Access.

Set up business in Limerick and you're mid-way between the Americas and 26 fellow European Union states, giving unlimited options for trade, employment and expansion.



By air

you're just 20 minutes from Shannon International Airport with daily direct flights to the USA – just five hours away – the UK and mainland Europe. You can also reach Dublin Airport within two hours by road.



By sea

you're near Ireland's largest bulk port, Shannon Foynes Port. A designated European Ten-T core port, this can cater for vessels up to 200,000 dwt.



By rail & bus

Colbert Station in the heart of the city connects Limerick to Dublin, Cork, Galway, Waterford and beyond. The Irish Government have committed to €1.25 billion investment in Limerick's public transport infrastructure.



By road

motorway connectivity gives access to around 550,000 people within 60 minutes' drive, more than a million within 90 minutes and more than three million within two-and-a-half hours.

Limerick is already one of Ireland's most accessible urban centres with motorways to Dublin and Galway. Plans for a €1 billion motorway between Limerick and Cork and a €500 million Limerick to Foynes motorway are under way – improving transit times still further.



Broadband connectivity

is high quality, high speed. As part of a National Broadband Plan, €86 million investment in a new fibre network promises to increase productivity and reliability, vital not just for international business but for today's blended working.



Innovation





Skills.

Gain from an exceptional talent pool, fed by a steady pipeline of fresh, new skills. You won't be surprised that UNESCO recognises Limerick as a City of Learning.

Excellence starts early. We have among the country's top-rated secondary and national schools. But it's in our universities where the difference is clear. We also have cutting edge vocational training, skills acquisition and apprenticeship courses.

Vibrant third-level

The city has three major higher education institutions where US-style campuses and grading systems are common.

There's a 24,000-student population, including international students from more than 100 countries. Together, these institutions produce more than 6,000 accomplished graduates a year.

Degree-level courses concentrate on employability and the needs of business with many qualifications awarded across IT, Life Sciences, Business, Creative and Media, Engineering, Technology and the Arts.

Highly successful

University of Limerick offers Ireland's only immersive software engineering degree for developers – a fast-growing requirement. UL's graduate employment rate is 15% above the national average.

More than 96% of Technological University of the Shannon's graduates (including the Limerick School of Art & Design) are in employment or further study, with 50% working in the Mid-West.

Around 40% of professional teachers in Ireland have studied at Limerick's Mary Immaculate College. In addition, it has one of Ireland's highest student retention rates.

The skills you need

Limerick's third-level institutions consistently share research and knowledge. They also collaborate closely with other state providers, business and industry to ensure graduate skills continue to match employers' changing needs.

This has prompted two pioneering partnerships to promote retraining and ongoing education – Limerick for IT and Explore Engineering.

Future-proof

Limerick is Ireland's student city. An educated, English-speaking population, in which around 50% are aged under 35. That's sustainability for you.

Digital & technology

ICT-led companies have always valued our affinity for cutting-edge innovation.

Today, the region is a technology and R&D major hub with a rich, thriving ecosystem boosted by a ready talent supply – more than a third of Limerick's third-level students study STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) subjects.

We've big, global companies – and those that are not so big – doing amazing things. **Dell Technologies'** Limerick operation is a strategic centre for the company's global and regional functions. At its Innovation Lab, customers can experience how Artificial Intelligence, 5G and the Internet of Things can bring business value in developing digital cities, connected healthcare Industry 4.0 and connected transport.

Operational since 2000 and employing around 300 people, **Intel Shannon's** R&D campus is a centre of excellence for network transformation and cloud computing in today's highly connected world.

Carelon Global Solutions Ireland uses industry-leading Al and cognitive technologies to solve complex medical problems – with a digital platform that delivers predictive, proactive and personalised healthcare.

Limerick is at the core of **General Motors'** future vision. Here, the company is developing next-generation electric vehicle and autonomous driving technologies at its software engineering centre.

