6. +CityxChange

 As part of the +CityxChange EU project the Urban Innovation Department hosted a series of Community Participation events. This series of events was the latest in the series City Engage weeks which commenced in 2017. The theme of the week's events was Limerick Laneways collective thinking and action.

Eight events were hosted in the newly opened Citizens Observatory on Rutland Street and included: community mapping of the laneways of the city centre; a sensor making workshop; fire safety in historic buildings and a creative play workshop aimed at children. The week culminated in the hosting of a night of fun activities around the idea of creating a positive energy city to coincide with Culture Night.

In excess of 900 people attended the events over the week making it the most successful engage week to date. Another week of events are being planned to coincide with Riverfest in May as part of creating a Smart Positive Energy City.

• Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) is a precommercial procurement that enables public bodies to purchase research to stimulate innovation that addresses identified citizen need. Over the course of the last 12 months, the Urban Innovation Department has with the support of Enterprise Ireland managed an SBIR process centred on the challenge of fire safety in historic buildings. The process culminated in the selection of one company to potentially develop a "smart" solution to support the challenges of fire safety in the historic building stock that predominate in the city centre.

Safecility was selected to proceed to phase 2 of the process where they will test and develop an automated building safety product that can support the refurbishment of buildings in the city centre and to bring them back into residential use.

The project has been supported by; Innovate Limerick, Local Enterprise Office, Dublin City Council, Digital Services, Limerick City and County Council as well the Fire Service and the Conservation Office.

Tourism

Tourism Promotion Event

Limerick City and County Council attended a twinning event at the German Ambassador's residence in Dublin to promote Limerick as a tourist destination. Limerick is twinned with Hohenlohe; which is a district in Baden-Wurttemberg, Southern Germany. Limerick has been twinned with Hohenlohe since 1990 and delegations travel between both areas on a regular basis.

EU MMIAH Project

Limerick City and County Council attended an EU project partner meeting in La Rochelle as part of the MMIAH project. MMIAH is an Interreg funded project under the Atlantic Area Programme, focused on the tourism potential of the shared military, maritime and industrial heritage of the Atlantic Area. Limerick City and County Council has secured funding to carry out restoration work on the canal harbour buildings on the Park Canal through participation in the MMIAH project.

Open Calls

Open Call Individual Artist Bursaries

On 4 October, Limerick City and County Council announced an open call for the Individual Arts Bursary Awards Scheme, inviting applications from professional artists who wish to be considered for a Bursary of up to €4,000 for the development of work/ professional skills. Artists based in Limerick City and County Council's administrative area, or operating substantially within Limerick City and County can apply for a Bursary in multiple art forms, including Visual Arts, Circus, Dance and Literature. A total budget of €20,000 is available in the grant scheme. The closing date for applications was 31 October.

Open Call Dolores O'Riordan Music Bursary

On 9 October, Limerick City and County Council announced an open call for applications to the new Dolores O'Riordan Music Bursary, to support professional musicians to develop their artistic practice. Dolores O'Riordan, singer, songwriter and lead vocalist with The Cranberries, was one of Ireland's

most enduringly popular artists. This music bursary is an award to honour her memory and to support a Limerick professional musician to develop their career. Applications from professional musicians who wish to be considered for a Bursary of up to €4,000 for the development of work/professional skills. Artists based in Limerick City and County Council's administrative area, or operating substantially within Limerick City and County can apply for a Bursary. The closing date for applications was 31 October.

Open Call Short Film Bursaries

On 8 October, Limerick City and County Council announced an open call for applications to Limerick Film Bursaries Scheme 2019. Limerick-based filmmakers were invited to submit applications for the Limerick Short Film Bursary - €8,000 (2 Awards Available). In light of the development of Troy Studios, Limerick Film Bursaries aim to support professional Limerick-based filmmakers, established and emerging in all genres, to foster and support the development of original film production. The closing date for applications was 31 October.

