

## INSTALMENTS OF LOANS

Board of Works Receivable Order No. 37, 25th Sept., applying for the sum of £105 1s 0d., instalments due on foot of Loans. Read.

## J. P. HARTIGAN RE GRAZING OF FAIR GREEN.

Read letter from Mr J P Hartigan asking what allowance is to be made him in respect of the four acres given by the former Council for allotment purposes after his contract had been accepted, also drawing attention to the fact that the Fair Green had become almost a commonage through the trespass of horses and cattle of all descriptions, with the result that he had been compelled to remove his cattle and put them elsewhere, and asking that in the circumstances a reasonable allowance be made him off the rent of £106, which he had agreed to pay. Mr Hartigan also reported that the pump was broken.

Ordered—"That Mr. Davison be directed to have the pump repaired."

Mr. Hartigan's application for an allowance off the rent was adjourned to the next meeting of the County Council for the terms of his contract to be produced.

## MILITARY TRAFFIC ON ROADS.

Resolution from the Limerick No. 1 District Council requesting County Councils to make a demand on the military authorities for the damage done to roads by military traffic; also demanding to be furnished with an estimate of the cost of the main and bye-roads in the district.

Referred to the County Council.

## LABOURERS' WAGES.

Letters were read from the Clerks of the Croom, Glin, Limerick, Mitchelstown, Newcastle, and Tipperary District Councils approving of the increase of wages recently granted by the Council.

Mr. Naughton stated that the Rathkeale District Council had also approved of the wages.

The Tipperary No. 2 District Council did not agree to the proposal to revise the scale of wages at the end of each period of six months.

## REFUSAL TO PAY RATES BY COUNTY COUNCIL EMPLOYEES.

Letters were read from Collectors Murphy, O'Shaughnessy and Feheeny giving the names of persons employed by the Council who decline to pay rates.

In this connection a letter was also read from Mr. Woulfe, solicitor, on behalf of Collector Murphy, stating that an organised attempt is being made in the district to keep the labourers and tenants of labourers' cottages from paying any rates.

After discussion, it was resolved on the proposition of Mr. Wall, seconded by Mr. Tobin—"That any employee of the County Council who refuses to pay the rates due by him be dismissed from his employment."

## DISPOSAL OF MOTOR-BICYCLE.

Two tenders were received for the purchase of the motor-bicycle advertised for sale, viz., Dr. Humphreys, £40 and Mr. Hodgkinson, £7.

The Committee rejected Dr. Humphreys' tender as they did not consider the amount adequate.

It was ordered—"That the machine be placed in the hands of some reputable cycle agents for disposal on commission."

## R. B. WOULFE—MALICIOUS INJURY.

A preliminary application and notice of a claim for malicious injury, amounting to £1,500, was made by Mr. Woulfe, solicitor, on behalf of R. B. Woulfe, Abbeyfeale, but it was stated that the latter does not intend to sue the ratepayers. He simply requires that his claim be proved and put on record.

R. LEONARD, SCHOOL ATTENDANCE OFFICER  
An application from Mr Richard Leonard, School Attendance Officer for Limerick No. 1 District Council Area for increase of salary, was referred to the County Council.

DENIS E. LEAHY, SCHOOL ATTENDANCE OFFICER.  
Read letter from Mr Denis E. Leahy resigning his appointment as School Attendance Officer for Newcastle District, on the grounds that the salary was inadequate. Referred to County Council.

## COLLECTORS' APPLICATION FOR INCREASED POUNDAGE.

Read letter from Mr Ruttle, Secretary to the Rate Collectors' Association, asking the Council to consider the claim of Rate Collectors to revision of poundage fees.

Mr. Naughton was of opinion that the whole system of rate collection should be revised, and in that opinion Mr. Hynes concurred. The application was accordingly adjourned.

## COKE FOR COUNTY COURTHOUSE.

An application from the Caretaker, County Courthouse, to be supplied with one ton of coke, was refused.

## REMOVAL OF CHAIRS FROM COUNTY COURTHOUSE.

The Caretaker, County Courthouse, reported that some chairs, the property of the County Council, were recently removed from the Grand Jury Room by one of the road foremen. Referred to Mr. Davison for report.

The following report from Mr. Davison was read:—

JOHN KENNY V. COUNTY COUNCIL—ENNIS ROAD FLOODING.  
REPORT

Gentlemen—The surface drainage of this road was defective, owing to no outlet to adjoining fields, when I took up office.

It appears that Mr. Lynch, Contractor, did some work at this place, lifting an old gullet and laying a new one, not on the actual site of the old, and caused an outlet to be made through the wall into Lord Lansdowne's property.

Litigation followed—the outlet was closed, and things were even worse than formerly.

Subsequently Mr. Kenny took over a portion of the land for building, filled in the drain on road-side, on his own initiative and was "Noticed" by me, January, 1917, for so doing, and the County Council, on my report, directed the County Solicitor to take proceedings.

On Mr. Kenny's complaint to me re surface-water entering his lands, I asked him would he give the County Council an easement through his property to connect by drain the Ennis road with Circular road. He mentioned a price which I considered exorbitant—I think it was £900. Subsequently, on 3rd September, 1917, Mr. Kenny wrote, threatening proceedings.

I then approached Mr. Rochfort (Lord Lansdowne's Agent) and, without demur, he granted me an easement, adjoining Mr. Kenny's holding, free, with, of course, a maintenance proviso.

On February 23rd, 1918, the work was placed in my hands; on March 15th, received letter from Secretary re service of Writ.

The County Council, on March 19th, accepted Mr. Rochfort's offer, and I commenced work on March 28th, 1918.

The drain was laid by Direct Labour; gulleys were connected thereto in Ennis Road, and kerbing laid anew, the footway widened and the road so much improved that now it presents a civilised appearance.

I could express myself on the alleged grievance of Mr. Kenny, but the matter being sub-judice I must reserve my remarks.

As Mr. O'Malley had been previously Acting-County Surveyor when the case of the gullet in the same land, then under Lord Lansdowne, was the subject of litigation, I thought it well to employ Mr. O'Malley, who had intimate knowledge of the facts, and I have already certified payment of reduced figure, as will appear from the following:—

" May 19th, 1920.

" Dear Sir—I herewith enclose a/c of Mr. O'Malley for professional services in re above. The amount was reduced by me to £16 on 25th October, 1919, and the Finance Committee of that date recommended payment. I certify that for Mr. O'Malley's services he is entitled to £16, but it is a matter for the County Council to decide whether this amount should be paid out of the County Council funds and be recovered later from Mr. Kenny."

Mr. Mackey drew attention to the fact that the tolls charged on cattle at the Munster Fairs had been increased without any authority from the Council.

Referred to Mr. O'Sullivan, County Solicitor.

A resolution was read from the Kilmallock District Council requesting the County Surveyor to reinstate John Ryan as surfaceman in John Osborne's area, the latter not being considered competent to act as surfaceman.—No action taken.

## MR. DWANE, HOSPITAL—FLOODING.

A letter was read from Mr. Dwane, Hospital, addressed to the Kilmallock District Council, complaining of the flooding of his shop and kitchen by surface water. Referred to Mr. Davison for report.

## WALL ROUND KILGOBBIN PUMP.

With reference to a complaint made by Charles Mills, Kilgobbin, of trespass on his lands, owing to the wall surrounding a pump having been removed by Council's employees, Mr. Ryan reported that he had given instructions for the repair of the wall.

## MR. FRANK FOSBERRY.

An application from Mr. Frank Fosberry for increase in his pension was marked 'read.'

## BALLYLANDERS PENSIONS COMMITTEE.

Mr. Timothy Crowley, senr., Ballylanders, was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Ballylanders Old Age Pensions Committee, created by the resignation of the Rev. Father Quinlan.

## SHERIFFS (IRELAND) ACT, 1920.

Circular Letter from Chief Secretary's Office, dated 8th October, transmitting copy of the Sheriff's Act, 1920.

## CORK INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION.

Read resolution from the Cork Industrial Development Association condemning the action of the British Government in their prohibition against American Passenger Vessels entering Cork Harbour on the East-bound voyage. Approved.

## MR. CAHILL, M.C.C.

A letter was read from Mr. M. Cahill, M.C.C., stating that in his opinion the minute relating to the forfeiture of the dinner hour on Saturday, when work ceases at 2 o'clock, was not accurate.

The members present were unanimously of opinion that the minute as recorded was an accurate record of what took place.

## IRISH CATTLE TRADE ASSOCIATION.

A letter was read from the Secretary, Irish Cattle Trade Association, Cork, stating that owing to the hold up of many important fairs in County Limerick, their members would be glad to facilitate the sellers of cattle by attending at places that might be named.

In this connection applications were received from local committees for permission to hold a cattle fair at Boler and at Ballybrood. Permission granted.

## SALE OF TINNACULLIA WINTERAGE.

Read letter from Mr. J. P. Hartigan, Auctioneer, reminding the Council that the time had arrived for the letting of the winterage at Tinnacullia.

Referred to the Agricultural and Technical Instruction Committee.

## MR. BENJAMIN REIDY, NEWCASTLE WEST.

Read letter from the Newcastle West District Council requesting the County Council to re-instate Benjamin Reidy, who had been dismissed from his employment as a road worker.

The Committee, having heard the facts of the case from the County Surveyor, Mr. Ryan, suspended the Standing Orders, and heard a statement of his case from Mr. Reidy.

Mr. Reidy eventually expressed regret for the action taken by him, and his subsequent employment was referred to Mr. Ryan.

## Minutes of Proceedings of Proposals Committee at Half-yearly Meeting, held in the Council Chamber on the 9th October, 1920.

## APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN.

On the proposition of Mr. Coleman, seconded by Mr. Cranwitch, it was resolved—"That Mr. J. Wall be appointed Chairman of the Committee for the ensuing year."

Mr. Wall accordingly took the Chair at the meeting.

## CONTRACTS FOR ADVERTISING, PRINTING, &amp;c.

It was unanimously resolved—That tenders be invited for the following proposals:—

1. 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## Limerick County Council.

### Minutes of Proceedings of County Council at Meeting held in the Council Chamber on Monday, the 18th October, 1920.

Present—Mr. Anthony Mackey, Vice-Chairman, and subsequently Mr. J. Wall, Chairman, presiding; Messrs. deLacy, Normile, Dunne, Tobin, O'Dwyer, McCann, Cranwitch, Laffan, Blackwell, Leahy, O'Shea, Purcell, Naughton, Noonan, Hynes.

#### CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES.

The Minutes of last Meeting were taken as read and confirmed, having been printed and circulated.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE, 28th AUGUST

The recommendations of Finance Committee at meeting held on Saturday, 28th August, were taken as read and unanimously adopted.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE, 11th and 25th SEPTEMBER.

The recommendations of Finance Committee at meetings held on the 11th and 25th September were also taken as read and unanimously adopted.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE, 9th OCTOBER.

The Secretary reported that owing to the limited time at his disposal he was unable to have the recommendations of the Finance Committee of the 9th October ready for adoption at to-day's meeting. He therefore asked that the consideration be adjourned to next meeting with the exception of certain matters of urgency.

#### MR. MAGNER, RATE COLLECTOR.

A letter was read from Mr. P. Magner, in response to the order made by the Finance Committee, at their meeting on the 9th October, tendering the fullest apology to the Council for not having carried out their instructions as directed, adding that he had no intention of ignoring the authority of the Council and that the whole business was a mistaken idea of procedure on his part.

Mr. Tobin proposed "That Mr. Magner's apology be regarded as satisfactory and that his resignation be accepted." Mr. McCann seconded.

The Chairman proposed "That Mr. Magner be dismissed."

Mr. de Lacy seconded. On a poll there voted for the Chairman's amendment:—Messrs. Blackwell, de Lacy, Dunne, Hynes, Laffan, Naughton, Normile, Purcell, and the Chairman—9.

Against:—Messrs. Cranwitch, Leahy, McCann, Noonan, O'Dwyer, O'Shea, and Tobin—7.

The Chairman declared the amendment carried, and being put as a substantive resolution was passed *nem. con.*

#### MESSRS. O'DONNELL AND CLEARY—RATE COLLECTORS.

The Secretary reported that Collector O'Donnell had also written a letter of explanation, and that both he and Collector Magner had closed their warrants for the half year ended the 30th September, but that no reply had been received from Collector Cleary who had still a sum of £1081 15s. 5d. outstanding.

Mr. Naughton suggested that Mr. O'Donnell's case be treated differently from Mr. Cleary's. The Chairman, however, proposed—That both those collectors, O'Donnell and Cleary, be dismissed.

Mr. de Lacy seconded.

Mr. Naughton proposed a direct negative.

Mr. Leahy seconded.

On a poll, there voted for the Chairman's proposition—Messrs. Blackwell, de Lacy, Dunne, Hynes, Laffan, Normile, Purcell, and the Chairman—8.

Against—Messrs. Leahy, McCann, Naughton, O'Shea and Tobin—5.

Messrs. Cranwitch, Noonan, and O'Dwyer did not vote.

The Chairman's proposition was declared carried.

The Secretary was directed to write to those collectors for the return of their collecting books and warrants.

