Invisible Light' continued throughout the whole of March.
- Limerick Museum acquired two collections of lace in March. It received the Florence Vere O'Brien Collection of Limerick Lace on long-term loan from Veronica Rowe, the most important collection of Limerick Lace in private ownership. The Museum also acquired a collection of lace from the Carmelite Convent, Delgany, County Wicklow.
- Friends of Limerick Lace Group held a meeting in the Museum on 14 March 2019.

Limerick City Gallery of Art (LCGA)

- Siobhan McDonald's Crystalline: Hidden
 Monuments, exhibition ended on 24 March 2019.
 The exhibition in LCGA is a Creative Ireland
 commission to address the late prehistory (Bronze
 Age) linear earthworks in Ireland called the Black
 Pig's Dyke. In this new project, titled 'Hidden
 Monuments', McDonald presents a series of artistic
 enquiries to remind us of the Cairns, standing
 stones and Megalithic structures that foreshadow
 our architectural histories.
- Siobhan McDonald was in conversation with Ann Mulrooney, Director of the Science Gallery, Dublin and Sarah McCutcheon, Executive Archaeologist, Limerick City and County Council on 20 March 2019. This wide- ranging discussion was attended by approx. 40 people with very positive interaction between the audience and the panel.

- The Irish World Academy of Music and Dance (MA in song writing and community music) held two sessions in the Gallery in March, which culminated with a series of performances by the students in response to McDonald's exhibition. It is proposed to continue this collaboration in the next academic year.
- Anita Groener's, The Past is a Foreign Country, exhibition received an Arts Council Touring and Dissemination Award managed by LCGA and closed at The Dock, Carrick-on- Shannon on 9 March 2019. It will tour to The Lab, Dublin and Uilinn, Skibbereen, Cork in 2019.
- Advertisement for the Shinnors Scholar 2019-2021 has a closing date of 31 March 2019. This will provide a graduate student with the possibility of doing a practice based MA while based at LCGA.
- Limerick born singer songwriter, Johnny Duhan launched his book in the Gallery on 14 March 2019 and held a concert on Thursday 28 March 2019.
- LCGA's visitor attendance for March 2019 was over 5,322.
- LCGA weekend workshops for children, ArtSpace, finished on 16 March 2019.
- LCGA continues to negotiate the use of the HUB with local groups for workshops and events and hosted an event for the launch of Adapt House film and exhibition on Thursday, 7 March 2019 to coincide with International Women's Day.
- LCGA hosted a meeting on Friday 29 March 2019 for the Office of Government Procurement to launch their strategy.
- Monday 4 -15 March Screening of film, 'FREE' for Adapt House.
- 4 and 11 March 2019, Irish Chamber Orchestra workshops in response to LCGA Exhibition by Siobhan McDonald.
- Limerick Art Society held their second workshop 21 March 2019, featuring a demonstration by Thomas Ryan, RHA.

- A QQI Fire Fighting Skills course was ran by Limerick Fire Service for recruit firefighters from across the country. Limerick had four recruits on this course, all of whom successfully completed the course and will now progress to their Initial Breathing Apparatus Wearers Course.

- Transition year students from across the county attended a one-week Fire Service Skills course in Limerick City Fire Station, which was delivered by Fire Service Personnel. This course covered skills such as first aid, fire extinguisher training, knowledge of Road Traffic Collision techniques and Fire Service Operations. The course was a great success and well done to all involved.



Register of Electors

Minister for Housing, Planning and Local Government, Eoghan Murphy has made the orders appointing Friday, 24 May 2019 as the polling day for the European Parliament Elections and Local Elections. Work on the Supplement to the Register of Electors has commenced, with applications for additions to the Supplement to the Register of Electors now been accepted.

Customer Services

March saw Customer Services aid the facilitation of the new Choice Based Letting (CBL) Scheme pilot in Newcastle West by handling queries in relation to same at first point of contact. The Housing Development Directorate and Housing Support Services Department held information sessions with Customer Services staff in advance of 'go live'. Frequently Asked Questions with a procedure for handling queries was devised to enable Customer Services to handle customer queries. On 29 March - 'go live' day, Customer Services handled in excess of 130 telephone calls and approximately 50 counter queries regarding the scheme.

During March, Customer Services staff continued in support and training in the use of the SugarCRM, (Customer Relationship Management) System. Also, during the month, staff continued meeting and supporting Councillors regarding management of their representations via the My Limerick online platform on the Council website, www.limerick.ie.

Customer Services received 12,815 calls via our call centre throughout the month, handling 41% of calls at first point of contact.

This works out at approximately 640 calls per day.

As well as logging 83% of housing maintenance cases for the North Operational Division, Customer Services also logged 55 cases for housing maintenance in both the West and South Operational Divisions.

In March, there were 621 cases logged on behalf of elected representatives by Customer Services.

Overall, on the SugarCRM (Customer Relationship Management) System, 3,084 cases were logged throughout March, 60% of these being logged by Customer Services in both our Merchant's Quay and Dooradoyle offices.

The majority of cases logged were for the following services;

- Operations and Maintenance: 2,157 (60% being housing maintenance)
- Housing Support Services: 415
- Planning and Environmental Services: 200
- Customer Services: 84
- Design and Delivery: 72
- Veterinary: 35

The total number of callers to our counters at Merchant's Quay and Dooradoyle was 2,832.

4. Business Improvement

- Residential Parking Permits (RPP) were identified as a pilot project for the new "Service Design" methodology.