Open Call Stony Thursday Book

On 1 October, The Stony Thursday Book Open Call was issued seeking submissions from local, national and international poets for its next issue, to be published in Winter 2019. The Stony Thursday Book is one of the longest-running literary journals in Ireland and celebrates its 43rd edition in 2019. This year's Editor of the Stony Thursday Poetry Book is poet and writer Martin Dyar and as part of our digital development this year, submissions to Stony Thursday are through an online system. Closing date was 23 October.

Open Call Tyrone Guthrie

The applications that responded to the open call for a bursary to undertake a one-week residency at the Tyrone Guthrie Centre at Annaghmakerrig in Co. Monaghan were assessed by a panel on 7 October. Three successful applications were recommended. All applicants have been notified in writing of the outcome of the assessment process.

Open Call Words Ireland

Following an Open Call managed by Words Ireland, Limerick poet Paul McNamara has been selected to be the Limerick City and County Council Culture and



Arts Department mentee. The mentoring process involves four two-hour meetings between the selected 'mentee' and their chosen professional writer. The mentor will read up to 10,000 words of the mentee's writing in advance of each meeting and share their hard earned critical feedback and advice. The work in progress of the mentee is discussed in depth. The hope is that the chosen mentees will go on to write great works of literature to match or beat the quality of their mentors. It's a form of peer to peer teaching that is increasingly popular across all sectors of Irish life in industry as well as the arts. The National Mentoring Programme, run by Words Ireland with support from the Arts Council and a number of city and county Arts Offices, Centres and Libraries, aims to develop the best new talent on the Irish literary scene, which many say is undergoing a prolonged golden age.

Strategic Fund for Culture and Arts Scheme 2019

Festivals funded by Limerick City and County Council

Festivals in Limerick come in all shapes and sizes and cater to all tastes, no matter how eclectic or niche. This October was certainly alive and kicking with a wide range to choose from.

Éigse Michael Hartnett Literary and Arts Festival (3 to 5 October)

Éigse Michael Hartnett 2019, which took place in Newcastle West, Co Limerick from 3-5 October this year, marked the 20th anniversary of Michael Hartnett's death in October 1999. But his poems remain and two decades after his death, remain as compelling and as fresh as ever and it is this legacy which is celebrated through Eigse Michael Hartnett. This year, to mark the 20th anniversary, Limerick City and County Council in conjunction with the local

Eigse Michael Hartnett committee brought together a great gathering of poets and musicians in tribute. The list of poets that attended this year's Eigse is long and distinguished. Nuala Ní Dhomhnaill Paddy Bushe, Paula Meehan, Theo Dorgan, James Harpur, Eileen Sheahan, Doireann Ní Ghríofa, Gabriel Fitzmaurice, Jo Slade, Máighréad Medbh and Edward O'Dwyer.

Make A Move

(4 - 6 October)

The Make A Move Festival, celebrating street generated culture and urban art, returned to Limerick City for its eighth year in 2019 with a range of Events which ran from 4-6 October. Make A Move seeks to engage young people by showcasing young Limerick artists as well as celebrating the wide range of diverse cultures and ethnic backgrounds from the city and beyond.

Bualadh Bos Children's Festival (6 – 19 October)

Bualadh Bos Children's Festival, Limerick's annual arts festival dedicated to children, took place in the Lime Tree and Belltable from 6-19 October. This, Limerick's only arts festival dedicated to children, captures the imagination of young audiences through music, theatre, book readings and more. The festival opened in the Belltable with Branar's Rocking Rhymes, Graffiti presented their new work This Girl Laughs, this Girl Cries, This Girl does Nothing, and Redbridge Arts with Stick by Me by Andy Manley, The Dig by artist Paul Curley touring with the support of Arts Council funding. Two productions toured to schools during Bualadh Bos Festival – Kyle Riley's Little Folk on Tour and Oskar's Amazing Adventure by Theatre Fideri (UK).