#### TEMPORARY APPOINTMENTS.

The Council unanimously decided to make, for the present, only temporary appointments to complete the warrant for the year ended the 31st March, 1921, and the Secretary was directed to issue advertisements for the appointments to be made at the next meeting of the County Council.

#### POUNDAGE FEES.

It was resolved—"That Messrs. Magner and O'Donnell be paid their Poundage Fees."

In this connection the Secretary reported that the Manager of the Munster and Leinster Bank informed him that he had made arrangements to meet the necessary overdraft.

#### DEFULTING RATEPAYERS EMPLOYED BY CO. COUNCIL.

Mr. de Lacy drew attention to a letter written on behalf of Mr. Murphy, Rate Collector, by Mr. Woulfe, Solicitor—considered at last Finance Meeting—pointing out that a movement was being made in the Abbeyfeale District, led by Patrick Buckley of Abbeyfeale, to prevent the occupiers of Union cottages from paying rates—stating that Mr. Murphy appealed to an Arbitration Court to enforce payment against several defaulters, whereupon Mr. Buckley appeared in court and defended the parties sued on the ground that they were not liable for same being only weekly tenants.

Mr. de Lacy pointed out that the question was one for a Parish Court and not for an Arbitration Court—there being no question of arbitration involved—and he proposed "That Collectors having like difficulties be so notified." Passed.

#### MR. PATRICK BUCKLEY.

The Chairman further proposed "That the attention of the Minister for Home Affairs be directed to the action taken by Mr. Patrick Buckley in the matter."

#### MR. DANIEL HEALY.

On the proposition of Mr. Leahy, seconded by Mr. Tobin, it was resolved that authority be given for the payment of a decree for £30 14s. 0d. obtained against the Council by Daniel Healy of Temple, he being a poor man and badly in need of payment.

#### UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS' COMMITTEE, 8th SEPTEMBER.

The recommendations of University Scholarships' Committee at meeting held on the 8th September, having been circulated, were taken as read.

Arising therefrom Mr. McCann was of opinion that the Committee exceeded their jurisdiction in recommending the award of a Scholarship to a student who had not fulfilled the strict requirements of the Scheme. The Secretary to the Committee, however, pointed out that discretionary power was allowed to the Committee and had been exercised on former occasions within certain limitations which had in this case been fulfilled.

Mr. de Lacy also explained that the student in question, in addition to passing a good examination, had selected the Faculty of Commerce—one of the two Ear-marked Faculties.

Mr. McCann proposed "That the Scholarship be not awarded." But his proposition not receiving a second, Mr. de Lacy proposed and Mr. Cranwitch seconded "That the recommendations be adopted." Passed *nem. con.*

#### COUNTY COUNCILS' GENERAL COUNCIL REPORT.

The following recommendations were made by the County Councils' General Council:—

#### MILK PRODUCTION.

I. That immediate steps be taken to give effect to the recommendations contained in the Interim report on Milk Production. Referred to the County Committee for Agriculture.

#### APPOINTMENT OF CORONERS.

II. That vacancies in the office of Coroner be filled and the persons appointed required to give an undertaking to hold inquests in all cases requiring investigation. Approved.

#### TOLLS AT MARKETS AND FAIRS.

III. That County Councils endeavour to acquire the Patentees of Markets and Fairs by Agreement or Arbitration with a view to utilizing the tolls derivable therefrom in relief of the rates. Approved.

#### CHAIR OF SCIENTIFIC AGRICULTURE.

IV. That the grant of £20 be contributed by each County Council towards the Chair of Scientific Agriculture in University College, Dublin. Approved.

#### VACANCY IN THE OFFICE OF COUNTY COUNCILLOR.

The Secretary reported a casual vacancy in the office of County Councillor for the Kilmallock Electoral area, created by the death of Mr. John A. Lynch.

The Chairman declared the office vacant, and in accordance with the provisions of the Standing Orders, gave notice that he would move at the next meeting that the vacancy be filled by the co-option of Mr. Tighe Crowley, Ballylanders.

#### REPRESENTATION ON COUNTY COUNCILS' GENERAL COUNCIL.

On the proposition of Mr. Blackwell, seconded by Mr. Tobin, it was resolved—"That our Chairman, Mr. John Wall, be appointed to fill the vacancy in the representation of this Council on the County Councils' General Council created by the death of Mr. John A. Lynch.

#### TREASURER'S AUTHORITY—COUNTY INFIRMARY, &c.

It was unanimously resolved—"That Treasurer's Authority be signed for payments under the Bovine Tuberculosis (Ireland) Order, for deficit on the working of the County Infirmary for year ended 31st March, 1920, for ordinary transfers to Secretary's No. 3 Account, Postage Account, &c., and for miscellaneous payments.

#### MR. J. P. HARTIGAN—GRAZING ON FAIR GREEN.

A letter was read from Mr. J. P. Hartigan, lessee of the grazing of the Munster Fair Green, asking to be allowed compensation for the four acres taken for allotment purposes after the contract had been entered; it also pointed out that the trespass on the Fair Green had rendered the place valueless for the purpose for which it was rented.

After some discussion it was unanimously resolved—"That Mr. Hartigan be allowed proportionate abatement for the four acres taken for allotments, together with six additional acres which are valueless for grazing purposes."

#### REPAIR OF PUMP.

It was ordered—"That Mr. Davison be directed to have the pump repaired."

#### KEY OF WEIGH-BRIDGE.

Authority was given to Mr. Davison to procure a key of the Weigh-Bridge at Fair Green.

COMBINED PURCHASING.

The Scheme for Combined Purchasing by Local Bodies was again considered, and in connection therewith a list was submitted by Mr. Ryan, County Surveyor, of articles which he considered would be suitable for combined purchase.

Mr. de Lacy was directed to place Mr. Ryan's list before the County Council's General Council.

## LABOURERS' WAGES.

Read letter from Rathkeale District Council approving of the proposal to increase the rate of wages to employees under the Direct Labour Scheme, same to take effect as from the 17th July, 1920, the date of the original application made by the Transport Workers' Union on behalf of the employees.

## ROAD IMPROVEMENT SCHEME.

Read letter from the Ministry of Transport, dated 6th August, acknowledging the receipt of the revised Scheme for road-rolling in the Western Division of the County Limerick, and asking that the Scheme for the Eastern Division be forwarded as soon as possible as they would prefer to deal with the Scheme for the entire County at the one time; also asking to be furnished with detailed estimates, specifications, maps, &c.

The Council having heard a statement from Mr. Davison, County Surveyor, were of opinion that there would be very little utility in proceeding with the Scheme.

## REFORM OF THE LIQUOR LAWS.

Mr. J. Hynes proposed, Mr. J. Dunne seconded, and resolved:—

## AMERICAN SHIPPING SERVICES TO IRISH PORTS.

The following resolution was read and approved, and copies ordered to be sent to Admiral Benson, Chairman, U. S. Shipping Board, Washington; The Ambassador-in-Charge, U. S. Embassy, London; The U. S. Consul, Cork, Cork.

RESOLUTION OF COUNCIL OF CORK INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION.

At a meeting of the Council of the Cork Industrial Development Association, held on Monday, September, 20th, the following resolution was passed:—

"This Association, representative of the commercial and industrial interests of Cork, expresses its pleasure at the advent of the ships of the United States Mail Steamship Company to the Port of Cork, which, we feel confident, will lead to big development of trade and intercourse between Ireland and America.

"We condemn the action of the British Government authorities in their prohibition against American passenger vessels entering Cork Harbour on the east-bound voyage. We regard such prohibition not as an isolated incident but as part of the traditional English policy of maintaining control of the seas and preventing the shipping expansion of other nations. We also regard it as part of England's traditional repressive economic policy against the development of Ireland's trade and commerce, which policy ruthlessly pursued has reduced the population of our country from eight millions to four millions within the past seventy years.

"We look to the United States Administration, and in particular to its Shipping Board Department, to insist upon freedom for its vessels to enter Irish ports, and we are sure the whole Irish people will co-operate with any action taken by them in this respect, as it is to the interests of our country that its ports be free to all vessels, and it is our desire to maintain direct intercourse with all nations."

## AMALGAMATION OF UNIONS.

A circular letter was read from the Local Government Dept. of Dail Eireann, suggesting, amongst other matters that a Conference be held consisting of representatives of the several Unions in the County and the County Council, with a view to arranging a Scheme for the amalgamation of such unions as it is decided can be dispensed with.

It was resolved:—"That three representatives from each Union in the County and three representatives of the County Council be invited to this Conference, and that same be held in the County Council Chamber, on Thursday, the 11th November."

It was unanimously resolved:—"That Messrs. Wall, de Lacy and Laffan be appointed to represent the Council."

It was also resolved:—"That the three District Councils—Glin, Mitchelstown No. 2, and Tipperary No. 2—whose Unions are situate in other Counties, get a like representation of three members at the Conference."

## MRS. JEREMIAH QUAID'S QUARRY, CREGGANE.

A letter from Mr. Cahill, Solicitor, Charleville, making a claim on account of material supplied out of above-mentioned quarry was referred to Mr. Davison to reply—he having reported verbally.

## ANNACOTTY NEW ROAD.

On the proposition of Mr. Hynes, Mr. Davison was directed to report, at next meeting, regarding the failure of the contractor for the Annacotty New Road (Mr. Wm. Flannery) to complete his contract as far as the fencing of the road was concerned.

## MILITARY TRAFFIC ON ROADS.

The question of the damage being done to the roads of the County by Military traffic (brought under notice by the Limerick District Council) will arise on consideration of the Circular to be dealt with by the conference.

NEWPALLAS COURTHOUSE

Read letter from Mr. Humphreys, C.P.S., asking what steps the Council propose to take to provide premises for a Petty Sessions house at New Pallas, the house formerly used for the purpose being taken up by the Landlord. Referred to County Council.

BALLYNEETY FAIR.

Read letter from Mr. Jas. Crehan, Secretary to Ballyneety Fairs Committee asking the Council to cancel the Munster Fair advertised to take place on the 12th November, as arrangements had been made and considerable expense incurred in advertising a Fair to be held at Ballyneety, on November 17th, which Fair would be prejudicially affected by the holding of an additional Munster Fair on the 12th.

The Secretary informed the Committee that this Fair had been advertised by direction of the Chairman, at the request of farmers and cattle dealers.

NEWCASTLE DISTRICT COUNCIL—QUARTERLY INSTALMENT.

Read letter from the Clerk of Newcastle District Council applying for payment of Quarterly Instalment due the 1st October.

The Secretary reported that this instalment had been sent out in accordance with his instructions. And it was ordered "That the Clerk be so informed."

DUPLICATE PAYING ORDERS ISSUED.

The Secretary reported having issued duplicate Paying Orders in error to John Meehan and Thomas Meehan, amounting, in each case, to £2 6s. 2d., and they now repudiate having received the money though bearing their discharge.

Ordered.—The Secretary was directed to withhold Paying Orders due for current fortnight.

EMPLOYMENT OF MEN ON THE ROADS.

Mr. Ryan drew attention to the order recently made regarding further employment on the roads and stated that it would entail hardship on men with families who annually rely on winter work.

After some discussion it was ordered "That preference in employment be given to married men with young helpless families, or to a man who is the support of a family, but that employment be not given to more than one man in each family, or more than one animal hired from one family."

The County Surveyors were directed not to employ a further number on the roads without an express direction from the Finance Committee.

The Secretary and County Surveyors were directed to go into the matter and see how many can be employed without exceeding the presentments. The County Surveyors were also directed to obtain from their Road Foremen the necessary particulars regarding those persons in need of employment.

STOPPING WORK ON SATURDAYS.

Mr. T. F. Ryan asked for a direction regarding payment of full time to certain employees who stopped work at 2 o'clock on Saturdays immediately it was passed by the County Council, and before the proposal received the approval of the District Councils. He was aware, however, that it was the result of a misapprehension, the men in question being informed of the Council's decision by their local County Councillors.

The Committee, in the circumstances, directed that they be paid full.

MR. T. LOMASNEY.

Mr. Quaid, M.C.C., drew attention to the case of a man named Lomasney who met with an accident to his eye while in the employment of the County Council, was awarded compensation by the County Court Judge, but had not since been paid.

The Secretary reported that this case had not been finally decided before the Court adjourned, and his Solicitor, Mr. Cussen, was to be seen with a view to arbitration.

Referred to Solicitor for immediate attention.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE, 9th OCTOBER

The recommendations of Finance Committee at meeting held on the 9th October having been circulated were taken as read.

Arising therefrom, Mr. Naughton drew attention to an inaccuracy in the minute relating to the case of ex-Collector J. O'Donnell. He, Mr. Naughton, is recorded as having stated that Mr. O'Donnell's case should be treated differently from Mr. Cleary's, whereas, what he actually did say, was, that the cases of Mr. O'Donnell and Mr. Cleary should be treated differently from that of Mr. Magner.

It was Ordered—"That the minute be so amended, and the recommendations otherwise were unanimously adopted."

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE, 23rd OCTOBER

The recommendations of Finance Committee at meeting held on the 23rd October, having been circulated, were taken as read, and unanimously adopted.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE, 6th NOVEMBER.

