At the outset, the Cathaoirleach welcomed Members, Officials, Members of the Press and the Public to the Blended Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick. The Cathaoirleach also welcomed the Journalism Students from University of Limerick who were joining the Meeting Online.

1. Support Services Directorate

Draft Budgetary Plan 2022 – General Municipal Allocation

Circulated, Report of the Deputy Chief Executive dated 7th October, 2021, setting out the background to the General Municipal Allocation (GMA) and noting that the total provisional allocation for the GMA for 2022 was €1,403,000 of which €568,000 had been allocated to the Metropolitan District in the Draft Budgetary Plan 2022.

The Deputy Chief Executive stated that the Draft Budgetary Plan 2022 for the Metropolitan District of Limerick, which had been discussed at a Workshop earlier, if approved by the Members, would be included in the main budget for the Council.

3. Disposal of Land

- (a) Circulated, report of the Head of Property and Community Facilities dated 6th October, 2021 setting out proposals to dispose of property at Rathmale, Mungret, Co. Limerick and the intention to bring a Section 183 Notice to Full Council in this regard, for approval.

The report, as circulated, was noted by Members.

- (b) Circulated, report of the Head of Property and Community Facilities dated 12th October, 2021 setting out proposals to dispose of property at Parnell Street, Limerick and the intention to bring a Section 183 Notice to Full Council in this regard, for approval.

The report, as circulated, was noted by Members.

- (c) Circulated, report of the Head of Property and Community Facilities dated 7th October, 2021 setting out proposals to dispose of land at Long's Lane, Limerick and the intention to bring a Section 183 Notice to Full Council in this regard, for approval.

Members raised a number of queries in relation to the site valuation and proposals for the development of the site at Long's Lane. It was agreed to defer the item until further information was received.

It was proposed by Councillor Kiely and seconded by Councillor Novak Uí Chonchúir that a Workshop would be arranged for Members on the Disposal process.

4. Planning, Environment and Place-Making Directorate

Part 8 Procedure – Mount Saint Oliver Cemetery Wall, Limerick

Circulated, Report of the Director of Service, Planning, Environment and Place-Making Directorate dated 11th October, 2021 and enclosed Chief Executive's Report dated 11th October, 2021 setting out details in relation to the proposed construction of a new Boundary Wall at Mount Saint Oliver Cemetery, Kilmallock Road, Limerick. The report had been prepared in accordance with Section 179 3(a) of the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as amended) and Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations, 2001 (as amended) and noted that it was proposed to proceed in accordance with Section 5 of the report.

Members welcomed the proposed construction of the boundary wall, as it was urgently required for the graveyard and along this section of road. Members noted the long timeline in getting the project to this stage and the likely increased costs due to these delays. Members highlighted that an additional bus stop, as well as cycle lanes to access the City centre, should also be provided in the area.

It was proposed by Councillor Slattery, seconded by Councillor Kiely and agreed to approve the Part 8, subject to the amendment that a section of the footpath at the development location on the Old Cork Road, also be removed.

QUESTIONS

5. Question submitted by Councillor J. Leddin

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick how many Council owned houses have been sold over the previous three years and why these houses were not upgraded for letting.

REPLY: Over the past 18 months, the Derelict Sites Section has compulsorily acquired a number of residential properties in the Metropolitan District. These properties are assessed by the Housing Directorate as to whether they are suitable for social housing.

If they are not deemed to be suitable properties for social housing then they are transferred to the Property and Community Facilities Department to be put on the open market for sale. These will subsequently be brought to the Metropolitan District Meetings for noting before they are brought to Full Council.

A small number of these properties that are located in the Metropolitan District are currently in the process of being disposed of, having been approved at Full Council.

6. **Question submitted by Councillor C. Sheehan**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick for a list of current Limerick City and County Council residential properties currently listed for sale or disposal.

REPLY: The Council has the following Council-owned residential properties currently listed for sale / disposal in the Metropolitan District:

- 3 Mount Vincent Place, O'Connell Avenue
- 3 properties at Woolworth's Lane
- 11 & 12 Clontarf Place (including 1-4 Wellesley Lane)
- 35 Lord Edward Street.