Joyce Brothers Weekend (11 – 13 October)

Joyce Brothers Music Festival commemorates and keeps alive the memory and spirit of the Joyce Brothers in the local area of Kilfinane. The weekend festival included historical walks and talks on the history of the locality during the Joyce Brothers era, live concerts and Seisiún traidisiúnta, exclusive workshops and guided tours of the beautiful Ballyhoura area.



Garry McMahon Singing Weekend (18 – 20 October)

The 11th Garry McMahon Annual Singing Weekend took place in Abbeyfeale over the weekend of 18-20 October. This weekend of traditional singing and storytelling sessions, newly composed ballad competition, and a bus tour of local heritage areas around Abbeyfeale.

Open House Limerick 2019 (17 – 20 October)

OpenHouse Limerick is an architectural weekend offering the public the chance to visit outstanding buildings and spaces, and meet the people who design, build and occupy Limerick, all completely free of charge. OpenHouse Limerick took place from the 17-20 October and is run by a voluntary, not-for-profit committee, who organise the programme of building tours, guided walks, talks and other events each year.

Richard Harris International Film Festival (RHIFF) (22 – 28 October)

The Richard Harris International Film Festival 2019 is based in Limerick City, home of the legendary actor Richard Harris. The festival is a showcase for a wide variety of premieres and documentaries live script readings, acting masterclasses and more. Two films, "Told you" (Made Image Films) and "Everything looks better in the sunshine" (PIO Media), supported by the Limerick City and County Council Short Film Bursary Award (2019) premiered at the festival in the Belltable as part of the RHIFF.

Samhain, Limerick's Halloween Festival (24 – 26 October)

Award winning Lumen Street Theatre brought the second Samhain, Limerick's Halloween Festival, back to the streets of medieval Limerick in October. Samhain festival culminated with a light filled lantern parade on Nicholas Street on 26 October. On the night The Bishop's Lady rose once again to roam the medieval streets of Limerick City, haunting all who gather before her. This bespoke festival celebrates local folklore and traditions through talks and workshops, and fun educational events for children that will include spooky storytelling, all set within this ancient part of the city. This magical time of year included a fire performance, a Death Café by Jennifer Moran Stritch in Jack Monday's, talks based on the philosophy behind 'Pagan Rave' by Billy Mag Fhloinn in Ormston

House, traditional stories by Eddie Lenihan and an evening plunge into the cool waters of our city's River Shannon by SwimableLimerick.

St. Martin's Fair (28 – 31 October)

St Martin's Fair is an International, interdisciplinary conference at multiple venues on King's Island. This conference, based around the medieval manuscript known as the Black Book of Limerick. Over three days various themes celebrating Limerick's medieval urban history were covered. There was also a tour of King John's Castle, a concert of medieval music in St Mary's Cathedral and presentations on medieval sailing routes and Viking boat building techniques.

Viva la Vida

(25 - 26 October)

Limerick's first Latin American festival, ¡Viva la Vida!, took place from 25-26 October throughout the city. The aim of the festival is to highlight Latin American culture through educational events, community workshops and live music and dance performances that will educate and entertain.

European Projects

TRAINART is a Creative Europe Project designed to implement a capacity building programme for cultural operators to develop new skills and new business models in two specific performing arts sectors: (i) New management models for cultural spaces; and (ii) Live performances/artistic interventions in nonconventional frameworks. TRAINART will organise a blended training programme for cultural operators consisting of 60 online training hours and of 60 onsite training hours through several Training Hotspots to be organised across Europe. The first partner meeting took place in Ancona in Italy from 28-30 October. Limerick City and County Council is an associate partner and will welcome the partners to Limerick in May 2020 for training.

School of Participation is a Creative Europe Project that will provide capacity building opportunities for creative practitioners to give them the confidence to work in participatory practice. This project is a follow on project from the 2019 School of Spectacle, and will



provide opportunities for Limerick based creatives to participate in learning schools in Graz, Coventry and Kaunas. Artists will be invited to apply for the opportunity through open calls. Limerick City and County Council is an associate partner in the project. The first partner meeting took place in Rijeka, Croatia in October.