The Secretary reported that the recommendations of the Finance Committee, at meeting held on the 6th November, had not yet been received from the printers. The consideration was accordingly adjourned to next meeting.

#### PROPOSALS' COMMITTEE, 9th OCTOBER.

The recommendations of Proposals' Committee at Half-yearly meeting held on 9th October, having been circulated, were taken as read and adopted.

#### PROPOSALS' COMMITTEE, ADJOURNED MEETING, 9th NOVEMBER.

The recommendations of Proposals' Committee at adjourned Half-yearly meeting held this day were read, and as a matter of urgency it was unanimously resolved:—"That the recommendations be adopted and that plenary powers be given to the Proposals' Committee to deal with the Advertising, and Stationery and Printing contracts at a further adjourned meeting to be held not later than the middle of December.

#### DISEASES OF ANIMALS COMMITTEE, 18th OCTOBER.

The recommendations of Diseases of Animals Committee at meeting held on the 18th October, having been circulated, were taken as read and adopted.

#### UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS COMMITTEE, 6th NOVEMBER.

The Secretary to the Committee reported that the meeting of the University Scholarships Committee summoned for the 8th November fell through for want of quorum. The members who attended were, however, of opinion that the schemes which had been prepared by a Special Committee for University and Secondary Schools Scholarships should be brought before the Council at the earliest opportunity with a view to adoption, as it was on those schemes that the examinations next year will be held, and it was necessary that they should be at once advertised.

The main provisions of both schemes were briefly indicated by the Secretary and supplemented in certain details by Mr. de Lacy.

On the proposition of Mr. Michael Ryan, seconded by Mr. Cranwitch, it was resolved—"That the schemes prepared for University and Secondary School Scholarships be adopted.

#### COUNTY SURVEYORS' REPORTS.

The following Half-yearly Reports of the County Surveyors on the condition of the roads and public works of the County were read:—

#### REPORT OF THE COUNTY SURVEYOR (EAST DIVISION), TO BE LAID BEFORE THE COUNTY COUNCIL AT THEIR HALF-YEARLY MEETING TO BE HELD ON THE 9TH NOVEMBER, 1920.

GENTLEMEN—The dry weather of the two months has been favourable to the maintenance of the roads, and repairs have been somewhat deferred, though on some of the main roads the damage caused by heavy motor traffic has severely pitted the roads, making immediate patching unavoidable.

STEAMROLLING.—I have been carrying on the work of rolling whenever and wherever supplies were available, for instance, on the Laurencetown road, Kilfinane, near Flemington, Uregare and the Four Elms; also on Patrickswell road, Dock road, Roxboro' road and Ballysimon road. For continuing on the last-named road supplies are being got out.

STONE-BREAKING MACHINERY.—The machine breaker had been working in Tipperary No. 2 since June up to last week, and supplies are now broken and delivered in all sections here, except Pallas, which will be maintained from Linfield. It has now proceeded to Dromsally Quarry where a large supply awaits breaking. Stone-breakers are also at work at Knockderk and Knockatane Quarries, and one is undergoing repairs, which I hope to send out to Limerick this week.

In Carrigogunnell Quarry I have been able to break supplies which were very much needed to restore the Dock Road, which was so long without proper material.

It is very hard to maintain many of the main roads on account of the exceptionally fast heavy motor traffic, but I think that the roads generally have not gone back.

QUARRIES—In Linfield Quarry, lately acquired, workmen are busy quarrying stones without, I am pleased to say, any necessity for explosives. This supply is of great benefit to me on account of the difficulty in getting material experienced heretofore. I have given no authority to cut down trees here, nor indeed has permission been asked of me; but I find that Messrs. Spaight & Sons have interfered with one tree with the object of felling. I intend to use the timber standing on the land for the purpose of fencing, etc., where required, but I should like your directions as to proceedings against any persons so interfering with the property of the Council.

Roxboro' Quarry I find to contain 2 roads 22 perches, I.P.M., so that the price at £2 per Irish Perch would work out at £204. I understand the lease will be for 99 years. The offer, I believe, will come before the Council through Mr. Sheehan's Solicitor. This is a good Basalt—a suitable stone for road metal—and has been used by me over a large area for some years past.

#### REPORT OF THE COUNTY SURVEYOR (WEST DIVISION), TO BE LAID BEFORE THE HALF-YEARLY MEETING OF THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

The roads in my district have deteriorated during the past six months, owing to the very wet weather combined with the great increase in road traffic. Should the present amount of road traffic continue during the coming winter, the roads are bound to be very seriously injured. There are heavy motor lorries for commercial and other purposes at present in use, besides doing much injury to the surfaces of the roads, have in some cases broken down gutters. I anticipate further cases of this, as these gutters, especially on the by-roads, are not capable of carrying the weight of these lorries.

With reference to the proposals for Special Works to be laid before you, I beg to report as follows:—

OROOM RURAL DISTRICT—There is only one Notice of Motion from Oroom District Council, viz.—No. 558—"To ease two bends on the road from Adare to Caherass." These bends are very dangerous, and the work if carried out would be useful and necessary.

GLIN RURAL DISTRICT—There are two Proposals from Glan District Council, Nos. 98 and 99. These are for gutters and are necessary. No. 99 is more a work of maintenance than a new work.

NEWCASTLE-WEST RURAL DISTRICT—Only one Notice of Motion has been passed by the Newcastle-West District Council, viz.—No. 516—"To open and enlarge a gullet at Knockane." This will be a very useful work if the adjoining owners scour the drains, and the work should be passed subject to this condition.

RATHKEALE RURAL DISTRICT—There is only one Notice of Motion passed by the Rathkeale District Council, viz.—No. 528—"To complete the New road at Burrenlick." This new road is practically complete with the exception of a short portion in the centre. Owing to the increased cost of labour and material from the time of the original passing of the work until the road was put in hand the money was not sufficient to complete the job, and another £50 will be required. The road as it stands is of very little advantage to the public.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:—

Dear Sir—I beg to bring under your notice, to lay before the Chairman of the County Council and the Chairman of the Finance Committee, of the arrangement come to with them and yourself, in my office, for an advance of £20,000, to be paid off in a few months. This I submitted to my Directors and got their sanction to make the temporary loan to you of £20,000. The amount due by you now is close on double the amount sanctioned, and as the Rate Collectors have not lodged for nearly a fortnight, to meet this overdraft, I much regret to say that I will have no power whatsoever to cash any more cheques until they do so, or, at least, until some satisfactory reduction is made in the present high figure of the overdraft, so please do not issue any more cheques until you lay this matter before the members of the Council, who, I am sure, will instruct the Rate Collectors to lodge the monies collected at once, which I understand is all the authority they require

The Secretary reported in this connection that a meeting of the Rate Collectors had been held to consider what action they should take in view of the attitude taken up by the Local Government Board regarding the present financial arrangements. Mr. de Lacy was present at the meeting which came to no definite conclusion, but adjourned until Wednesday, the 8th December, for further consideration.

The Committee were of opinion that the situation was one that could only be dealt with by the County Council. They accordingly directed, as the matter was one of extreme urgency, that a meeting be convened at once, and in the meantime they deferred the signing of the Treasurer's Authority for payments in view of Mr. Brett's statement until the Council shall have given a direction on the matter.

#### UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT, 1920.

Mr. Davison drew the attention of the Committee to a letter which he had received from the Ministry of Labour, Limerick, regarding the carrying out of the provisions of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920. Referred to the County Council.

#### MR. JOHN O'HALLORAN, CARPENTER.

A complaint was made by John O'Halloran, Carpenter, that he had been dismissed from his employment as Carpenter to the Council after nearly seven years' service, and asking that the Committee would give him an opportunity of being heard when dealing with the case.

I beg to answer that query through you, the Union Cottage holders against whom I proceeded in a local Arbitration Court some time ago, in most cases, not paid any rates for some years past; the rates in these cases have been regularly demanded, and the County Court Decree for non-payment which I have obtained against those persons, could not be executed, or the amount due realised. These Cottagers are simply defaulters, who also got the assistance of a local District Councillor, and successfully evaded payment of any rates whatsoever. #### MINUTES OF LAST MEETING.

The Secretary reported that the Draft of the Minutes of proceedings of last meeting had been taken away by the Constabulary authorities, as well as the Notebook, and the Minutes were accordingly not ready for confirmation, but he was taking steps to have the proceedings recorded.

#### REMOVAL OF COUNTY RECORDS.

The Secretary reported that the County Council Offices were searched by a force of Constabulary and Military, on Monday, the 22nd November, when the following records were taken away:—

The Secretary further reported that between Saturday afternoon, the 27th November, and Monday the 29th, the Subsidiary Expenditure Book and Half-yearly Ledger were removed from the Offices by some person or persons unknown.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE, 6th and 20th NOV. and 3rd DEC.

The minutes of proceedings of Finance Committee at meetings held on the 6th and 20th November, and 3rd December were taken as read, and on the proposition of Mr Laffan, seconded by Mr McCann, unanimously adopted.

#### TRADES COUNCIL DEPUTATION.

The Standing Orders were here suspended to admit of a deputation from the Trades Council being heard. Mr Carr, President, thereupon addressed the Council in support of the men engaged in the munition strike, whose organization was badly in need of funds.

The members present undertook to take steps in their respective districts to have a further collection made.

#### FINANCES.

The Secretary reported that the Council's financial position showed a net debit balance of £45,781 2s 7d, and with the paying orders issued by the Finance Committee on the previous Saturday, the 4th inst., and held over pending a further arrangement with the Treasurer, would bring the net debit balance to over £50,000.

An interview subsequently took place with Mr. Brett, Manager of the Munster and Leinster Bank, when it was agreed that the Rate Collectors continue to lodge as heretofore with the Munster and Leinster Bank, through the Secretary, provided no decrees for malicious injuries have in the meantime been presented; this latter to be ascertained by the Secretary before making the lodgments.

#### RATE COLLECTION.

The Secretary reported that only a very small proportion of the current warrant had, so far, been collected, the balance outstanding being well over £100,000, and that a sum of over £27,000, in addition to the fortnightly expenditure for Road Maintenance, etc., will be required on the 1st January to meet the financial liabilities to Public Bodies.

The Secretary further reported that in some cases no steps had been taken to proceed with the collection of the current warrant.

The Secretary was directed to send an urgent circular letter to each collector pointing out the position

#### RATE COLLECTORS.

In the above connection the Secretary reported that the Collectors recently held a meeting to consider what action they should take regarding their lodgments, in view of the recent letter issued by the Local Government Board, but came to no definite conclusion, adjourning the consideration to a further meeting to be held this day.

It was unanimously decided to ask the collectors to confer with the Council on the matter.

At the subsequent interview the collectors were informed of the altered arrangements regarding lodgments.

#### MESSRS. O'DONNELL AND CLEARY

The Secretary reported that ex-Collectors O'Donnell and Cleary had been applied to for their collecting books, but had not complied with the application

#### WILLIAM DWANE, KILFINANE

Mr. Purcell proposed, Mr. McCann, seconded, and it was resolved—"That Mr. William Dwane, Kilfinane, be appointed Poor Rate Collector for the Kilmallock No. 1 Collection District, a bond to be given to the Council, with sufficient sureties conditioned in a penalty of £1000"

#### COLLECTOR P. REIDY

A letter was read from Mr. P. Reidy, resigning his appointment as Poor Rate Collector, on the ground of advancing years, and asking to be granted the superannuation to which his service entitles him. The Secretary stated that Mr. Reidy had 54 completed years of service, and was a most exemplary and diligent Collector.

It was unanimously resolved—"That Mr. Reidy's resignation be accepted with regret, and that he be granted a superannuation allowance according to the scale prescribed."

#### COLLECTOR WILLIAM HICKEY

A letter was read from Collector William Hickey, stating that owing to continued ill-health he was unable to perform his duties, and asking that the Council would take over the uncollected arrears of the first moiety which he had already lodged.

The Council directed that Collector Hickey continue in office for the present.

#### LABOURERS' RATES.

Letters were read from Collectors O'Shaughnessy and Feheny stating that they were unable to recover the rates from the labourers in their collecting districts. Referred to Mr Ryan, County Surveyor.

#### UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS REPORT.

The following report from Mr Fitzgerald was read:—  
Dear Sir,—Owing to the difficulty of making a quorum of the University Scholarships Committee through lack of facilities for travelling, certain matters of urgency are obliged to be held up, and I will be glad to receive a direction from the Council on the following matters:—

1 Miss Portley did not present herself for her second medical examination in September, owing to illness. This fact is supported by Professor MacLoughlin, of University College, and by local medical testimony. She asks permission to be allowed to present herself in March, and to take her third medical examination in September.

2 Charles Godfrey failed in his second medical examination, and makes the same application as Miss Portley. This student was reported by the University authorities to be painstaking and conscientious and a regular and diligent student, but was run down at the time of the examination.

3 James O'Callaghan failed in his first medical examination, and makes a like application. He is certified by the University authorities to have been in a weak state of health at the time of his examination. Each of these three students has undertaken to do the two years course if allowed to present for examination in March.