7. **Question submitted by Councillor C. Sheehan**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick for the list of all the Approved Housing Bodies currently engaged with Limerick City and County Council and for the number and location of the properties leased by Limerick City and County Council from these Approved Housing Bodies.

REPLY: Limerick City and County Council has been partnering with Approved Housing Bodies (AHBs) for over 30 years. AHBs provide social housing to households on the Council's waiting list under the following categories:

- General Needs
- Special Needs Housing – Older Persons, People with Disabilities, Homeless Households

AHBs are also entering into the provision of cost rental housing, which is now legally enshrined under the Affordable Housing Act 2021.

Based on the best available information held by the Council, the following table sets out all active AHBs currently engaged with Limerick City and County Council and the number and location of properties owned/managed and leased by AHBs.

8. **Question submitted by Councillor C. Sheehan**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick to detail annual spending on housing provision through long term leasing over the past five years and projected spending on same in the coming five years and to name the companies/developers with whom Limerick City and County Council currently has such contracts.

REPLY: With Limerick City and County Council, leases with commercial entities commenced in 2019, in line with Government policy to enable this social-rental supply stream. The table below sets the unit type, number of units and average monthly rent for commercial entities availing of long-term leasing with Limerick City and County Council. The rent paid to Lessors under the scheme is 80% of market rent for houses in a non-managed development and 85% market rent where management fees apply for units in a managed development. Rent reviews under standard long-term leasing occur on the third anniversary of the commencement date and every third year thereafter. These reviews are based on changes in the Harmonised Index of Consumer Prices (HICP). Data on average spend on monthly rent therefore has been collated for 2019, 2020 and 2021.

Last month, the Government launched Housing for All - a New Housing Plan for Ireland. On page 21 of that document, it states the Government's intention to "end long-term leasing of social housing by Local Authorities and AHBs through phasing out new entrants and focussing on new-build to provide social homes." Therefore, projected long term lease arrangements and associated spend over the next 5 years are anticipated to be low.

Long-term lease arrangements, including the enhanced lease, of privately owned dwellings can be entered into by either local authorities or AHBs. Under these arrangements, the local authority or AHB acts as the landlord to the tenant. The terms of these agreements are set out in standard template agreements provided by my Department, which must be used, by all local authorities and AHBs. Agreements may be entered into for periods of between 10 to 25 years in duration; availability agreements under the CALF scheme can be up to 30 years in duration.

Since the leasing arrangements commenced with Limerick City and County Council in 2019, the following commercial entities have signed Long Term Lease Agreements with the Limerick City and County Council:

9. **Question submitted by Councillor C. Slattery**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, can Limerick City and County Council take in charge the laneways at the back of Lynwood Park houses as there are a lot of elderly people living in the area that just cannot keep them maintained.

REPLY: In order to declare such a road as a public road the provisions of Section 11 of the Roads Act, 1993 must be considered. However, there are a number of issues that need to be carefully considered before such a process is initiated including but not limited to:-

- (i) The road being of general public utility
- (ii) The financial implications to the Roads Authority (including current & future liabilities)
- (iii) Public consultation / advertising of intent.
- (iv) Consideration of objections.

The lanes referenced are currently only accessible via locked gates and therefore are not currently a public right of way.

Furthermore, as the lanes serve primarily as an access to premises they would not be considered to be of general public utility.

As proposed there is not merit in further consideration for such a declaration in respect of these lanes.

10. **Question submitted by Councillor C. Slattery**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, can I have an update on the status of the internet connection for the new development at Woodlawn Park, they have not had internet connection since been allocated these houses.

REPLY: New estate infrastructure developed by Limerick City and County Council includes all the technical ducting required by Media Companies to deliver the various telephony and media connections to Council Tenants.