Programming

County Limerick Youth Theatre

The County Limerick Youth Theatre workshops for the DynaLyts (2nd-6th class) and CoLYTS (secondary school students) took place on 1, 8, 15, 22 October at the HoneyFitz Theatre, Lough Gur.

Limerick Youth Choir

An open call for new members of the Limerick Youth Choir was announced in October. This choir is for those aged 16-28 and meets weekly during term times to learn a diverse repertoire of songs from all over the world, spanning many centuries, with the expert tuition of Choral Director Marie Keary Scanlon.

Castleconnell Concert Series

Introduced by Liz Nolan, RTÉ Lyric FM, the Castleconnell Autumn Concert Series is a Limerick Culture and Arts Department initiative in collaboration with the Castleconnell Concert Committee, and cofunded by the Arts Council, as a part of delivering a shared strategic action of Rural Arts and Excellence. Camerata Kilkenny with Maria Keohane – soprano, Maya Homburger - baroque violin, Sarah McMahon - baroque cello and Malcolm Proud - organ. A programme of sublime music from two different cultures - cantatas by Johann Sebastian Bach and folk hymns from Sweden will be performed by the internationally acclaimed Swedish soprano Maria Keohane and members of the renowned Irish Early Music ensemble, Camerata Kilkenny.

Integrated Dance

The Integrated Dance programme, with dance artist Mary Hartney at the West Limerick Children's Services, began with an information meeting for parents and guardians on 22 October. The aim of this project is to introduce participants to dance as an art form whilst facilitating active and productive engagement in dance activities amongst disabled and non-disabled participants.

Projects

Helium Arts

In October Helium Arts facilitated another set of weekly Saturday workshops over five weeks in Watch House Cross Library, with 5-8 year olds attending in the morning and 9-12 year olds attending in the afternoon. Medical cover is provided by a trained professional at the workshops. One child even remarked, "I never get the chance to paint." 'You have inspired them to make a lot of stuff at home. (My other son) has also blossomed here. Usually he is very concerned about (my son with illness) and he is the one who gets all the attention.' (Mother).

Culture and Arts Department Art Collection

The preparation for loaning a number of works to University Hospital Limerick are underway, with the works being valued and a number of works framed. Members of the UL Hospitals Committee made the selection for exhibition.

Creative Ireland

Kilfinane Community Art Exhibition

This exhibition showcased the work of community members in the Kilfinane Community Council's Art, Craft and Traditional Skills group. The group revived traditional skills of working with wool and gave them a new twist in an art project this summer. The group processed raw sheep and alpaca fleeces direct from the farm, into a fine quality, multicoloured art material. Under the guidance of Limerick textile artist Karen Cunneen-Bilbow, ten community members then learnt to 'paint with wool'. The result is a series of wool paintings, "Postcards from the Ballyhouras", which were on display at Molly's Restaurant in Kilfinane from 9-18 October.

Local Creative Youth Partnership

The first meeting of the Limerick Local Creative Youth Partnership (LCYP) Steering Committee took place on 22 October. At their core, LCYPs are networks which enable information sharing, collaboration between local creative youth service providers to bring about better use of existing resources, practices and initiatives in an ETB area. A coordinator has been appointed to deliver the pilot project that Limerick and Clare ETB was successful in securing funding for as part of the Creative Youth Plan from Creative Ireland.



Art Expo

Down Syndrome Limerick held the launch of DSL Calendar 2020 and Art Work Expo in the church in the Limerick School of Art and Design on Clare Street, on 23 October. The art work in the art expo was created by the children and young teens as part of the creation of a 2020 calendar.

Open House Architectural Treasure Hunt

OpenHouse Limerick's first Architectural Treasure Hunt is a project grounded in the understanding and appreciation of Limerick's architectural heritage. Its aim was to provide a fun and engaging experience that promotes curiosity, architectural appreciation and strengthens key competencies relating to STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art & design and maths). The treasure hunt took up to 15 stops of architectural heritage in Limerick city, with children between 4-12 years, allowing the whole family enjoy a day out on Saturday 19 October.