4 Michael Ryan, B.E., makes application for a year's extension of Scholarship for post-graduate work. This application was made in July and adjourned by the Committee until the result of his examination for B.E. degree was known. In this he has been successful.

5 Michael Clardon, B.A., makes application for a further year's extension of Scholarship to enable him to compete for the Travelling Studentship in Classics, as well as to take out his M.A. The Travelling Studentship carries with it the degree of Doctor of Philology. This student has had a most brilliant academic career.

6 Michael Feely, B.A., makes application for extension of Scholarship, to enable him to do post-graduate work, and to prepare for his M.A. degree.

In the meantime I have withheld the payments to the University authorities, in respect of those students, as well as the monthly payments to the students themselves, and would be obliged for a direction in the matter.

I was informed this week that my services were no longer required owing to lack of work, by the machinery Inspector, Mr. Singleton. As regards the latter person's statement, I beg to deny same and can prove to the satisfaction of the Council that there is plenty of work in the place to keep a carpenter going indefinitely, but he only wanted to have me removed from my position.

In conclusion, I would ask that the Council when considering my case would be so good as to give me a hearing.

### RATE COLLECTION

### CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

The minutes of last meeting having been printed and circulated were taken as read and confirmed  
FINANCE COMMITTEE 8th and 18th DECEMBER, 1920, and 7th JANUARY, 1921

The recommendations of Finance Committee, at meetings held on the 8th and 18th December, 1920, and 7th January, 1921, having been printed and circulated were taken as read and unanimously adopted

### FINANCES

The Secretary stated that this meeting had been specially convened to consider the Council's financial position, and what steps should be taken to meet the dead-lock that has arisen. The Council was now indebted to the Munster and Leinster Bank in a sum of £50,000, and the Manager refuses to allow that amount to be exceeded, unless he got a guarantee that the overdraft would be substantially reduced and that immediately.

The Council examined the Return of Rates collected, which showed a sum of £13,128 only lodged to date, the balance outstanding being £95,088—it was observed that in some cases the collection had not even begun, while in several other cases the amount collected was insignificant and they considered that strong action was necessary if their position as a Council was to be maintained.

After further discussion the following resolution was accordingly adopted:—  
Proposed by Mr. Laffan, seconded by Mr. Hynes, and Resolved:—“That we desire to impress on the **Ratepayers** the urgent necessity of paying the current rate within the next ten days, and we hereby direct the **Rate Collectors** to lodge 50 per cent. of their respective warrants within ten days of receiving this notice, and failing compliance, it will be our painful duty to call upon any such Rate Collectors to resign their position forthwith. The Rate Collectors are further hereby informed that in future they are not to attend at specified places for the collection of rates, but to call instead at the houses of the Ratepayers, and the names of any persons who, on demand, refuse to pay their rates are to be furnished immediately to the Secretary of the County Council.”

Should the necessity arise for appointing a Rate Collector when the notice above given shall have expired, the Council direct that the selection of a suitable person for the position be left in the hands of the County Councillors for the division.

### COLLECTOR J. M. NOLAN

Read letter from Mr. J. M. Nolan, tendering his resignation of the position of Poor Rate Collector, on the ground of ill-health, the medical certificate which accompanied the letter stating that Mr. Nolan suffered from chronic sciatica.

The Council unanimously declined to accept Mr. Nolan's resignation until the current warrant had been lodged, as they do not consider that the illness from which he is suffering, especially seeing that it is chronic, should impede him in the performance of his duty for the next three months.

### COLLECTOR P. REIDY.

Read letter from Mr. P. Reidy, stating that he has re-considered the question of his resignation, and will continue in his office of Poor Rate Collector until the end of the current financial year.

### COLLECTOR G. E. FARMER—RATES ON LABOURERS' COTTAGES.

A letter was read from Collector Farmer stating that a number of tenants of labourers' cottages, employed by the Council on the roads, decline to pay rates. Ordered—That Mr. Farmer be asked to furnish the names of those who have refused to pay their rates.

### PAYMENT OF MALICIOUS INJURIES DECREES.

The following opinion from Counsel was read:—

The Criminal Injuries (Ireland) Bill, 1920 which has passed both Lords and Commons and merely awaits the Royal Assent to become operative, provides that where a decree has been made before or after the passing of the Act under any of the Malicious Injury Acts the amount thereof shall be a debt payable on demand; and that it shall be the duty of the Treasurer on demand to pay the amount of such decree out of the monies under his control as Treasurer; and if these are insufficient, out of the first monies coming to his hands as such Treasurer, whether such monies represent sums raised for Compensation for Criminal Injuries or sums raised for or applicable to any other purpose. Once this Act comes into force the answer of the first part of the above query must, in my opinion, be in the affirmative, i.e.—The Treasurer will then be bound to find the first monies coming to his hands to payment of Malicious Injury Decrees, and cannot apply same towards reduction of the overdraft. This will apply regardless of whether such decrees are in respect of injuries to person or to property.

As the law previously stood there was a difference between decrees for injury to person and decrees for injury to property. As regards the latter the Treasurer was under no obligation to pay same out of first monies coming to his hands. As regards the former the matter was doubtful, as such decrees came within the Malicious Injuries Act, 1919 and by Section 1, sub-section 4 thereof were made payable on demand. The point had never been decided whether, notwithstanding that provision, a Treasurer could apply monies coming to his hand in reduction of an overdraft due to him before paying decrees. I am inclined to think he could, but this has now been altered by the Bill of 1920.

### LIMERICK UNION TREASURERSHIP.

A letter was read from the Manager of the Munster and Leinster Bank transmitting copy of a resolution received from the Limerick Union to the effect that all monies payable to the Board be lodged in the Munster and Leinster Bank.

### NEWCASTLE UNION AND DISTRICT COUNCIL TREASURERSHIP.

A letter was read from the Clerk of Newcastle Union and District Council transmitting copy of Resolution proposing that, in the event of the Munster and Leinster Bank, Newcastle, not agreeing to take up the accounts of the Union and District Council, on the same terms as those given by the old Treasurer, the accounts to be re-transferred back to the Provincial Bank.

### AMALGAMATION OF UNIONS.

A further letter was read from the Clerk of Newcastle Union pointing out the following facts to be considered when the question of the amalgamation of Unions is being considered, viz., that there is no railway accommodation from the points where Newcastle Union joins Kauturk and Tralee Unions, also Glin Rural District to Newcastle Hospital, which facts should not be lost sight of when considering hospital accommodation.

### SALE OF BUTTER (IRELAND) REGULATIONS.

A letter was read from the Department of Agriculture, No. G. 6,150, 9th December, stating that a sample of Butter, purchased by an Inspector at the Colmanswell Co-operative Creamery, Ltd., was found, on analysis, to contain 16.8 per cent. of water.

A further letter, on the subject of water in butter, was read from Mr. Hartigan, Secretary to the County Committee for Agriculture, directing the attention of the Council to the high percentage of water in butter at some creameries in the County, which, it was stated, amounted to 35 per cent. in one case.

The Secretary reported that the police had formerly carried out the duties of Food and Drugs Inspectors but their functions in that respect had been set aside.

A discussion took place regarding the necessity of inspection and taking samples for analysis, especially in the case of butter, and it was eventually decided to refer the matter to the County Committee, with a recommendation that their Instructors be asked to perform this duty, and that some extra remuneration be allowed for the work.

Surveyor of Taxes, 10th Dec., applying for a return of the names, addresses and wages of the weekly wage-earners employed by the Council by way of manual labour.

## MR. MICHAEL J. CLERY

Read letter from Mr. Michael J. Clery, applying for payment of the poundage fees and irrecoverable arrears due to him in respect of the first moiety of Poor Rate which he lodged in full. No order made

## QUARTERLY INSTALMENTS

Letters were read from the Clerks of Limerick, Listowel and Tipperary Boards of Guardians, applying for payment of the quarterly instalments due to their Boards. Adjourned

## DR. P. J. CLEARY

A letter was read from Dr. P. J. Cleary, demanding payment of his salary as Coroner, for the month of November, stating that the County Council has no power to dismiss him from the office. No action taken

## STEAM ROLLING

A letter was read from Mr. Davison, County Surveyor, stating that the order to stop all steam-rolling conveyed to him by the Secretary, after the meeting of the 9th November, was not accurate, as a certain amount of discretionary power was given to him in the matter.

After some discussion it was resolved, on the proposition of Mr. Laffan, seconded by the Chairman—"That steam-rolling on the roads be stopped altogether for the present, and that stone-breaking be continued only for repairs to the ordinary roads."

The County Surveyors were also directed to avoid carting as much as possible

## EMPLOYMENT.

A prolonged discussion took place regarding the reduction of men employed on the roads, particularly referred to by Mr. Cahill, in the Foyne district. It was eventually decided, on the proposition of Mr. Cahill, seconded by Mr. Hynes—"That the same number of men be employed during the winter as were employed during the summer months, work to be divided, as far as possible, amongst those most in need of it."

The County Surveyors were directed to put the terms of the foregoing resolution into operation at once.

In this connection letters were read from the Irish Transport and General Workers Union, dated the 7th, 14th, and 30th Dec., addressed to the Department of Local Government, complaining of the wholesale dismissal of road-employees, and that those retained were only employed three days in the week. Mr. Davison said the statement was wholly incorrect, there being only one such case in his division. Ordered—"That the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union be asked for the names."

## BYE-ROADS.

On the proposition of Mr. O'Dwyer it was resolved—"That it be an instruction to the County Surveyors to give their attention for the present to bye-roads.

## LIMIT OF EXPENDITURE.

The following letter was read from Mr. Ryan, County Surveyor:—

Limerick, 10th December, 1920

Dear Sir—Owing to the increase in wages granted by the County Council to road workers in August last, the estimated expenditure on roads for the current 12 months ending 31st March, 1921, will exceed the new limit of expenditure in each of the Rural Districts in the West Division.

I should be glad if you will apply to have the limit of expenditure further increased to meet the new limit of expenditure.

I enclose herewith Two Returns showing the limit of expenditure for the year ending 31st March, 1921, based on the original presentations, together with any supplementary amounts since passed, also the estimated road expenditure for the year ending 31st March, 1922, based on the present scale of wages.

## COUNTY SURVEYORS' MILEAGE

A similar proposal made by Mr. J. Quaid, regarding the County Surveyors' mileage was not pressed, on hearing a statement by Mr. Davison, as to the expenses of running a motor car.

## SUSPENSION OF DAIRIES AND COWSHEDS ORDER

It was unanimously resolved—"That it be a recommendation to each District Council in the County to suspend the operation for the present of the Dairies and Cowsheds Order."

## TREATMENT OF TUBERCULOSIS

A discussion took place as to the necessity for the expenditure incurred in connection with the treatment of Tuberculosis.

It was suggested by Mr. McCann that Domiciliary treatment should be temporarily suspended, but the proposal was not pressed, Mr. Cahill stating that no essential service that works for the benefit of the poor should be interfered with.

## RENT OF YARD IN NEWCASTLE WEST

An application from Miss Walker for £7 10s., half-year's rent of machinery yard in Newcastle West was adjourned for the attendance of Mr. Ryan, County Surveyor, who was directed to furnish for next meeting a report of the cost already incurred, and still further to be incurred in connection with this yard.

## COUNTY LIMERICK FARMERS' ASSOCIATION

A resolution was read from the County Limerick Farmers' Association, asking the Council to reconsider the matter of connection with the Department of Agriculture, in order to centralize their attention on the question of butter embargo. No order made.

## UNEMPLOYMENT

Resolutions were read from the Kilfinane and Kildimo Branches of the I. T. & G. W. Union, relative to the hardship caused by the dismissal of road employees.

## COLLECTOR M. HORGAN'S SURETIES

Read letter from the manager of the Munster and Leinster Bank, stating that the Sureties proposed by Collector M. Horgan are quite good in a joint Bond for £1400

## MR. J. F. BOURKE

Permission was given to Mr. J. F. Bourke, Lower Mallow Street, to lower the wall at the end of the garden by 3 feet.

## STATIONERY AND PRINTING CONTRACT

It was unanimously resolved—"That the tender of Messrs. George McKern & Sons, for £975 18s. for the stationery and printing contract of the County Council be accepted for one year, from the 1st January, 1921.

## ADVERTISING CONTRACT.

After discussion it was resolved—"That the Council do not enter into any contract for publishing of advertisements, but that such notices as require to be inserted be published in one paper at so much per line."

The Secretary reported that the four Limerick papers and the Newcastle Observer had quoted the rate of 1/- per line for all advertisements required to be published.

Mr. Laffan considered that the Irish Independent or Cork Examiner would be a much better medium of advertisement than the Limerick newspapers that had little or no circulation in the County.

It was ordered that quotations be obtained from the Irish Independent and Cork Examiner.

## MULKEAR RIVER DRAINAGE.

The following report from Mr. O'Sullivan, County Solicitor, was read:—

## REPORT OF SOLICITOR RE THE MULKEAR RIVER DRAINAGE DISTRICT.

"The Mulkear River Drainage District" was established under the provisions of the Drainage and Improvement of Lands (Ireland) Act, 1863, by the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland, and certain monies were expended for the drainage of the lands comprised in the district.