Analog Devices helps solve the toughest engineering challenges from its European headquarters and R&D centre. Its products and applications are found in many sectors, from aerospace & defence to healthcare and intelligent buildings. ADI recently announced a €100 million investment in a collaboration accelerator, ADI Catalyst.





These companies have sparked a vibrant local life sciences sector that ranges from third-level spin-outs to early-stage SMEs – a trend that's growing throughout Ireland. There have also a been several notable acquisitions.

Our universities increasingly focus on developing life sciences departments and research institutes. A significant example, the Bernal Institute, University of Limerick, counts spin-outs Cala Medical and Hooke Bio among its successes.

Opportunities in direct healthcare are strong across the region. There's significant investment in public and private healthcare, with plans for two new private hospitals through Ireland's largest independent hospital group, Bon Secours Health System, and US-based healthcare provider, UPMC.

Life sciences & healthcare

Big companies come to Limerick as part of their quest to solve some of the world's most important health challenges.

You'll recognise names including:

- Johnson & Johnson vision care and contact lenses
- Cook Medical minimally-invasive medical devices
- BD medical, life sciences and intervention solutions
- Edwards Lifesciences structural heart disease and critical care monitoring
- Eli Lilly pharmaceuticals. Plans a new €400 million manufacturing plant
- Regeneron biotechnology. Inventing life-transforming medicines
- Stryker creating innovative products and services to help improve patient outcomes

Business sector

Financial & professional

Ireland's main banking institutions are established in Limerick, underpinning successful growth across the region.

Some of the world's best-known financial and professional services firms are also here, including BDO, Deloitte, EY, Grant Thornton International and Mazars. With support from IDA (Industrial Development Agency) Ireland, they have attracted diverse multinational clients such as FundRock, part of the Apex Group, and wealth-management services giant Northern Trust.

Together, the University of Limerick's Kemmy Business School, one of the largest in Ireland, and TUS (Technological University of the Shannon: Midlands Midwest), provide a valuable pipeline of skilled, qualified graduates.



Advanced manufacturing

Manufacturing accounts for a hefty proportion of Ireland's GDP; The sector employs around 260,000 people, with 29% of manufacturing jobs in high technology sectors (IBEC – Manufacturing In Ireland Report 2022).


With our high-tech manufacturing ecosystem, Limerick already keeps Ireland at the forefront of digital transformation. We're driving the future too. As part of the nation's sustainable growth strategy, Limerick is home to the IDA's National Advanced Manufacturing Centre (AMC).

The centre will be based among a cluster of global brands at Limerick's National Technology Park. It will help accelerate adoption of digital technologies by local and global manufacturers in sectors such as biopharmaceuticals, medical technology, electronics, engineering and industrial technology.

Manufacturers will be able to access a best-in-class digital factory incorporating the latest manufacturing technologies in an integrated, fully-representative production environment.

Swiss automation giant ABB is the Centre's key technology partner. It will provide digital manufacturing technology, including 'digital twin' capability – a method to simulate how a physical object, process or service will perform.

But there's more. The University of Limerick is developing a world-leading research centre, CONFIRM. Backed by SFI (Science Foundation Ireland), it's a 'community of practice' where industry, researchers and the public can learn about smart manufacturing and Industry 4.0 through advances in data analytics, product & process control, enterprise modelling & simulation, software systems, network systems & IoT, sensors, robotics & controls and materials processing.



Creative & media

If Limerick weren't already sufficiently creative, the region has further reinvented itself into a recognised film and TV production hub.

Investors can take advantage of this exciting development, which grew out of Limerick City of Culture 2014. Better still, you can make projects more profitable through a 'Regional Film Development Uplift' which offers a premium tax credit up to 35 per cent.

You have plenty of production resources to rely on. Troy Studios, based in Limerick's National Technology Park, is now Ireland's largest film studio. It has spawned a burgeoning film industry ecosystem that employs well over 1,000 people at peak activity.