Thematic Programmes

PPN

On 30 October, elections took place for the new 10 person Secretariat of Limerick PPN. Fifteen nominations were received in advance of the meeting, and each nominee was afforded the opportunity to address the plenary in advance of voting taking place. Following completion of the voting process, one representative of each of the four municipal districts was elected to the Secretariat, together with two community reps, two environment reps and two social inclusion reps. A meeting of the new Secretariat is scheduled to take place to begin the process of establishing Linkage Groups and seeking nominations to fill the vacant PPN seats on the five Council Strategic Policy Committees (SPCs).

COMHAIRLE NA NÓG

The Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Michael Sheahan formally opened the annual AGM for Comhairle na nÓg on 24 October in the University of Limerick. 150 young people from local secondary schools and youth groups across Limerick attended this AGM. A Comhairle na nÓg Committee was elected. This committee will be responsible for leading out on the topics picked at the AGM and is the consultative forum that works with decision-makers. Limerick City and County Council chairs the Comhairle na nÓg steering group.



Age Friendly Programme

On 2 October, the Age Friendly Programme Manager presented at the 8th International Age Forum in Dubai, United Arab Emirates. The theme for the Forum was "Empowerment and Effective Participation of Older People." 600 delegates from around the world were in attendance.

On 3 October, the Age Friendly Programme Manager hosted a half day workshop on Age Friendly Ireland and Age Friendly Limerick for 50 members of the Government of Sharjah, United Arab Emirates.

On 8 October, the Thematic Programmes team attended a meeting of NOPAG (Northside Older Peoples Advisory Group)

On 15 October, a meeting of the Older Peoples Executive was held in the Council Chamber, Merchant's Quay.

On 16 October, the Thematic Programmes team hosted a half day information session on the Limerick Age Friendly Programme. The event was launched by Deputy Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Adam Teskey,, and Catherine Mc Guigan, Chief Officer of Age Friendly Ireland. They were joined by the Limerick Age Friendly Programme Manager in presenting on the work undertaken to date on both the national and local programmes, together with details of the Age Friendly Limerick projects to be rolled out in the coming months. An exhibition area hosted information stands from fifteen exhibitors and more than 100 Older People from across the county and city attended the event.

On the 17 October thematic programmes team hosted the Place EE showcase event. This event was launched by Deputy Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Adam Teskey and included keynote presentations from Catherine Mc Guigan, Chief Officer of Age Friendly Ireland, Fiona Harkin, on behalf of the Projects lead partner, Ulster University and Anne Rizzo, Regional Age Friendly Manager. Over 100 people attended the event from the Newcastle West/ Adare Rathkeale areas. The event included exhibitions from the Newcastle West Library, Task, the Homeshare, the Crafty Angels, Limerick Sports Partnership, Community Gardai, Newcastle West Adult Education Centre, Tait House and the HSE.

On 22 October, the Age Friendly Programme Manager, presented on the national, regional and Limerick Age Friendly Programme activities to the Galway City and Galway County Age Friendly Programmes and Older Peoples Councils. 100 Older People from across Galway county and city attended.

On 24 October, the Age Friendly Programme Manager, together with the Chair of the Limerick Older Peoples Executive, hosted a stand at the "Connecting for Life" Roadshow event in Newcastlewest. The event is the first in a series of events being hosted across all municipal districts in the coming months.

On 30 October, Limerick City and County Council hosted a Halloween Tea Dance at Thomond Park, in collaboration with St. Munchin's Age Friendly Community Centre. 250 older people from across the county and city attended the event.

INTEGRATION

On 9 October, Limerick City and County Council hosted a meeting of the Migrant Integration Strategy sub-group tasked with implementing theme 4 of "Belonging to Limerick," Cultural Awareness and Anti-Racism. The group consists of staff of Limerick City and County Council, An Garda Síochána, Doras Luimní and Limerick Youth Service and its focus is to advance cultural awareness and anti-racism through schools education programmes, advertising campaigns and training programmes for front line staff.

