London's first dockless hire bike scheme launches

Obike have become the first dockless hire bike company to launch in the capital, following similar schemes in Manchester and Cambridge

ondon's first dockless hire bikes were launched on Wednesday morning in the first phase of what is expected to be a rapid rollout of the machines by Singapore-based company Obike to cities across the UK.



Dockless Bike Hire Schemes

- Dockless Bike Hires schemes are a form of bike rental whereby members of the scheme pick up a bike at one location and drop it back at the same or another location when the journey is complete.
- Limerick's current Coke Zero bike share scheme requires the bikes to be docked at physical docking stations; a dockless bike doesent require to be docked but many authorities do stipulate that they are locked to 'Sheffield stands'.
- Dockless bikes overcome the geographical range imposed by bike share docking stations.
- They provide users with the flexibility to leave bikes where they end their journey, which may not be at a docking station.
- Key to these schemes is the use of technology embedded within the bikes.



Dockless Bike Schemes

Limerick City and County Council has been approached by a number of potential operators
of dockless bike share schemes.

- Limerick City perceived as having good market potential and will continue to attract potential operators.
- A dockless bike hire scheme would be complimentary to the existing docked Coke Zero Scheme – as per Dublin's example where the docked scheme and dockless schemes coexist




Dockless Bike Schemes in Ireland currently

Dublin

- Bleeperbike and Moby bikes are the current operators in Dublin.
- The bikes are mainly located in areas currently not serviced by Just Eat dublinbikes.
- Bleeper and Moby currently operate in Dublin City, Fingal County, and Dun Laoghaire Rathdown.

Dockless Bike Schemes in Ireland currently

Sligo

- Had an initial pilot in 2018 and a more formal pilot following a tender process in 2019.
- Bikelink were the operator. Scheme ceased owing to Covid-19.

Bikelink hopes its Sligo launch will be a blueprint for bike-sharing in smaller cities and towns

The business is talking with 14 other councils about launching programmes.



BIKELINK, A SLIGO-BASED bike sharing company, is launching its bikes in the Connacht city this summer in the hopes of proving a model for such programmes in the regions.


The company recently secured a contract from Sligo County Council – **the scheme was put out to tender in February** – that will see the company roll out 50 bikes initially, with plans for up to 100.

Bikelink is hoping to replicate the success of stationless bike-sharing schemes seen in larger cities but in smaller towns and rural areas.

Benefits / Challenges

Benefits:

- Reduces city's carbon footprint
- Physical and mental health benefits
- Attractive for tourists and commuters
- Can contribute to growing the uptake of cycling as a mode of transport.
- Opportunity to expand bike sharing services outside the city centre.
- Opportunity to harness private investment.
- Capital and operating costs for the Council will be zero /low.
- Does not require intensive docking infrastructure (just Sheffield stands).
- IOT (Internet of Things) enabled possibilities of city harnessing cycling data.
- Potential start-up opportunities for entrepreneurs

Challenges:

- Co-existence with NTA Coke Zero Bike Scheme managing competition between schemes.
- Bikes can be 'abandoned' anywhere i.e. on footpaths or other unsuitable (and illegal) locations.
- Bikes can be 'taken' i.e. users could keep bikes in gated communities.
- Availability of space for parking bikes.



Next Steps

- Draft Bye-laws and commence public consultation process
- Present report on public consultation on draft bye-laws to SPC /recommendation to Full Council to adopt bye-laws
- Council adopts Bye-laws
- Conduct competition for Operator's licence
- Issue licence to successful operator