Where Media Companies often struggle to provide connections is associated with making the external link to the new estate. This is not an area the Council can deliver directly. However, we are engaged directly with Media Companies to bridge the gaps in the various estates and a Woodlawn solution is planned by a Media company in the coming weeks.

11. **Question submitted by Councillor C. Slattery**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, can you advise if there is a scheme available or any plans to introduce a recycling scheme to dispose of plastic bottles for sports clubs in Limerick City and County.

REPLY: Limerick City and County Council proactively promote across a wide range of measures that all citizens embrace reuse with the objective of reducing the use of single use plastic bottles in Limerick. In the event that there are used single use plastic bottles for recycling, sports clubs are reminded to use their dry recyclable collection, (which under waste legislation is part of their own segregated waste service collection), to recycle plastic bottles. The Council will review the outcome and the learnings from "The Green Club Programme" which will be shared with GAA and other clubs across the county. "The Green Club Programme" is a partnership between the GAA, LGFA and Camogie Association and local authorities across Ireland and is structured around five key areas; Waste, Water,

Biodiversity, Energy and Travel and Transportation. St. Patrick's GAA is one of several GAA Clubs that have been chosen nationally to participate in the pilot phase of the programme.

12. **Question submitted by Councillor E. O'Donovan**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick for an update on the feasibility study for footpaths along the Rosbrien Road.

REPLY: Limerick City and County Council is to submit an application for funding for development of these works.

13. **Question submitted by Councillor E. O'Donovan**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick for an update on the plans for the Old Garda Barracks in Lord Edward Street.

REPLY: Limerick City and County Council has acquired the remainder of the OPW leasehold interest in the Old Garda Barracks in Lord Edward Street. We are in the process of securing the freehold interest in the property. This is complex and until the freehold title is secured, a decision cannot be made as to the future treatment of the premises.

14. **Question submitted by Councillor J. Costelloe**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick who is responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the Canal Bank, given its deteriorating state at present, and will the Council encourage all stakeholders (i.e. Waterways Ireland, ESB, UL and the Council) meet and take responsibility for this very important amenity.

REPLY: The Council has met with Waterways Ireland in relation to the maintenance of the Canal and discussed a number of maintenance measures for the Canal, in particular the Lock Quay area. Waterways Ireland will undertake a programme of work that will see the railings painted at Lock Quay, the brick paving replaced and all rubbish in the canal removed. Waterways Ireland have advised that this programme of work will take place in the next number of weeks. It is expected that the works will be completed by mid-November.

Waterways Ireland will also arrange for the vegetation in the Canal at Lock Quay to be removed. They will prepare a Screening Report and will seek the appropriate environmental permissions to have the vegetation removed. The presence of the algal bloom was also discussed with Waterways Ireland. It is expected that the algae will dissipate as the temperature drops over the next number of weeks.

The Council are in the process of seeking additional equipment to assist with the maintenance of the verges along the canal. This will provide the necessary assistance required to maintain the length of vegetation along the canal.

15. **Question submitted by Councillor J. Costelloe**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick how many HAP inspections are expected to be carried out in the Metropolitan area once the Covid rules permit so.

REPLY: Covid Restrictions have significantly impacted the ability of the Private Rented Inspections Team to carry out regular duties in person. Housing Support services have engaged in virtual inspections with Tenants and Landlords during restrictions but this has proven difficult at times as we respect the rights of Tenants to protect their families.

We estimate in the region of a further 300 inspections to be completed by the 3 members of the team by the end of 2021. This takes into account the time consuming Inspection, Reports, Photographs and follow-up with Landlord.

16. **Question submitted by Councillor E. Secas**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick if the Council have received a response from the TII on the final cost benefit assessment report concerning the M7 Noise and if there is an update on this matter.

REPLY: Limerick City and County Council has received numerous complaints re road noise in Annacotty/Monaleen/Castletroy and Ballycummin over a number of years. Complainants allege that the road noise is causing annoyance, sleep disruption, adverse effects to health and restricted usage of gardens.

