### **Swifts**

- Small migratory bird
- Weigh as little as a Cadbury's Cream Egg
- Built to spend most of their lives in constant flight
- Only ever landing to nest.
- Numbers have declined by approx. 40% across Ireland in the last 10 years
- Swifts are now on to the RED List, (highest level of conservation concern), in the recently released Birds of Conservation Concern in Ireland 2020-2026

### **Swifts**

- Winter in Sub-Saharan African countries
- Summer in Europe including Ireland (May – end August)
- Drink, feed, sleep & mate on the wing.
- Fly up to 22,000 Km a year.
- Feed on flying insects










# **Swifts**

- Colonial nesters
- Pair for life
- Swifts never nest in their 1<sup>st</sup> year
- Breed throughout Ireland
- Site-faithful, meaning they will return to the same nest site for many years.








# Limerick City Nest Box Swifts

EUROPEAN GREEN LEAF

An initiative of the European Commission

- Young Swifts (teenagers)prospect for nest sites all summer
- They may not begin to roost till late July onwards.
- These young swifts are the birds we are trying to attract to the new sites with the site "call" lures.
- The lure increases the chances of attracting 'first time' nesters to the sites. The volume is on a timer and set to normal birdsong levels.

### Which species?

These four summer visitors to Ireland are often mistaken for each other. This poster will help you identify each species and their nests correctly.

### Nest sites

The nest shape, structure and type is also characteristic of each species.



 Swift nests are always tucked away within buildings, including on roof plates, under roof tiles, in small gaps in masonry and



- Sickle shaped win
- Short forked tail



### House Martin

- White underparts, inky blue above with a distinctive white rump
- · Short wings and short forked tai



### Swallov

- White underparts with inky blue "hood" and red chin
- Long forked tail, much longer than other three species



### Sand Martin

- White underparts with distinctive brown chest ba
- Short wings and short forked tail



 Swallows build a half cup nest with mud pellets. Nests are built under shelter, including in sheds, porches and lean-tos.



 House Martins build an almost fully enclosed cup nest with mud pellets. Nests are built under the eaves of houses and long terraces of nests can form.



 Sand Martin nests are found at the end of small burrowed chambers. These burrows are usually excavated in sandy banks along rivers and within quarries.



- Limerick has Sand Martins colonies nesting in the walls of the quays along the Shannon and Abbey Rivers.
- These are sometimes confused with Swifts. However Swifts are:
  - Bigger
  - Have characteristic sickleshaped wings
  - Look completely black (Sand Martins are white below)

### Nature and Biodiversity in your Locality / An Dúlra agus an Bhithéagsúlacht i do cheantar:

With Westfields, the Peoples Park, other green areas, the mature trees and hedges and the River Shannon you have a great variety of habitats for wildlife. We must also remember that birds use crevices in buildings as nesting sites. We noted the bee hive in the grounds of the Hunt Museum with bees entering and leaving as we watched. Bug hotels are fascinating for children and so we were delighted that St. Mary's Men's Shed have made some for you. ## Swift Nest Box Sites selected





- 1. The Hunt Museum,
- 2. St. Mary's Cathedral
- 3. Limerick City and County Council, Merchant's Quay,
- 4. King John's Castle Exhibition Centre and
- The Louvres of St. Michael's Church on Barrington Street,

This is a total of 39 possible individual nests for the newly arrived birds to use





### Procurement



- Four contractors were contacted by email and asked to quote for this project.
- MP Joyce Contracting, Patrickswell were the successful contractors.
- In terms of the electrical works required although straight forward each building requested their 'regular' electrical contractor was used.
- Working at heights important element as Swifts nest at 5m plus from ground (includes flat roofs)
- Once the work was planned all boxes were installed within a two day period.






# Types of Swift Nest Boxes Used

Custom built boxes were required for the louvres of St Michaels Bell Tower.




Triple Entry Anti-Predator Swift Nest-Box

### Conditions

1. This licence shall be produced for inspection on a request being made on that behalf by a member of An Garda Siochána or any person appointed by the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, under Section 72 of the Wildlife Acts 1976 to 2018, to be an authorised person for the purpose of the Acts.



- 2. This licence may be revoked at any time by the Minister for Housing, Local Government
- 3. The applicant must ensure that landowner permission is received to enter onto private land(s) before this licence can be exercised.
- 4. Licence Duration Date of issue to 01 September 2025.
- 5. Licence valid only for area stated overleaf.
- 6. Licence valid only for licensee stated overleaf.
- 7. Licence valid only for species stated overleaf
- 8. Note: Buildings with opposed glass windows should be avoided, either as places for swift boxes or very close by. There is a danger of swifts colliding with such windows, even relatively small windows giving swifts the illusion that they can fly through the building.

The licensee must adhere to the measures and restrictions relating to public health on Covid-19



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# Swift nest boxes for new builds





During the Swift site survey the team met with Limerick 2030 representatives with a view to Swift nest boxes being incorporated into the buildings being redeveloped as part of Limerick 2030 and beyond.

Also often recommended as part of planning conditions.





# Swifts in RTE's 'Back from the Brink 'with Derek Mooney





- In the Netherlands, conservation measures to provide safe city-centre nesting sites for the Common Swift have been helping these amazing migratory birds to live up to their name and once again become common.
- Masters of flight, they spend more time on the wing than any other creature, only landing each summer to lay their eggs and rear their chicks, then flying non-stop for nine months. They don't just tolerate urban development, they can thrive in it.