EDUCATION

An invitation was extended by UNESCO, for the Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Michael Sheahan, along with representatives of the Learning Limerick steering group, to participate in the fourth International Conference on Learning Cities. The conference theme was 'Inclusion – A principle for lifelong learning and sustainable cities' and was held in Medellín, Colombia, from 1-3 October. The President of Colombia, Iván Duque Márquez, opened the conference on 1 October together with David Atchoarena (UNESCO Institute of Lifelong Learning Director), Federico Gutiérrez (Mayor of Medellín, Colombia). Councillor Sarah Kiely, deputising for the Mayor of the City and County of Limerick, Councillor Michael Sheahan, attended along with representitives



of the Learning Limerick Steering Group. The UNESCO Global Network of Learning Cities has 170 active members from 53 countries in every region of the world. Each of these ground-breaking cities in the network has implemented effective lifelong learning policies and practices that support the development of inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable cities and contribute to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The Learning City awards 2019 were delivered to 10 cities who are members of the Network during the conference. The Conference host city Medellin was one of the cities to receive this Learning City Award. Medellin coordinates a number of innovative programmes, including one that has helped to successfully reintegrate over 5,000 school drop-outs by engaging with them on a one-to-one basis. The 'How Are We Doing?' monitoring and evaluation project is another important component of Medellin's learning city initiative. As part of the conference, Councillor Kiely participated in a Mayors' Forum on GNLC strategy (closed session) hosted by speakers David Atchoarena (UNESCO Institute of Lifelong Learning Director), Federico Gutiérrez (Mayor of Medellín, Colombia) and Anne Coupez, (Chief of unit for strategic planning, monitoring UNESCO), following this session, a two-year strategy to enhance further the work of the UNESCO Global Network of Learning Cities was adopted. A fund to support the work of the network was also launched. Councillor Kiely presented at this forum at which Limerick had the opportunity to forge new partnerships that will enhance learning experiences for all people. Limerick has been invited to take on the role of co-ordinating city for the cluster on "Entrepreneurship" and the Learning Limerick steering group is looking forward to sharing experiences on the implementation of local actions and to leading the work of this thematic cluster. The city that Limerick will be working closely with in co-ordinating this cluster is Chengdu city in China. On the afternoon of 2 October, Limerick, represented by Councillor Kiely, formally presented on the theme "Digitally Excluded populations" along with Nam-seok Ko, Mayor, Yeonsu-gu, Incheon metropolitan, Republic of Korea and Ms Catherine Lido, Senior Lecturer, School of Education, Urban Big data Centre, University of Glasgow, UK. The key agencies in Limerick have strong expertise in this area, with Limerick Digital Strategy 2017 – 2020 – Building Ireland's First Digital City being launched by Limerick City and County Council in 2018. Councillor Kiely

presented on the work of the Digital Inclusion working group, which has inter-agency support and agreed terms of reference. Research has been commissioned around some of the key actions that the group has identified, which will focus on the experience of being digitally excluded and aiming to identify appropriate responses at local, regional and national levels; aligned to international best practice. Two site visits were also hosted by Federico Gutiérrez (Mayor of Medellín). Delegates visited an area called Commune 10, La Candelaria, and Commune 13 (San Javier). Both areas have been positively transformed following years of drug related violence.