The Council is required under Environmental Noise Regulations to prepare a Noise Action Plan, which is incorporated as part of the City and County Development Plan. The purpose of the plan is to reduce noise levels where they are high, protect noise quality where it is good and to avoid local populations being exposed to high noise levels.

In response to the complaints the Council has investigated these two locations, under the Noise Action Plan and entered into dialogue with TII in relation to these matters. In addition the Council undertook cost benefit analyses on the benefits to health of implementing measures versus the actual cost of their implementation. Reports were completed and submitted to TII for its consideration.

The reports set out a number of potential mitigation options and it is a matter for TII to consider their implementation. The Council and TII are in continued dialogue in relation to these matters and pending a reply from TII, the Members will be updated.

It is the responsibility of local authorities, under their Noise Action Plans, to make recommendations on noise intervention measures to TII for the national road network. Members should note that the Council is the first local authority to undertake a project of this nature in collaboration with TII.

17. **Question submitted by Councillor E. Secas**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, if the green areas in the housing estates near UL can be included into the Council's Blue Green infrastructure for the City.

REPLY: The purpose of the Blue-Green Infrastructure Strategy is to identify existing and future parks and green spaces; assess existing parks for their value and accessibility; identify gaps

in the provision of quality open space; and recommend opportunities for the upgrade of existing and the future expansion of BGI in the city and environs.

The BGI Strategy will not be considering specific green space in estates, but the strategy will likely be making overall recommendations for the protection and enhancement of green spaces, in addition to recommendations for our existing parks and opportunity sites.

18. **Question submitted by Councillor F. Kilcoyne**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, to purchase a Gully Sucker with jets to clean gullies before the problem of flooding arises for Limerick city and county.

REPLY: Limerick City and County Council has a contract in place to address such matters including the Patrickswell area are included in this contract.

19. **Question submitted by Councillor F. Kilcoyne**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, from Cement Roundabout on N69 along the Dock Road to Limerick City Hotel Roundabout, there are briers \ weeds \ moss, etc. that badly need to be cleaned. This is a major approach road to Limerick city, which is in a deplorable condition.

REPLY: It is our intention to address roadside verges and hedges on this section of road in the coming weeks along with a number of other City Centre approach roads needing such attention.

20. **Question submitted by Councillor F. Kilcoyne**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick to provide funding for tree surgeons in the Limerick City West area to the tune of 50,000 euro. I hope this would be approved in the upcoming budget.

REPLY: The Council provides an annual budget in the order of €90,000 for tree surgery works. Any increase in the existing budget can be addressed as part of the budgetary process.

21. **Question submitted by Councillor O. O'Sullivan**

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick for an update on the rollout of Smart Bins to replace our existing street bins.

REPLY: Further to recent grant funding provided we are currently at tender stage for procurement of new 'Smart Bins' for the Metropolitan District. It is expected that installation of the new bins will commence in December following a successful award of tender.

NOTICES OF MOTION

22. **Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor C. Sheehan**

I will move at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick that this Council writes to the CEO of AIB to ask them to retain the ATM at the site of the Ennis Road branch after the bank closes in November.

The motion was proposed by Councillor Sheehan (C), seconded by Councillor O'Sullivan and agreed.

In proposing the motion, Councillor Sheehan (C) expressed disappointment at the decision to close the AIB branch on the Ennis Road and remove the ATM, in particular as there was a large elderly population in the area.

It was proposed by Councillor Slattery and seconded by Councillor Secas to amend the Notice of Motion. It was agreed to also write to the CEO of Bank of Ireland to request they retain the ATM at the Bank's Branch in Roxboro Shopping Centre, which closed recently.

23. Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor C. Sheehan

I will move at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick that this Council writes to the Minister for Transport to ask him to introduce an automatic fine along with three penalty points for anyone caught parking in a cycle lane, in a bus lane, on a corner, in a bus stop, in a clearway or obstructing a footpath.

The motion was proposed by Councillor Sheehan (C), seconded by Councillor Novak Uí Chonchúir and agreed.

In proposing the motion, Councillor Sheehan (C) highlighted the difficulties for cyclists and people with mobility issues when footpaths and cycle lanes were obstructed.