On the 20th September, 1877 the Commissioners by their Award specified (amongst other things) the proportion in which the lands so drained and improved as therein mentioned, and the proprietors of such lands, in respect thereof respectively, for the time being, should in future be annually charged towards the costs and expenses which might from time to time be incurred in the *maintaining, cleansing or keeping in repair* the several works which had been executed as in said award mentioned, to be as respectively stated and set forth for that purpose in the Schedule A to award annexed.

From time to time, according as ownership was transferred from the Landlords to the Tenants, new apportionments were made by the Commissioners of Public Works, and the present liability of the several proprietors in the Mulkear Drainage District has been duly fixed by these orders.

The Board were entitled annually to levy such sums as they thought necessary for the *maintaining, cleansing or keeping in repair* the several water courses, sluices, drains, etc., which were executed as in the original Award mentioned, and, as already stated, the said maintenance Rate was to be apportioned as set forth in the Certificates of the Commissioners.

Rates were only leviable by the Board for the maintenance of works *and not for their construction.*

It is provided by section 20 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1898, that the Local Government Board may, with the consent of any Drainage Board, make a provisional order for transferring to a County Council business arising in their County under any Act of any Drainage Board.

Pursuant to this section the Local Government Board made a provisional order dated 23rd October, 1919 transferring to the County Council of the County of Limerick the business arising in their County under the Drainage and Improvement of Land (Ireland) Acts 1868 to 1892 of the Drainage Board for the Mulkear Drainage District and this Order was confirmed by Parliament on 20th May, 1920.

The County Council is accordingly now in the position of the Mulkear Drainage Board and must face the liabilities of that Board in every respect. They will be liable to actions if they refuse to maintain the works, and it is up to them to take the necessary steps to carry out the duties hitherto performed by the Mulkear Drainage Board.

SIR FREDERICK H. BATHURST'S ESTATE—RE MULCAIR DISTRICT DRAINAGE BOARD.

Limerick, 18th December, 1920.

Dear Sir,—In continuation of our interview with reference to the maintenance of river embankments on Townland of Killuragh, we enclose map. The holdings of John Dillon and John Kirby, Nos. 14 and 17, abut on the River Mulcair. The embankments protecting these holdings were constructed under the Drainage Scheme, but they have not been repaired for years, although the embankments above and below these holdings have been kept in order.

We have paid maintenance rates to the Drainage Board on the foregoing holdings for years 1916 to 1920 inclusive.

On 27th July last we wrote to Mr. Maurice S. Power, Secretary to the Drainage Board, pointing out that embankments were not being repaired, and on 31st July we received a letter from him stating our letter would be placed before the Board. On same day (31st July) we wrote Mr. Power that the case was urgent.

On 25th September last we wrote to Mr. Michael Quinlan, the Chairman of the Board, that there were breaches in river embankment and that much injury was being caused to the adjoining lands, and asking to have repairs executed. Subsequently the embankment gave way, considerable damage has been caused, and we understand action is about being taken against the Board by the tenants.

Mr. Quinlan informed us that the embankment referred to is not shown on the award maps, the Drainage Board, although requiring maintenance rate to be paid, are not liable to maintain embankment.

The Secretary, Board of Works, informs us that the maintenance of embankments has recently been transferred to the Limerick County Council, and we beg to request that you will kindly give this very important matter your early and serious attention.

Spaight and paid for three years ago, and that fact was mentioned to Mr. O'Sullivan, Solicitor, at the time the agreement was being prepared.

Mr. Davison stated that no such condition was mentioned and his recommendation to the Council was that the timber should be removed to the County Council yard and utilized for the business of the County.

On the proposition of Mr. Quaid, seconded by the Chairman, it was resolved—"That Mr. Davison, County Surveyor's suggestion, be approved of."

#### COLLECTOR P. SHEARIN.

A letter was read from Collector P. Shearin stating that he was confined to bed with a severe cold and enclosing a medical certificate.

#### HEALY v. COUNTY COUNCIL.

Read letter from Mr. Macaulay, Solicitor, Listowel, asking for payment of two small decrees for malicious injury obtained against the Council—one for £10 2s. obtained by Timothy Healy, Abbeyfeale Hill, and the other for £11 2s. by Jeremiah Healy, same address. Adjourned for the present.

#### MR. R. DAVISON, COUNTY SURVEYOR.

A letter was read from Mr. Davison stating that he had received no notice of the meeting of the County Council, held on the 8th December, and he considered it was not fair to him to give orders for the re-employment of the Carpenter, O'Halloran, without having heard him on the subject. He also drew attention to the printed copy of the minutes from, which is excluded the report made to him by his Inspector, Singleton, while O'Halloran's report is given in full, and both O'Halloran's and Singleton's reports are contradictory. He further objected to the minutes having recorded "Reports from Messrs. Davison and Singleton were received," and contended that in deference to his position the minute should read—"Mr. Davison, County Surveyor's report, to which was attached a report to him of a subordinate officer." Mr. Davison also asks for a direction as to whether O'Halloran is to be employed permanently under the Council.

With regard to the last mentioned paragraph Mr. Davison was informed that the intention of the Council was that O'Halloran should be re-employed for three months from the date the order was made, viz., the 8th December, and with regard to the omission of Mr. Singleton's report to Mr. Davison it was now ordered that it be included in the minutes of this meeting.

Sir—Acting on your instructions of Thursday last I gave notice to two Engine-drivers and two Flagmen, who had come in with some machines, that they might be prepared to go home for some time until the work would be more plentiful. I then went to the Carpenter and told him that when he would finish up some work he was on, we would not go on with any more for the present, this would have kept him for about another week, but he got into a temper and left immediately.

There have been a good many Sleeping-vans built in the yard for new machines that have arrived in late years, which entailed a good deal of carpentry work, but now these are all supplied, and repairs to Courthouses are off the list, it has reduced this work to the repairs of an odd Wheel-barrow and Traction Wagon coming in from the quarries. This I have explained to you some time ago, and also I told the Carpenter about five or six weeks ago that when he would have the frame of a Water-cart and some Barrows repaired I could not see where the work was to come from for himself and his son.

Mr. Ryan reported that the payment demanded for rent was correct, but that he was not in position to surrender the premises at present, and that in any event the tenancy could not be determined without a six months' notice. The Committee referred the matter to Mr. Ryan.

## COLLECTOR J. M. NOLAN.

Letters were read from the Clerk of the Listowel Union relative to a sum of £454 of the Second Moiety of Poor Rate which, according to the abstracts, Mr. Nolan had collected but had not lodged.

As there appears to be some mistake in this matter the Committee adjourned the consideration for Mr. Nolan's report.

The Secretary laid before the Committee the following queries arising out of the New Scheme, which he had been called upon to answer, and which he did not feel himself in a position to do

QUERIES FOR UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS COMMITTEE, AT MEETING TO BE HELD ON THE 2ND FEBRUARY, 1921

- (1) Do Irish and Irish History form one subject, or are they two independent subjects?
- (2) Does it suffice if a candidate has matriculated the year previous to examination?
- (3) Must a candidate in the Commerce group necessarily present the subject Commerce?
- (4) Must a candidate presenting Mathematics present all four subjects—Algebra, Arithmetic, Geometry, Trigonometry?
- (5) Under English—The Scheme prescribes "general knowledge of other well-known works in prose and poetry." An intending candidate enquires what are those? Are they written by Irish or English Authors?
- (6) Must a candidate name the faculty he intends to compete for, or may he compete for a Scholarship generally and select the faculty afterwards?
- (7) Are there to be special Examination papers set for each faculty?
- (8) How are the answers of students in Modern Languages to be marked by the Examiners if portion of the paper is answered in Irish?
- (9) (V.A.) What facilities are to be afforded to teachers to avail of the Scholarships in Celtic studies?
- (10) Are the subjects to be presented for examination to be 4 or 5?

The Sub-Committee make the following recommendations:

- (1) That Irish and Irish History form two independent subjects, and be the only compulsory subjects of examination, any other three subjects to be selected in addition.
- (2) That having passed the Matriculation Examination at any time prior to the Scholarships Examination suffice for the purposes of Article V. (b) of the Scheme.
- (3) That any two of the five subjects included in the syllabus for Commerce will suffice for examination in the subject. A candidate for the Scholarship in Commerce need not necessarily present the subject for examination.
- (4) Algebra and Arithmetic form one subject for examination, Geometry and Trigonometry each an independent subject.
- (5) That for paragraph 2 of the English Syllabus there be substituted:—Literature—Questions will be set to test (a) intelligent reading (but not detailed study) of books prescribed from time to time; (b) General knowledge of other well-known works in prose and verse, the authors not specified, but principally intended for oral examinations left to the discretion of the examiner.
- (6) The faculty for which it is intended to compete must be selected by the student at the time of entering for examination, and the award of the Scholarship will be on the results of the examinations of the Candidates for each faculty.
- (7) The examination papers shall be the same for all students.
- (8) Examiners in modern languages, if they find it necessary will requisition the services of somebody acquainted with the National Language to assist them in marking answers where given in Irish.
- (9) The age limit for teachers to avail of the Scholarship in Celtic Studies having been increased from 20 to 25 years the Sub-Committee deem a sufficient facility.
- (10) The subjects to be presented for examination shall in all cases be five.

Present—Mr. A. Mackey, Vice-Chairman, Presiding;

Messrs. Naughton, Laffan, O'Dwyer, Michael Ryan, Noonan, McCann, Dunne, Leahy, O'Shea, Tobin, Cahill and Coleman,

#### CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed; arising from the minutes, the following report from Mr. O'Sullivan, Solicitor, regarding the Mulkear Drainage Board was read:—

#### X Re MULCAIRE DRAINAGE—APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE.

The Council may appoint a Committee to attend to the duties of the late Drainage Board but this Committee, in my opinion, must be nothing more than a Committee of the Council, to whom the minutes must be submitted, and who must adopt them before they can have binding force and become the act of the Council.

3rd February, 1921.

After a prolonged discussion it was resolved, on the proposition of Mr. Laffan, seconded by Mr. McCann—"That the consideration of this matter be adjourned to the next County Council meeting as the Farmers' Union were taking Counsel's opinion as to the question of liability for expenditure incurred by this Board, and in the meantime, that no action be taken."

It was further ordered—"That Mr. O'Malley, Engineer to the Drainage Board, be asked for a report as to the present condition of the banks and sluices, and the estimated cost of putting same into a proper state of repair."

#### UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Further arising from the minutes, Mr. Tobin referred to the hardship inflicted on persons out of employment, by the failure of the Council to adopt the provisions of the "Unemployment Insurance Act," and he considered that the Council should either pay the unemployment benefit, or stamp the cards, thus giving those unemployed the opportunity of drawing their benefit from the Labour Exchange.

After discussion Mr. Tobin formally proposed—"That the provisions of the Unemployment Insurance Act be adopted by this Council." Mr. O'Dwyer seconded. Passed.

#### MR. J. M. NOLAN

Further, arising from the minutes, Mr. Dunne reported that it was useless to expect Mr. J. M. Nolan to continue in the office of Poor Rate Collector, as the state of his health would not permit it, and he proposed—"That Mr. Nolan's resignation be and is hereby accepted." Mr. O'Dwyer seconded. Passed.

#### MR. MAURICE J. O'SHAUGHNESSY

The Secretary reported that acting on the instructions given by the Council, at their meeting on the 7th January, regarding vacancies that may arise in the position of Rate Collector, Mr. Dunne had written stating that he, in conjunction with the local County Councillors, recommend that Mr. Maurice J. O'Shaughnessy be appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mr. Nolan, and that this recommendation had received the unanimous approval of all local bodies including Sinn Fein, Labour and Transport Workers' Union.

In this connection the Secretary reported that he was unable to act on the recommendation of Mr. Dunne, as the Council, at their previous meeting, declined to accept the resignation of Mr. Nolan, and until that resolution had been rescinded no steps could be taken to fill the appointment.

Mr. Leahy was opposed to the appointment of Mr. O'Shaughnessy as Rate Collector, he already holding the position of Road Foreman, and in his opinion, no person should hold two appointments.

Mr. Dunne intimated that it was Mr. O'Shaughnessy's intention to resign the position of Road Foreman.

The Secretary stated that an application for the appointment had also been received from Mr. Richard J. McCoy, of Ballyhahil.

Mr. McCann proposed—"That Mr. McCoy be appointed to complete the current collection.

Mr. Leahy seconded.

Mr. Dunne proposed—"That Mr. M. O'Shaughnessy be appointed.

Mr. Cahill seconded.

On a poll, there voted for Mr. McCoy—Messrs. Leahy, McCann, Naughton, Noonan, O'Dwyer, and O'Shea—(6)

For Mr. O'Shaughnessy—Messrs. Dunne, Cahill, Coleman, and Tobin—(4)

The Chairman declared Mr. McCoy elected.

Messrs. Laffan, Michael Ryan and the Chairman did not vote.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE, 7TH AND 15TH JANUARY

The recommendations of Finance Committee at meetings held on the 7th and 15th January, were taken as read, and on the proposition of Mr. McCann, unanimously adopted.

#### UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS COMMITTEE, 2ND FEBRUARY

The recommendations of University Scholarships Sub-Committee at meeting held on the 2nd February, were taken as read and unanimously adopted.

#### SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS

The Standing Orders were herenpon suspended, to admit of a deputation from the Trades Union being heard.

Mr. Carr and Mr. Cronin addressed the Council, and urged that persons employed by the Council at any particular class of work should be paid a flat standard rate of wages, and not left to the discretion of the County Surveyors, as appears to be the case at present—they also urged the necessity for the re-employment of engine-drivers and firemen whose services had been temporarily dispensed with, and they further asked that the period of the employment of the Carpenter, O'Halloran, be extended.

The deputation having withdrawn, a prolonged discussion took place, in the course of which Mr. Ryan pointed out that he was acting on the instructions of the Council in temporarily dispensing with the services of Engine Drivers and Firemen as he was ordered to discontinue for the present all steam-rolling on the roads.

The Committee suggested that Mr. Ryan should find employment for those men for at least three days a week, and pay them at the flat rate according to the class of work at which they would be engaged.

#### EMPLOYMENT IN FOYNES DISTRICT.

Mr. Cahill referred to the conditions obtaining in his district regarding employment, and stated that notwithstanding his very moderate resolution, the position was not one bit improved.

Mr. Ryan, County Surveyor, reported that he had given most definite instructions to the Road Foreman, J. O'Connor, regarding the matter complained of, and he understood that his instructions had been carried out, but if he found on investigation, which he proposed to institute at once, that the facts were as stated by Mr. Cahill, he would take steps to prevent its recurrence.

#### IRISH TRANSPORT AND GENERAL WORKER'S UNION (KILTEELY BRANCH)

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Kilteely Branch of the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union complaining of the dismissal of a surfaceman in the district. Referred to Mr. Davison, County Surveyor.

#### THOMAS FITZGERALD, BANOGUE.

An application from Mr. Thomas Fitzgerald, Banogue, for payment of a sum of £3 for trespass on his field and passage was referred to Mr. Ryan, County Surveyor, for report.

#### TIMOTHY LEDDIN, BALLYCAHILL.

Read letter from Mr. Timothy Leddin, complaining of the condition of the Ballycahill road which he states is almost impassable. Referred to Mr. Davison, County Surveyor.

#### FOOD AND DRUGS INSPECTORS.

A letter was read from the Secretary to the County Committee for Agriculture and Technical Instruction, transmitting copy of a resolution asking that powers be delegated to Mr. M. J. O'Leary, Ward's Hotel, Rathkeale, and Mr. Martin Gleeson, Cussen's Hotel, Kilmallock, Itinerant Instructors in Agriculture, to visit Creameries in the County for the purpose of taking samples of butter for analysis, and further that the Council be asked to notify the Creameries in the County that such powers have been delegated to the Instructors.

It was unanimously resolved that the recommendations contained in the resolution of the County Committee for Agriculture and Technical Instruction be hereby adopted.

#### MR. P. BUCKLEY.

A letter was read from Mr. P. Buckley, Abbeyfeale, controverting statements made by Collector M. Murphy regarding his action in connection with the payment of rates by tenants of labourer's cottages, and demanding that he be allowed an opportunity of meeting Mr. Murphy and having the matter investigated by the Finance Committee at their next meeting.

Ordered—"That Mr. Buckley and Collector Murphy be invited to attend next meeting."

#### GRIEVANCES OF ROAD WORKERS.

A letter was read from the President Irish Transport and General Workers' Union, Liberty Hall, Dublin, dated 21st January, transmitting copy of a letter addressed to the Department of Local Government setting out certain grievances of which the men employed by the County Council on the roads complain.

In this connection the question of the review of wages and conditions of employment which it was ordered should be held at the end of each period of six months was referred to, and after some discussion, the Council decided—"That the wages, &c., of men employed under the Direct Labour system be reviewed at the next meeting of Finance Committee, to which meeting was also referred the letter above mentioned from the President of the Irish Transport Worker's Union, also the consideration of flat rate of wages suggested by the deputation.

#### SURFACE TARRING GRANT.

Ministry of Transport, 25th January, stating that as the draft statement of the grant of £76 to the Limerick County Council towards the expenses of surface tarring forwarded for verification on the 2nd July last, has not been returned, it has been assumed that it will not be required and has accordingly been cancelled.

#### CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

The minutes of last meeting having been printed and circulated were taken as read and confirmed.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE, 4th FEBRUARY

The recommendations of the Finance Committee, at meeting held on the 4th February were read. A prolonged discussion took place regarding the estimated rate for coming financial year, and on the proposition of the Chairman, it was resolved—"That the estimate be referred back to the several District Councils, Boards of Guardians and Asylum, with a recommendation that it be re-considered, with a view, if at all possible, to its reduction." In the meantime it was resolved that the estimate as submitted by our Secretary and embodied in the recommendations of the Finance Committee be and is hereby provisionally approved, subject to any reductions which may be made by the above Public Bodies.

The Secretary was directed to send a notice to each Board of Guardians and District Council, to call a special meeting, within a week, to see if any reduction could be made.

#### SEPARATE CHARGES

The Council went seriatim through the items of separate charges. After discussion it was unanimously resolved—"That no rate be levied for Malicious Injury Claims, with the exception of those already paid."

In this connection the Secretary reported that a decree obtained by Mr. Cornelius Keogh, of Ballybrood, amounting to £975 2s. 9d. and two police decrees had been paid by the former Council though not included in the current levy, and it was therefore necessary that these sums should be included in the coming rate. Approved

#### FINANCES

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Munster & Leinster Bank, Cork, stating that acting on their Solicitor's advice they were unable to accede to the application made by the Chairman of the Limerick County Council for such additional financial accommodation as will enable the Council to discharge its liability to Subsidiary Bodies.

After some discussion it was resolved, on the proposition of the Chairman, seconded by Mr. Purcell—"That we make application to the Munster & Leinster Bank, Limerick, for a temporary loan of £20,000 on the joint security of the members of the Council present and any others whose guarantee is available, to enable us to meet our immediate liabilities."

With regard to the financial dead-lock that had arisen, the Secretary reported that he made application to two Banking Companies to accept the Treasurership, both of which refused, and the only means by which the difficulty might be overcome for the present would be by making cash payments.

The Council unanimously approved of this course.

#### STRIKING OF RATES, 1921-1922

Circular letter No. 35, from the Department of Local Government was read, in which it was pointed out that it is now essential that the Local Authorities functioning under the Government of the Irish Republic which was set up by the Irish People should exercise the greatest care in compiling estimates for the striking of rates for coming financial year, 1921-1922, and that while it is mandatory to strike rates sufficient to cover all expenditure necessary for the proper administration of Local Government, it should be borne in mind that higher rates without corresponding advantages to the community will operate against the new Councils—as a consequence it is essential that steps be taken to inaugurate every possible economy. Approved

#### COLLECTORS LODGMENTS

The Secretary reported that Collectors Murphy, William Hickey and Quirke still continue to make lodgements direct to the bank.

The Chairman and Mr. Laffan undertook to interview or communicate with Messrs. Hickey and Quirke.

#### GLIN PIER

A letter was read from Mr. J. Dunne, M.C.O., Glin, stating that he is informed locally that the Lower Shannon Steamship Co. handed over a shed on the Glin Pier, their property, to Messrs. Glynn & Sons, Kilrush, with the consent of the County Council, and enquiring if such is the case.

The Secretary reported that no application had been made to the Council, and no permission had been given for the transfer.

Ordered—"That the Lower Shannon Steamship Co. be asked for an explanation."

#### SALE OF FOOD AND DRUGS ACTS

Read letter from the Department of Agriculture, No. 689—19th February, that samples of butter obtained by an Inspector of the Department, from the Clouncaugh, Tormafield and Kilmallock Co-operative Dairy Societies, were found, on analysis, to contain respectively 19.6, 18 and 20 per cent of water, being in each case in excess of the proportion of water allowable under the Sale of Butter Regulations, 1902.

Ordered—"That the Department's Inspector, Mr. Kenny, be asked to attend to prosecute."

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#### MR. JOHN O'DONNELL

Read letter from the Local Government Board, No. 8028—3rd February, refusing to assent to the dismissal of Mr. John O'Donnell from the position of Rate Collector, and that he accordingly remains in office.

#### UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE CARDS

Read letter from the Ministry of Labour, No. E.B. 31476—17th February, calling the attention to their duty under the Unemployment Insurance (Collections of Contributions) Regulations, 1920. After some discussion it was resolved—"That a sum of £7 be advanced to each Road Foreman to enable them to stamp the Unemployment Insurance Cards."

#### REPRESENTATIVES ON COUNCIL OF AGRICULTURE

On the proposition of the Chairman, it was unanimously resolved—"That Messrs. Bart. Laffan and Michael Ryan be appointed to represent the Council on the Council of Agriculture."

A letter was read from the Department of Local Government, suggesting that those appointments be made in the interests of the country.

#### COUNTY INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Read letter from the National Health Insurance Committee, No. 6804—22nd February, declaring vacant the seat of Mr. Anthony Mackey, on the County Insurance Committee, owing to his absence from meetings for a period exceeding six months; also acknowledging the resignation of Mr. John O'Dwyer, from the same Committee, and requesting the County Council to appoint new members to fill those vacancies. No action taken.

#### QUARTERLY INSTALMENTS

Letters were read from several Clerks of Unions and District Councils, urgently demanding payment of the quarterly instalments due since 1st January. The Secretary reported that he hoped to be in a position to make payments to those Bodies in a few days.

#### MALICIOUS INJURY DECREES

A letter was read from Mr. P. T. Liston, Solicitor, applying for payment of decrees obtained by him against the County Council in cases of malicious injury, otherwise he must have the amounts collected as Garnishee Orders. No action taken.

#### ANALYST'S REPORT

Sir Charles Cameron's report on the articles submitted to him for analysis, during the quarter ended the 31st December, was taken as read and approved.

#### ROAD IMPROVEMENT SCHEME

Read letter from the Ministry of Transport, dated 21st February, stating that unless definite proposals are made before the 31st March, they will be obliged to cancel the Grant of £25,000, ear-marked for the roads in County Limerick.

It was Ordered that application be made to the Ministry of Transport for the amount due in respect of work already carried out on the Bruff, Cork and other roads.

#### STANDARD SCALE OF WAGES

Read letter from the Ministry of Labour, dated 19th inst., stating that twenty Trades Boards have been set up in addition to the Agricultural Wages Board, each of which has fixed different rates of wages for the workers concerned, and asking to be informed of the class of employees about whom the enquiry is sought.

Consideration adjourned for further particulars.

#### MR. JOHN O'HALLORAN

Read letter from Mr. John O'Halloran, Carpenter, applying for permission to be heard at the meeting.

Mr. Davison said he had no work for O'Halloran at present, and the Council considered that no useful purpose would be served by hearing him in the circumstances.

#### RETURN OF SALARIES

Read letter from the Department of Local Government, 30th January, asking to be furnished with a return of salaries and wages being paid to all officials and employees of the Council. Return forwarded.

#### MULKEAR DRAINAGE BOARD

Read letter from the Secretary of the Mulkear Drainage Board, stating that arrears are due by the Governors of the Erasmus Smith Estate, on the lands of Gortavalla, Dromlars, &c., and that he had applied to the agents, Messrs. Sanders & Son, for payment of the current year's rates, amounting to £133 14s. 9d.

In this connection a letter was read from Messrs. Darley, Orpen & Symott, asking to be furnished by the Secretary of the County Council, with a statement of any claim for maintenance by the Governors of Erasmus Smith Estate, due up to the 31st December last.

Read letter from the Clerk of the Limerick Union, stating that application had been made to Dail Eireann for a loan of £10,000 to enable that Body to tide over its financial difficulties, but were informed that applications of this character should be put before the Contributory Bodies, as no loans can be made to Subsidiary Bodies, and they now demand, if the County Council cannot supply the amount of the quarterly instalment due to the Board since 1st January, they will take immediate steps to negotiate for the Loan of £2000 from Dail Eireann.

Adjourned, pending the settlement of the financial question.

## LABOURERS' WAGES.

A letter was read from the Ministry of Labour, No. 2,064, dated 26th February, transmitting copy of the *Labour Gazette*, giving information regarding the average percentage increase in the cost of living since July, 1914.

The Assistant Secretary mentioned that the Chairman had expressed a desire that the revision of the wages of the road workmen generally, which was arranged to take place automatically at the end of each period of six months, should stand adjourned for a further period of three months.

Mr. McCann, however, proposed—"That the rate paid carters be revised," as a deputation had come from Newcastle for the purpose of representing to the Committee regarding the wrong basis on which the rate was fixed on the 17th July last.

Mr. McCann pointed out that prior to that date carters were allowed 12/- per day for man and horse to carry three quarters of a yard of material, the revised scale increasing the rate to 15/- per day to carry one yard, which was, in reality, no increase. Mr. McCann accordingly proposed—"That the rate of pay for man and horse be 15/- per day, but that they be required to carry only three quarters of a yard as formerly, same to be retrospective from the 17th July."