3. Libraries, Gallery & Museum

Library Services

- Children's Book Festival was celebrated across city and county library branches with authors Gabriel Fitzmaurice, Padraig Kenny, Helena Close, Roisin Meaney and Gillian Perdue meeting large numbers of children, teachers and parents to foster a love of books and reading. Activities ranged from Messy Hands art workshops to spooky Halloween tales to a walk in the woods sponsored by Foras na Gaeilge "Draíocht na gCoille", a walk, talk and workshop on trees, nature and the environment. Creative writing workshops for budding authors also featured.
- Foynes, Glin, Abbeyfeale and Cappamore branches all held events for Children's Book Festival.
 Competitions for designing bookmarks have been run in all other branches with book tokens as prizes.
- The new Sensory Room at Watch House Cross is in huge demand with families and organizations. Thirty-minute sessions can be booked and the uptake is growing. It started with 150 sessions in the first month and it has increased to 170 in the month of October. This space has been designed to help individuals with a variety of sensory and learning challenges, particularly those identified as being on the autism spectrum.
- Decade of Centenaries events continued with talks by historian Dr. John O'Callaghan, author of the book "Limerick: The Irish Revolution 1912-1923, in The Granary, Kilmallock and Newcastle West branches. This informative and illuminating review of this period of conflict focusing on Limerick was very well received by the attentive audiences. For younger historians Brian Gallagher visited Kilmallock Library on 11 October to talk about his books set during the War of Independence in Ireland. His stirring presentation had the audience delighted.
- Kilmallock branch celebrated Space Week 4 11 October by streaming live images from the International Space Station on the large digital screen in children's section of the Library. In association with Blackrock Castle Observatory Cork we promoted the wonders of space with

- stirring images and our collection of space books. Dooradoyle marked it with a display of Space books and a miniature Apollo 11.
- Restorative Practices is an emerging social science, which deals with relationships in all their aspects.
 Building and maintaining them and looking at what to do when things go wrong. Joe Power of Restorative Practices Limerick gave a workshop on the practice at Kilmallock Library on 11 October.
 Joe provided strategies for use in everyday life and there was time for a little fun. This workshop was hosted under the Healthy Ireland at the Library national campaign.
- Room on the Broom, the all-time favourite story for children from Julia Donaldson the writer of the Gruffalo was the focus for our Halloween tales for Children on 24 October in Kilmallock branch. Children from Scoil Mocheallóg read Room on the Broom and Winnie the Witch with creepy sound effects and made some witches wands which everyone got to take home. The Little Readers workshop ran on 16 October for very little ones and their grownups. Marie McElhinney from the Limerick Childcare Committee attended for this month's workshop to share information on the National Childcare Scheme.
- Author Ray Flannery visited Newcastle West and Adare on 9 October where his first publication "Moany Mc Moan", proved very popular with invited class groups.
- On 10 October Killoughteen National School availed of two coding workshops provided free to the library by Mobile IT in Newcastle West Library. These were an outstanding success, as these coding sessions are very popular with primary school classes. In this way, the library can play an active role in empowering future generations in IT. The group learned the basics of coding using Scratch, a visual coding language for children, and designed a digital game of hide and seek.
- On 22 October Fiona Ismail, our colleague from the Granary library gave an outstanding presentation on Dinosaurs; the audience of 26 students were captivated by the talk and slides.
- On 23 October as part of our Foras na Gaeilge events in the branch, the library hosted 'Draíocht na gCoille', a walk, talk and workshop on trees, nature and the environment. It started with a nature trail in the local Demesne, where the



5th class Gaelscoil class, gathered nuts, berries and leaves, then returned to the library for light refreshments, followed by a talk and experiments by Environmentalist Seamus MacConmara. Foras Na Gaeilge sponsored this activity.

- Halloween was celebrated in all main branches with craft activities, spooky story times and dress up opportunities for all. Some sessions using Irish and English were very popular.
- In Watch House Cross Library Niall De Burca, international storyteller launched the Book Festival this year with two fantastic performances attended by 250 children from our local schools and their teachers on 8 October.

- Tallest Smallest Theatre returned on 11 October with two BFG shows and as always was a resounding success with all of the 160 local schoolchildren who were lucky enough to attend these events. Authors Padraig Kenny, Helena Close and Gillian Perdue hosted talks and workshops across the month.
- The Dogs Trust also gave a talk to children from JFK Memorial School. All of the local schools got a chance to bring some of their classes to a Book Festival event ensuring that both teachers and pupils are aware of our many resources and facilities.
- The QQI Learners awards ceremony took place on 15 October and many students collected their certificates for the courses they had completed during the year. There are seven different courses currently running in Watch House Cross Library affording interested patrons the opportunity of upskilling in IT, Web Design and Photoshop.

