

MEETING OF THE METROPOLITIAN DISTRICT OF LIMERICK TO BE HELD ON Monday the 20th June 2022.

Question Councillor J. Leddin

I will ask Limerick Metropolitan Council how many Council owned houses within Limerick City West Electoral Area are boarded up, the approximate length of time per house and how many are scheduled for redevelopment in the next twelve months.

REPLY

As at Tuesday 14th June 2022 there are 42 (28 and 14) dwellings vacant in the Metro West Area.

Of these, 28 are being returned by the Housing Maintenance section and all are scheduled for completion by the end of the 2022 – each has a funding source and the return process is underway.

Of the 28 units 23 have voids funding, 7 are to be inspected, 4 are inspected, 6 are in procurement/design with 6 on site. The balance of 5 units are being internally funded with 2 to be inspected, 2 in procurement/design and 1 on site.

Data on the number of shuttered dwellings is not to hand at present.

The average time for return of these dwellings varies with the extent of work to be undertaken, in general 12 to 15 weeks is taken to complete a dwelling from commencement of the works.

There are 14 units being returned by Housing Construction. These refer to dwellings that require more extensive works and are being returned through tendered Lots, of these:

- 4 are in Lot 2 and will be completed in 2022.
- 3 are in Lot 3 and will be under construction in 2022 with a completion date for February 2023.
- 3 are in Lot 4 and will be under construction in 2022 with a completion date for March 2023.
- 1 unit is in Lot 6 and has recently been added to the work programme.
- 3 are being progressed a separate package (they are adjoining) they are in the design stage at present.

These dwellings form part of larger Lots and in general a Lot takes six months to complete once construction commences.

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick that Limerick Council will consider closure of Back Lane at Mother Macs with a start time of 11am and not 6pm as this was very successful for this area last Summer.

Reply:

The lane closure for Back Lane located to rear of the Mother Macs public house on High street was reviewed and inspected by the Limerick City and County Council Roads Department when this lane closure expired in April 2022. Upon inspection it appeared that the use of this lane, that was closed daily between the hours of 11am and midnight, was not been fully utilised for outdoor dining experience from 11am. Bearing this factor in mind along with the increased activity of pedestrians, cyclists and motorists that has returned in the city centre following the Covid 19 pandemic, this lane closure was extended with the closure time reduced to the hours of 6pm to midnight to encompass the traffic requirements of the vicinity and to accommodate the needs of the other surrounding businesses in the area.

This lane closure will be further reviewed at the end of its current expiry period in November 2022

We will continue to explore all avenues to identify a suitable site for a burial ground in the Castletroy area.

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick for an update on the capacity audit for Loughmore Canal.

Response:

RPS consultants have been carrying out surveys as part of development of a flood relief scheme for Limerick City & Environs of which the Barnakyle River is a part of the study area. Once data is collated and analysed, RPS will provide a recommendation as to whether the Loughmore Canal and surrounding area will be included as part of the scheme for further consideration. This may include a hydraulic assessment and other studies as required of the capacity of the Loughmore Canal and other areas potentially at risk of flooding within the scheme area.

JBA Consultants are currently developing a Stormwater Management Plan for Limerick which will include an analysis of the capacity of the Loughmore Canal. This remains a work in progress.

I will ask at the next Meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, what plans do the Council have for St. Anne's Court and if they could provide an update on any developments.

REPLY

The Council is investigating the possibility for developing the site for affordable and social homes. The Limerick City and County Council team have designed a feasibility study for social and affordable homes on the site, making allowance for the initial exciting archaeological finds. There is a focus on the integration of the City wall in the design of the public space, and also a vision of bringing the City moat, the "Fosse" into the scheme as a sustainable blue/green park element.

The most recent test trenching took place when the 20th century houses in St Ann's Court were demolished and the site was secured. The city wall extends across the site just below ground level. It is up to 2m wide and there is a height of at least 2m surviving below ground level. No testing was carried out in the street at that time but this will be necessary in the preparation of any part 8 planning for the site to determine the exact extent of the walls and possible location of the Little Island Gate and to fully integrate them into any scheme design.

The National Development Finance agency have assisted in preparing a viability report which is being reviewed in conjunction with the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage's Affordable housing team to ascertain if the scheme would benefit from transferring to the higher level of subsidy under the Affordable Housing Fund stream, and which model of finance/ and development strategy is most suitable. Once outline viability has been confirmed, the sketch scheme will be presented to councillors for input and review, and subsequently developed to a part 8 planning application.