The question of the revision of the wages of other road workmen was adjourned for three months.

## HALF DAY ON SATURDAY.

Mr. Tobin referring to the weekly half-holiday granted to the road workers, stated that in all Trades Unions the half-day terminates at one o'clock, and as it was unreasonable to expect men to go without food until two o'clock as they are required to do at present, he proposed—"That the half-day on Saturdays finishes at one o'clock."

Mr. McCann seconded  
Mr. Noonan proposed a direct negative, but his proposal not receiving a second, Mr. Tobin's resolution was passed *non con.*

## APPLICATION FROM PETER O'SULLIVAN

A letter was read from Peter O'Sullivan, Sullymount, Castleconnell, applying for some financial assistance, as he was now beyond his work.

The Committee regretted that they were not empowered to assist the applicant in the direction sought.

## NEWPALLAS PETTY SESSIONS HOUSE

A letter was read from Mr. Joseph Cunningham, Newpallas, applying for the sum of £5, rent of Newpallas Petty Sessions House to date of surrender.

The Committee refused the application.

## COLLECTOR T. O'DWYER

A form of agreement in conformity with the revised rates for telephone services was submitted, and it was unanimously resolved that same be signed.

## COLLECTOR R. J. McCLOY

Read letter from Mr. R. J. McCoy, recently appointed Collector of Poor Rate, applying for an extension of at least two months from the 1st April, to complete his collection, as he did not obtain his books and collecting warrants until the middle of February.

The Committee granted Mr. McCoy an extension of time, to the 1st May, to close his collection.

## SHED ON GLIN PIER.

A letter was read from the Limerick Steamship Co. stating that there has been no transfer of their property on Glin Pier, to Messrs. Michael Glynn & Sons, Kilrush, but that they have rented the shed to them at a weekly tenancy.

The Committee were of opinion that it was not competent for the Limerick Steamship Company to take such a course without reference to the Council, and it was ordered "that the matter be referred to the Solicitor."

## WORKING OF DIRECT LABOUR.

A letter was read from the Clerk of Limerick No. 1 District Council, transmitting copy of resolution relative to the working of Direct labour, and making certain suggestions as to how the present system could be improved upon.

Mr. O'Farrell spoke to me about this matter some time ago, and I had the gully trap taken up and cleared. This did not effect any improvement, and about a week ago I gave instructions to my foreman to have the drain examined, and see what was the cause of the flooding.

I would point out, however, that Messrs. P. S. Connolly state in their letter that the defects only exist since the new drainage system was put down in Adare. The County Council had nothing to do with this drainage system, and if this is the cause of the flooding, it is more a matter for the District than the County Council.

Mr. Mackey proposed and it was unanimously Resolved:—"That the Road Improvement Scheme be proceeded with if the funds be provided by the Ministry of Transport."

#### MULCAIR DRAINAGE BOARD.

Further arising from the minutes Mr. Blackwell was of opinion that a sum of £500 would suffice for the needs of the Mulcair Drainage Board for coming year. In this opinion other members concurred, and it was ordered—"That the levy be limited to £500."

At the same time should this amount be later on found insufficient, the Council will be prepared on the recommendation of the Sub-Committee to approve of a supplementary levy.

Arising from the minutes, a prolonged discussion took place regarding the revision of the rate to be paid for carting, and having heard a statement from Mr. Ryan, County Surveyor, the Council unanimously decided to leave the order providing for the carting of a yard of material to stand, but that it be left to the discretion of the County Surveyor to make allowance where the cartage of a full yard is not possible owing to the hilly nature of the country.

#### MEASUREMENT OF MATERIALS

Mr. Blackwell reported that several complaints had been made to him regarding short loads, in reply to which Mr. Davison stated that all materials were measured and payment was made not on the load but on the actual measurement.

#### CHARGE FOR EMPLOYMENT

Mr. Mackey stated that it was reported to him by a respectable man in his district that a fee of 2/6 is charged before employment can be obtained on the roads.

On the proposition of Mr. Tobin, it was ordered—"That Mr. Mackey's informant be asked to appear before the next meeting of County Council."

#### HALF DAY ON SATURDAY

Further, arising from the minutes, Mr. Michael Ryan proposed—"That the half-day on Saturday remain as heretofore—Two o'clock."

Mr. Mackey seconded  
This amendment was, however, not pressed to a division on hearing a statement from Mr. Ryan, and on the proposition of Mr. Naughton, seconded by Mr. Blackwell, the recommendations of Finance Committee at meeting held on the 12th March, were unanimously adopted.

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#### FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

In view of the failure to obtain a Banking Company to act as Treasurer, the Secretary was directed to make the best arrangements he could to meet the Council's financial obligations, especially with regard to men working on the roads, and payment of out-door relief.

#### COLLECTOR JAMES O'CONNOR.

The Chairman made a statement regarding the collection of Mr. O'Connor, and in connection therewith a letter was read from Mr. D. O'Leary, Manager, Munster and Leinster Bank, Bruff, regarding a cheque for £140 drawn on the Hospital Branch and cashed by him, to meet which it was found there were not sufficient funds.

The Secretary reported that he was now in a position to satisfactorily adjust this matter, and it was ordered "That immediate steps be taken to do so."

#### MISSING RECEIPTS.

The Chairman referred to some receipts which were found to be missing from the collecting books of Mr. Horgan, and directed the Secretary to have the matter looked into.

#### POUNDAGE FEES AND ARREARS.

The Chairman proposed and it was unanimously resolved—"That those collectors who closed their warrants be paid their poundage fees forthwith, and that they further receive as soon as their lists shall have been checked their arrears both recoverable and irrecoverable, their time for closing the warrants having already been extended to the 31st March, with the privileges of having closed by the 28th February."

#### NEWCASTLE DISTRICT COUNCIL TREASURERSHIP.

A letter was read from the Clerk of the Newcastle District Council stating that none of the three banks in Newcastle would act as Treasurer to the District Council.

#### DEPUTATION re J. O'HALLORAN

The Standing Orders were hereupon suspended to admit of a deputation being heard in support of the claim of J. O'Halloran to be re-employed as carpenter.

Messrs. Carr and Cronin addressed the Council, and pointed out that since O'Halloran's services had been dispensed with, after seven or eight years' service, on account of there not being sufficient work, still they were informed that work was being sent out by contract.

Mr. Davison stated that the only work sent out was that due to O'Halloran having left his employment before his time was up.

It was ordered—"That Mr. O'Halloran get preference in any future work of his trade which may be required."

The deputation were not satisfied with the explanation given by Mr. Davison, and undertook to produce at next meeting evidence of carpentry work being contracted out.

#### MR. J. M. NOLAN.

Read letter from Mr. J. M. Nolan, Retired Poor Rate Collector, applying for the Superannuation allowance to which his years of service entitled him.

In this connection the Secretary reported that the old regulations prescribed that a month's clear notice must be given to each member of the Council before any proposal to grant a Superannuation allowance can become effective.

It was decided to conform to the same procedure in this case.

Mr. Laffan stated that after the meeting he would hand in the necessary notice.

#### ADDITIONAL MUNSTER FAIR.

Read letter from Mr. John Cahill, Lessee of the Tolls of the Munster Fairs, stating that it was the desire of a number of cattle dealers and farmers that an additional fair should be held in the middle of April, and asking that the Council would authorise same.

It was unanimously resolved—"That the holding of an additional fair on Friday, the 15th April, be authorised."

#### ANALYST'S REPORT.

The following Report from Sir Charles Cameron on the articles submitted to him for analysis during the quarter ended the 31st December were examined and approved.

Report of Sir Charles Cameron, C.B., M.D., Public Analyst for the County of Limerick, on articles submitted to him for analysis during the quarter ended 31st December, 1920.

There were no articles received from the Food Inspectors, R.I.C.

There was one specimen of butter analysed by directions from the Department of Agriculture, Upper Merion Street, Dublin, which was taken up in the County Limerick. It contained an excess of water, namely, 16.8 per cent.

Three specimens of butter analysed for the Oola Co-operative Society, Oola, contained 16.6, 19.3 and 19.6 per cent of water respectively.

A specimen of milk analysed for Mr. Wm. Hickey, Boher, was of rich quality.

A specimen of milk analysed for Mr. P. Bateman, Castlerkin, Ballybrood, was of rich quality.

A specimen of milk analysed for Mr. M. Gleeson, Bruff, was above the average quality of pure milk.

A specimen of milk analysed for Mr. J. Fitzgerald, Ballyneety, was of rich quality.

A specimen of milk analysed for Mr. T. Hussey, Ballyneety, was of rich quality.

A specimen of milk analysed for the Herbertstown Co-operative Society, Knocklong, was adulterated with at least 102 parts of added water, and was also deficient of at least 36 per cent of its fats.

A specimen of beet root analysed for Mr. J. A. Smyth, Rathanny, Hospital, contained 12.5 per cent of sugar.

For Tipperary Union, which is partly situated in the County Limerick, three drugs were analysed and were correct.

A letter was read from Mr. John English, Kilglass, asking to be compensated for quarry material, estimated to be value for £10, which the military comandeered to fill in a trench on the road. Referred to Mr. Davison.

## DAY FOR MEETINGS.

A letter was read from Mr. Michael Cahill, M.C.C., asking if it could be arranged that meetings of County Council and Finance Committee could be held on Saturdays. No action taken.

## REPAIRS TO COUNTY COURTHOUSE

The Council unanimously refused an application from Mr. Lucas, Sub-Sheriff, to have certain repairs to County Court-House carried out.

## MR. P. D. MAGNER

A letter was read from Mr. P. D. Magner, retired Poor Rate Collector, applying for a refund of the arrears for half-year ended 30th September, 1920, which were found to be uncollectible, transmitting lists of same. Adjourned

## COLLECTOR G. E. FARMER

The following letter from Mr. Farmer was read:—

Dear Sir—I would be very much obliged if you would bring under the notice of the Council the following case:—There is a lane in Croom occupied by very poor people, the houses are wretched and some, I am informed, have been condemned by the Sanitary Authorities. For many years the landlord paid the rates, however, when he died and his son obtained the property he soon gave the practice up. Since then, though I have tried my utmost, and taken various proceedings, with no result, I see no prospect whatever of getting in these rates, and as the sum is getting considerable, it is a matter of the greatest importance to me. I may add that I have not one penny refunded me, except for houses down and empty, for the last eight years, during which I must have collected over £50,000, so that it seems very hard if I have to pay this sum out of my own pocket

## RATHKEALE BRANCH I. T. &amp; G. W. U.

## KILTEELY BRANCH I. T. &amp; G. W. U.

Read letter from P. Oliver, Secretary Kilteely Branch Transport Workers' Union, asking what action has been taken by the Council on the subject of their complaint. Referred to Mr. Davison.

## THE LATE SEAN FINN.

On the proposition of Mr. Cahill, seconded unanimously, it was Resolved:—“That we, the Limerick County Council, tender our sincerest sympathy and condolence to the parents and other relatives of the late Sean Finn of Rathkeale, Commandant in the Irish Republican Army, who was killed in action on the 30th March, 1921. A copy of this resolution to be sent to his father.”

## THE LATE JAMES CRAWFORD.

Mr. Purcell proposed and it was unanimously Resolved:—“That we, the Limerick County Council, tender our deepest sympathy and condolence to the parents and other relatives of the late James Crawford who was recently killed by forces of the Crown. A copy of the foregoing resolution to be sent to his father.”

## AMALGAMATION OF UNIONS.

The minutes of proceedings of Conference, convened for the purpose of considering the question of the amalgamation of such Poor Law Unions in the County Limerick as should be deemed necessary, held on the 25th February, 1921, were read, and on the proposition of Mr. Laffan, seconded by Mr. Purcell, unanimously adopted.

The Secretary stated that it would be necessary for the Council, at this meeting, to appoint its six representatives on the Governing Body of the Hospital and Home.

After a prolonged discussion it was unanimously resolved:—“That the following members represent the County Council—The Chairman, Messrs. Michael Ryan, McCann, Laffan, Michael Coleman and David Naughton.

## ROAD PAYMENTS; &amp;c.

The schedules of payment for road maintenance were examined and the payments having been certified to be in order, it was unanimously resolved—“That Treasurer's Authority be signed for payments amounting to £2,611 4s. 4d.”

## RATE COLLECTION

The Secretary reported that all the Collectors had closed their warrants, with the exception of the four recently appointed, together with Mr. William Hickey and Mr. Michael Murphy.

A sum of £12,054 still remains outstanding, but that is principally accounted for by the four newly-appointed Collectors. In the case of Collector Hickey, a sum of £689 remains outstanding, which he promised to lodge on Tuesday next, and in the case of Collector Murphy, a sum of £349 is still unlodged for the past half-year, together with a sum of £370 out of the September warrant.

The Secretary stated that no poundage fees had been paid Collector Murphy in respect of either warrant.

## NON-STAMPING OF UNEMPLOYMENT CARDS.

Gentlemen—As workmen are continually calling here with regard to the non-stamping of Unemployment Cards, I should like a direction from you on the matter.

As Council is responsible for the stamping of these cards I should like to impress on this meeting that it is not my office which is to blame.