- 4. Sarah Newell of Housing Development Directorate was a mentor who set the Housing challenge for Limerick's First Climathon, which took place

on 25-26 October at ENGINE on Upper Cecil Street. Participants were presented with the challenge, and worked in teams to come up with solutions, with the best solution winning prizes and developing the idea. 'ReStory' was a project, which won the overall challenge, and now with support seeks to develop a portal to integrate various platforms that highlight vacant buildings in Limerick City and showcase their reuse potential in an effort to de-risk and demystify the process for private sector enablement.

2. Regeneration Strategy Implementation

- An apprentice from Hospitality Education Training Centre, Southill which is partly funded through Limerick Regeneration Social Intervention Fund along with the Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board won SME Training and Apprenticeship Award (European Alliance for Apprenticeships) in Helsinki.
- Tait House, Southill working with the Regeneration has been shortlisted for Best Non-profit at Limerick Chamber Regional Business Awards 2019.
- Moyross Community Enterprise Centre has opened their new community park. It is a wonderful addition to the area. This is part of the Limerick Regeneration Framework Implementation Plan.
- With the help of Limerick Regeneration Our Lady of Lourdes Community Enterprise Centre's have purchased a new community bus to help to service the Community area of Ballinacurra Weston.
- Moyross Motocross Club have organised open days on the Moyross track. They are trying to involve local Red Cross or First Aid groups to attend on the day to cover them for First Aid by way of them using it as a training day plus maybe giving the participants basic instruction of what to do in the event of an accident.
- Nicholas Street has undergone a makeover funded partially by Regeneration – the new paint and murals have received very positive feedback.



Customer Services

On 3 October, Limerick was hit by another orangeweather alert, Storm Lorenzo.

This weather alert saw wind speeds of 65km/h, with gusts of up to 100km/h, causing disruption across Limerick city and county. Throughout the storm, Customer Services' call centre remained open and available to the citizen to support their requests. Customer Services also worked very closely with the Major Emergency Team to ensure essential services continued throughout the city and county.

October also saw the establishment of dedicated Account Managers, who are an additional support to our elected members in accessing the services of the Council. Their role is to work with our colleagues and with our Councillors to ensure requests are answered appropriately and in a timely fashion.

In October, there was 210 cases logged through the MyLimerick platform, 206 of which were logged by local representatives.

Customer Services processed 77 Residential Parking Permits throughout October.

Customer Services also continued to support the Housing Maintenance Department by logging 70% of cases throughout the month of October, as well as logging 53 cases for housing maintenance in the area offices and taking 1,453 calls for Housing Maintenance in October

Customer Services received 12,770 calls via our call centre throughout the month, handling 46% of calls at first point of contact.

This works out at approximately 556 calls per day.

In October, there were 883 cases logged on behalf of elected representatives by Customer Services.

Overall, on the SugarCRM (Customer Relationship Management) System, 3,463 cases were logged throughout October. 68% of these being logged by Customer Services in both our Merchant's Quay and Dooradoyle offices.

5. Business Improvement

- Business Improvement and Corporate Services worked with the Corporate Policy Group and other key stakeholders to assist in the production of a Draft Corporate Plan (2019 -2024) for Limerick City and County Council.
- The Corporate Plan is a strategic framework for actions over a five-year period. It is a central component of our business architecture, linking policy, organisational activity, governance and performance management and actions.
- The Mission Statement, Vision and Values in the Draft Corporate Plan were accompanied by the eight strategic goals of Limerick City and County Council for 2019 to 2024. Each goal is underpinned by a series of objectives.
- In keeping with Business Improvement's intention to engage with citizens, the Corporate Plan was published on "MyPoint", the Council's new online engagement platform. Citizens and staff alike were encouraged to deliver feedback on the Draft Corporate Plan which provided a digital outlet for engagement along with feedback sessions and discussions held with all key stakeholders.