Members highlighted the issue of private cars blocking taxi ranks and it was agreed to amend the Notice of Motion to include taxi ranks. It was also agreed to write to the Chair of the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Transport and Communications Networks.

24. Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor J. Leddin (to be referred to the Home and Social Development Strategic Policy Committee)

I will move at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick that Limerick City and County Council consider hiring a dedicated vacant homes officer to deal with the scourge of empty houses.

It was agreed to refer this Notice of Motion to the Home and Social Development Strategic Policy Committee.

25. Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor E. O'Donovan

I will move at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick that Limerick Council will install a bicycle repair and pump station at the train station on Parnell Street. This can be done on a pilot basis to be rolled out in other areas around the City if successful.

The motion was proposed by Councillor O'Donovan, seconded by Councillor Benson and agreed.

REPLY: Limerick City and County Council Transportation and Mobility Department through Active Travel will review various location within the Metropolitan Area including Parnell Street for the installation of bicycle repair and pump station.

It was agreed to take Item Nos. 26, 27 and 29 together. In proposing the Motions Cllrs Hartigan and Secas referred to ongoing issues experienced by residents in estates adjoining the University of Limerick, in relation to students residing in these estates. Some of the issues being experienced included congregation and noise issues in student houses in estates; high levels of car usage and associated parking problems; littering and incidents of anti-social behaviour; concerns associated with the current Covid health pandemic and clean up and street cleaning costs being incurred by the local authority.

The Members agreed that the University needed to be part of the solution in addressing these issues and also address the requirement for additional onsite campus accommodation for students.

26. **Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor S. Hartigan**

I will move at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, that Limerick City and County Council writes to the President of UL, to call on them or a representative to report to the next Travel and Transportation SPC meeting, on UL's plans to reduce car use within UL student and staff population and in the interim, to confirm what actions UL are taking to provide parking for existing staff and student cars to prevent overflow to the surrounding neighbourhood (private residences and businesses).

27. **Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor S. Hartigan**

I will move at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, that Limerick City and County Council writes to the President of UL, to call on them or a representative to report to the next meeting of the Economic Development, Enterprise and Planning SPC on the plans to expand student numbers in the coming years and on how the University plans to accommodate the additional numbers given the current student accommodation crisis.

The motions were proposed by Councillor Hartigan, seconded by Councillor Secas and agreed.

29. **Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor E. Secas**

I will move at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick that Limerick City and County Council writes to the President of UL to call on them or a representative to report to the next Home and Social Development SPC meeting on the University's plans to alleviate the current student accommodation crisis given the plans to further increase numbers year on year.

The motion was proposed by Councillor Secas, seconded by Councillor Hartigan and agreed.

28. **Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor E. Secas (to be referred to the Community, Leisure and Culture Strategic Policy Committee)**

I will move at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick that Limerick City and County Council call on the Community, Leisure and Culture SPC to timetable at its next meeting for a strategic discussion the following issue:

- the sense of community and place of the residential community in estates near UL is being fundamentally damaged by the Council's failure to protect these '10 minute walk neighbourhoods' from the devastating effects of the ever expanding UL student intake. This along with the high dependence of UL management on privately managed, houses of multiple occupancy (HMOs) to accommodate the majority of their students, with many HMOs being inappropriately managed. These issues, coupled with the student accommodation crisis and the antisocial behaviour of some UL students, are damaging the residential community resulting thus in a trend of many residents being forced out of their homes over the years.

It was agreed to refer this Notice of Motion to the Community, Leisure and Culture Strategic Policy Committee.

30. Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor S. Kiely (to be referred to the Climate Action, Biodiversity and Environment Strategic Policy Committee)

I will move at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick that the possibility of litter bin sponsorship be examined as a way to provide revenue for the provision of more bins in the city and its environs and to support local businesses to be more visible on their respective streets / areas.

It was agreed to refer this Notice of Motion to the Climate Action, Biodiversity and Environment Strategic Policy Committee.