The Foremen cannot be expected to put on stamps until they get the money passed some time ago for the purpose.

The Secretary reported, in this connection, that a sum of £7 had been passed for each Foreman at last Council meeting for the purpose of stamping unemployment cards, and the cause of complaint will have been removed by now.

Gentlemen—My Foreman, Wm. Scanlan, reports that the mountain floods have swept away portion of this bridge causing some damage—it is on the main road. Estimated cost of repairs £7, half county, half district charge. Your obedient servant, ROBERT DAVISON, County Surveyor. Approved.

## NEWCASTLE WEST COURTHOUSE.

Dear Sir—I enclose herewith report received from Mr. J. D. Leahy, Assistant Surveyor, Newcastle West, in connection with rent due on the above, and should be glad if you will bring the matter before the County Council. Yours faithfully, T. F. RYAN, County Surveyor.

Captain W. E. V. Clarke, War Department Valuer, 4 Lower Cecil Street, Limerick, was here to-day inspecting premises occupied by the military. He called on me and wanted to know what claim the Council were making for rent for the Courthouse. He stated the claim for rent had nothing to say to reinstating the premises in their former condition, that would be considered later on. Call on him at above address. I said I would communicate with you and left it so.

After some discussion Mr. Ryan was directed to make application for a rental calculated on the value of the building (estimated to be about £5,000) invested at 8 per cent, viz.: £400 per annum.

#### QUARTERLY INSTALMENTS.

Letters were read from several Clerks of Unions and District Councils applying for payment of quarterly instalments due on the 1st April.

It was unanimously resolved, on the proposition of the Chairman, "That payment be deferred for the present."

#### TIPPERARY BOARD OF GUARDIANS.

Read letter from the Clerk of Tipperary Board of Guardians requesting payment of quarterly instalments together with a sum of £48 due since 1st October last in respect of re-payment of loans.

The Secretary reported that the amounts due the various bodies for repayment of Loans had in every case been withheld as the instalments were not being forwarded to the Board of Works.

#### CROOM AND NEWCASTLE DISTRICT COUNCILS.

Letters were read from the Croom and Newcastle District Councils regarding change of Treasurership

#### KILMALLOCK No. 3 COLLECTION.

Read letter from the Clerk of Kilmallock Union stating that receipts amounting to £489 12s. 7d. are missing from the books of the No. 3 Collection District, but he understands that, though the receipts are detached, the amount is still uncollected and should adjust itself when the full amount of the warrant is being lodged.

#### GLIN DISTRICT SCHOOL.

Mr. Purcell stated that his attention had been directed to the fact that the instalment due to the Glin District Council had not been paid by some Unions, and was causing grave financial trouble.

The Secretary reported that each Union had received payment in full of the instalment for quarter ended the 31st March, which included in every case the amount due the Glin District School.

The Secretary was directed to find out the Bodies that were in arrear and inform them that a complaint has been made regarding their failure to pay their instalments to this Institution.

#### MALICIOUS INJURY DECREES.

Letters were read from Messrs. Blood-Smyth and W. E. O'Brien, Solicitors, applying for payment of Decrees obtained against the Council in cases of Malicious Injury. No action taken.

#### PAYMENT OF DECREES ALREADY LEVIED.

Letters were read from Messrs. P. T. Liston and R. D. F. Johnston, applying for payment of Decrees obtained against the Council in cases of Malicious Injury, and which had been included in the Rate Levy for year ended the 31st March.

On the proposition of Mr. Laffan, seconded by the Chairman, it was resolved:—"That all Decrees which have been levied and collected be paid."

#### CASTLEROBERTS QUARRY.

Read letter from Messrs. R. D. O'Brien & Co., Estate Agents, regarding a further encroachment on the Castleroberts Quarry, extending in this case to seven perches. Referred to Mr. Ryan.

#### ROXBOROUGH QUARRY.

Read letter from Mr. O'Donnell, Solicitor, stating that he has been instructed by Mr. Martin Sheahan to institute proceedings against the County Council, unless the sum of £120 10s. 0d., due to him in respect of Roxborough quarry be paid.

Mr. Davison reported that he brought this matter before the former Council on the 27th March, 1920, his report on that occasion reading as following:—"I have seen Mr. Martin Sheahan, and he is prepared to sell his quarry. He wants £100 for a Statute Acre, with free passage through his land. We are at present paying, under Quarry Order, £2 per perch for surface damage, and £8 per annum for breaking ground and passage. If we could purchase quarry outright for £2 per perch, and free of passage rental, it would be much better value to the Council."

The stone is known as Olivine basalt and is an excellent stone for road making."

Mr. Davison further reported that Mr. Sheahan did not accept the above-mentioned offer, but he thought if it were renewed he would do so now.

After some discussion the Secretary was directed to renew the previous offer to Mr. Sheahan, the particulars to be furnished to the Secretary by Mr. Davison.

#### SMITH ESTATE, RHEBOGUE.

Read letter from Messrs. Brown & Wickham, Estate Agents, stating that one or two yards of the boundary wall between the lands of the above estate and the county road had been knocked down, and asking to have same repaired.

At the suggestion of Mr. Davison it was decided to take no action.

#### KILTEELY ROAD-WORKERS' COMPLAINT.

Read letter from the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union, Kilteely Branch, complaining of the delay in dealing with a report, made several weeks ago, regarding the refusal of the County Surveyor to pay a man named Fleming and certain others employed by him while acting as Surfaceman.

In this connection Mr. Davison reported as follows:—

JOHN FLEMING'S CLAIM.

Dear Sir,  
Re enclosed leaflet, John Fleming (Junior) assumed that he could take over duties not assigned to him by me, and I wrote to him on November 22nd last, as follows:—

"I have not given you a position on the roads, but I have your letter which you sent to my Foreman stating you have taken up position as Surfaceman. I have instructed the Foreman not to return any time for you. Do not therefore interfere in any way on the County roads without my instructions."

Under the circumstances I cannot see my way to authorize payment for any of those men taken on by Fleming.

Read letter from Collector Horgan transmitting receipts for the estate of James McCarthy, Garrincurra, per Mr. James Liston, Solicitor, as he arranged to pay the amount.

#### CONCILIATION BOARDS

The following letter from the Department of Labour was read:—

#### SCHEME FOR THE CREATION OF CONCILIATION BOARDS

- 1 The Name of the Board shall be the.....Conciliation Board
- 2 The object of the Conciliation Board shall be to endeavour to adjust amicably any disputes that threaten or result in a strike or lock-out

#### CONSTRUCTION

- 3 The Chairman of the Council shall, on learning of the existence of a labour dispute, immediately invite both parties, to the dispute to elect representatives to a Conciliation Board, which shall consist of an equal number from each party, and a neutral Chairman. The Chairman of the Council shall be prepared to act as Chairman of the Conciliation Board, but shall stand down if another Chairman is mutually agreed upon by the parties to the dispute. In the event of a neutral Chairman not being agreed to, the Chairman of the Council shall request both parties to the dispute to agree to a neutral, non-resident Chairman, appointed by Dail Eireann. All the expenses incurred by the provision of such a Chairman shall be borne by Dail Eireann
- 4 There shall be two Secretaries, one appointed by each party to the dispute

#### PROCEDURE

- 5 A dispute shall be said to be in existence when negotiations between the parties concerned are likely to result in a dead-lock
- 6 The duty of the Board shall be to hear both parties to the dispute, and endeavour to settle it amicably
- 7 The recognised rights of both parties in any dispute must not be interfered with in any way
- 8 The Board shall be convened when negotiations have broken down between the Employees or their Union, and the Employers, and a strike or lock-out is threatened

- 9 The Board shall meet not later than three days after it has been convened by the Chairman of the Council
- 10 Unless the dispute has already resulted in a stoppage of work, strike, or lock-out, none shall take place until the Board has dealt with the matter in dispute, or has definitely failed to effect a settlement
- 11 No decision of the Board shall be published unless it is unanimous
- 12 Minutes of the proceedings shall be kept by the Secretaries, and submitted to the Chairman for his confirmation

#### ARBITRATION

- 13 In the event of the Conciliation Board failing to secure an amicable settlement, a dispute may, if both parties consent, be submitted to arbitration by a person agreed on, or failing such agreement, the Minister for Labour, Dail Eireann, shall, on request from both parties, appoint an arbitrator to decide the points at issue

The Council unanimously approved of the Scheme.

#### ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF VOTE OF SYMPATHY.

Read letter from Mr. James Crawford, Glenlara, Knocklong, thanking the Council for the vote of sympathy passed to him on the death of his son.

#### COMPOSITION OF SENATE OF SOUTHERN IRELAND.

Read letter from the Clerk of the Crown and Hanaper stating that the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, provides that the Senate of Southern Ireland shall include fourteen Representatives of County Councils to be elected by the members of County Councils voting as Provinces, four of which members are to be elected by the Province of Munster, and asking to be furnished with a list of the members of the Limerick County Council for the purpose of framing a correct Register of Electors. No action taken.

#### RATES ON COTTAGES.

Attention was directed by the Secretary to the extraordinarily large number of persons in occupation of labourers' cottages who were returned by the Collectors as being in arrear with the payment of their rates, and he understood that in some cases there was a combination amongst the occupiers to evade payment.

#### QUORUM FOR MEETINGS

The Secretary drew attention to the necessity for reducing the number necessary to form a quorum, owing to the difficulty he experienced in getting the required number present on the occasions of meetings, due largely to the reduction of members originally appointed on the Committee.

The Committee were not in agreement with the suggestion that the quorum for meetings should be reduced—they were of opinion that the existing vacancies on the Committee should be ~~replaced by~~ <sup>filled</sup> persons whose services were likely to be available when the occasion of meetings required.

Father Wall accordingly proposed—"That Alderman Mrs O'Douovan, Limerick, be recommended to the County Council for co-option on the Committee."

Miss Knox seconded. Passed unanimously.

Rev. Father Hayes proposed—"That Rev. Father Coughlan, S.J., Munger College, be also recommended for co-option." Rev. Father Wall seconded. Passed unanimously.

The Committee undertook to submit the names of other suitable persons to replace those whose services have been deprived them.

#### SUBJECTS OF EXAMINATION IN MATHEMATICS

Read letter from the Local Government Department, dated 18th April, stating, with reference to the minutes of the University Scholarships Committee, that they cannot agree to the recommendations of the Scholarships Committee on the following details, and they consider that:

- (a) Algebra, Arithmetic, Geometry and Trigonometry, should form one subject.
- (b) That three subjects at least must be taken in the subject of Commerce, and a candidate for a Scholarship in Commerce must present this subject for examination.

After discussion, Father Wall proposed, Father Hayes seconded, and it was resolved—"That this Committee consider that it would be unfair to candidates, who have selected Mathematics as a subject for the coming examinations, to compel them to take the four parts of Mathematics, viz.:—Algebra, Arithmetic, Geometry and Trigonometry as one subject—the Committee consider that owing to the late period of the announcement sufficient notice has not been given to candidates, and that the Department be requested to defer the enforcement of this Order until the Scheme is being revised for the coming year."

#### DATE OF EXAMINATIONS FOR UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS

It was unanimously resolved—"That the examinations for University Scholarships commence on Monday, 4th July, and continue from day to day while the subjects require."

#### DATE OF EXAMINATIONS FOR SECONDARY SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS

It was unanimously resolved—"That the examinations for Scholarships from Primary to Secondary Schools, commence on Monday, 11th July."

#### ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT AT EXAMINATIONS.

On the proposition of Father Wall, seconded by Father Hayes, it was resolved—"That Mrs. George Clancy be again invited to assist our Secretary in superintending the forthcoming examinations, the same remuneration as in previous years to be allowed to both officials."

#### APPOINTMENT OF EXAMINERS.

The Secretary reported that the examiners had hitherto been selected from amongst the Professors of the University Colleges, Dublin and Cork.

The Committee were of opinion that it would be eminently desirable on this occasion to secure examiners who would be in sympathy with the scheme, and the Secretary was directed to interview Professor O'Rahilly, of University College, Cork, about recommending the names of persons who would be suitable for such appointments.

#### REPORT FROM UNIVERSITY COLLEGE CORK.

A report was read from the Secretary, University College, Cork, stating that the conduct and attendance of students holding Scholarships from the Limerick County Council had been most satisfactory during the preceding term.

The Secretary reported that he had not yet received the report from University College, Dublin, but he had seen on the press that the students whose time had been extended to complete their examinations had all successfully passed.

Mr. Mackey proposed—"That we, the Limerick County Council, at Special Meeting assembled, place on record our sense of the grievous loss this Council has sustained by the tragic death of our beloved Chairman, Sean Wall, who so willingly gave up his life for the sake of Ireland and Freedom. During the time he spent amongst us he proved himself a sterling and uncompromising lover of his country. He proved himself in his capacity of Chairman a wise and skilful administrator, and he moreover endeared himself to his colleagues on this Council by his kindly disposition and warm heart.

We tender to his afflicted widow and orphans, and to his brothers, the Rev. Thomas Wall and Mr. Wm. Wall, our heartfelt sympathy in their loss, and we adjourn all the business of this Meeting as a mark of respect."
