2. Importance of the Plan

- First consolidated Limerick Development Plan for the new Local Authority
- It will shape the future growth of Limerick for the period of 2022 2028
- A blueprint for Physical, Economic and Social Development of Limerick
- A framework within which sustainable development can be achieved
- Provides strategic framework and policy context for planning decisions

3. Legal Basis for Plan

- The legal basis for the process of making and adopting the development plan is set out in the Planning & Development Act 2000, as Amended.
- The Plan is made by the Elected Members.
- Must be consistent with the National Planning Framework (NPF) and the Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy (RSES).









 Limerick City and County is currently covered by the Limerick City Development Plan 2010 – 2016 (as extended) and the Limerick County Development Plan 2010 – 2016 (as extended) – <u>both of which are out of date</u>;

 The preparation of the Limerick Development Plan 2022 – 2028 is <u>one of the</u> <u>most important functions of the Elected Members</u>,

 The Plan Making process is a <u>99 week process</u> from commencement, the process commenced on 15th August 2020.



- Limerick City Centre
 - Underutilized waterfront, dereliction and vacancy within the City Centre;
 - Traffic, congestion, parking oversupply/undersupply;
 - Need for high quality shops need to rethink retail impact of online shopping;
 - Redevelopment of the Limerick Docks;
 - Georgian Limerick requires immediate action, need additional Colbert Quarter type proposals;
 - Need for compact growth/15 minute neighborhoods;
 - Residential densities need to be more flexible;
 - Need to enhance Limerick as a domestic tourism destination increase the offer in the City and County and enhance the existing offering.

• Towns and villages

- High level of vacancy and dereliction;
- Impact of social housing on towns and villages;
- Need to consider the Settlement Hierarchy in the County Development Plan;
- Residential densities need to be more flexible;
- Need to develop hubs and shared work space in towns and villages;
- Need to develop towns and villages, as tourism destinations Adare, Bruff and Lough Gur.



- Housing
 - Need for Social and Affordable Housing provision in all future developments;
 - Need for housing for elderly/disabled/downsizing schemes;
 - Need for urgent consideration for housing for the homeless;
 - Need to consider universal design in all developments.
 - -- Rural Housing
- Infrastructure
 - Importance of the delivery of strategic road networks N/M20, Foynes to Limerick Road Scheme including Adare Bypass, Limerick Northern Distributor Road, Newcastle West and Abbeyfeale bypasses;
 - Need for more sustainable transport infrastructure options, including public transport,
 - Need for investment in water and wastewater infrastructure in towns and villages;
 - Enhanced rural broadband and digital connectivity.
- Climate Change and Flooding
 - Place Climate Change as a key focus of the Draft Development Plan preparation process;
 - Recognise the importance of Flood Risk Management prepare a Strategic Flood Risk
 Assessment to support the Plan;
 - Address renewable energy in the Draft Development Plan.



- Health and wellbeing shall be the focus of the Limerick Development Plan with inclusive communities and places;
- Need for additional community facilities, including: pools, pitches, concert halls, graveyards, school expansion etc.
- Lack of impact of Limerick Regeneration Plan particularly in area of development and upskilling and education;
- Enhanced social inclusion for all sectors of society with particular focus on travellers and residents of direct provision centers.

• Landscape Heritage and Green Infrastructure

- Recognise the importance of natural environment, biodiversity, architectural conservation, archaeological heritage in the preparation of the Development Plan;
- Need to focus on the development and protection of green and blue infrastructure throughout Limerick;
- Enhance of quality of life for all residents in Limerick improved air and water quality.
- Address public rights of way in the Draft Development Plan;
- Need to address the Circular Economy and waste management.



- Strong emphasis on Health & Wellbeing
- Climate Change and Protecting our Heritage
- 15 minute neighborhood concept
- Addressing underperformance of our Towns & Villages
- Housing –



Direction from Elected Members

Following consideration of the Chief Executives Report, the Elected Members may issue directions to the Chief Executive regarding the preparation of the Draft Development Plan.

These directions must;

- Be strategic in nature and be consistent with the draft core strategy.
- Take account of the <u>statutory obligations</u> of any local authority in the area and any relevant policies or objectives of the Government or of any Minister of Government.
- Be restricted to considering the proper planning and sustainable development of the area to which the development plan relates.



Statutory Obligations

 Section 12 of the Act regarding the making of a development plan, defines <u>Statutory Obligation</u> as including the obligation to ensure that the Development Plan is consistent with;

a) The national and regional objectives specified in:

- I. The National Planning Framework, and
- II. The Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy, and

b) Specific Planning Policy Requirements specified in guidelines under subsection (1) of section 28.