And there's real quality of talent, not just in film and TV but across creative and media: Limerick's third-level sector fuels the industry with outstanding flair, not least from TUS's Limerick School of Art and Design, a top 50 college of its kind in the world.

FUEL FOR GROWTH. GREEN SPACE TO BREATHE.

Sustainable future

It takes true collaboration to make change. When it comes to sustainability and green energy, Limerick sets the pace.

A full range of bodies, from Limerick City and County Council, our research-led universities and the Regional Enterprise Plan, to Shannon Foynes Port Company, Limerick Chamber, large employers and other key stakeholders work together to realise opportunities for the region and – equally important – for investors.

Two key projects stand out.

The Shannon Estuary. Limerick has been generating green energy for nearly a century through hydroelectricity, making us a national and international leader in sustainability.

Building on substantial investment in land based wind turbines and solar technology, today we're on the point of making the Shannon Estuary a supply chain and logistics hub for floating offshore wind power by exploiting some of the world's most consistent wind resources off our west coast.


It's an opportunity that, overall, could be worth €12 billion by 2050 – a key milestone for net-zero carbon – and create up to 30,000 jobs.

Shannon Foynes Port Company has already taken the first step to make the most of the estuary's deep sheltered waters, vital for construction of floating platforms. They have invested €28 million in jetty infrastructure and a port logistics hub, due for completion in 2024.

Smart positive city energy. Limerick has been selected as one of only two Lighthouse Smart Cities and secured European funding to show EU cities how to use less energy than they make.

Backed by the biggest EU Research and Innovation Funding programme, Horizon 2020, Limerick develop a new 'community grid', the use of smart meters, innovation in new energy sources(including hydrokinetic) and storage, digital tools and citizen participation.

Among other activities, Limerick will demonstrate how it can transform a city-centre district (the Georgian Innovation neighbourhood) into a positive energy zone.

History, culture and music: immerse yourself

With a history that goes back to the Vikings (and a charter older even than London), Limerick promises so much. Take time to visit treasures such as King John's Castle, St. Mary's Cathedral, Lough Gur, Foynes Flying Boat and Maritime Museum.

Culture is everywhere, from street artists and live music to a calendar bursting with events – including up to 100 festivals a year.

Ireland's first National City of Culture, we host the country's only biennial of contemporary art, EVA International.

There are impressive venues such as The University Concert Hall, The Lime Tree Theatre, The Belltable Theatre, The Big Top and Dolans Warehouse.



And you've many cultural institutes to experience: Limerick City Gallery of Art, RTE Lyric FM, the World Academy of Music and Dance, Hunt Museum, Limerick Museum and the People's Museum of Limerick.

Still hungry?

Limerick's diverse, cosmopolitan atmosphere (more than 150 nationalities live here and over 10% of the population comes from across the EU) means you'll feel at home here.

That extends to our lively food scene.

We've some of the country's top award-winning restaurants, plus a fusion of memorable international cuisine, while Limerick's Milk Market features artisan local producers every weekend.

Fill your lungs

Limerick's position near the Atlantic coast gives superb opportunities for invigorating outdoor adventure. We're a Gateway City to the Wild Atlantic Way, with some of Europe's most spectacular scenery. World-renowned and breath taking sites such as the Cliffs of Moher, the Burren, Killarney National Park, the Ring of Kerry and the Dingle Peninsula are within 90 minutes of the city. We're also home to the incredible Shannon Estuary Way. Or visit The Irish Aerial Creation Centre, the only purpose-fit space for aerial circus in Ireland. A centre for the creation and education of Aerial Arts in Ireland and a place for people to unlock their creativity.

Even bigger and better

Limerick's overall population is expected to increase to 300,000 by 2040, making us an even more significant commercial location.

To match this growth and in parallel with environmentally-sustainable initiatives, €40 billion is due to be invested in the city region's infrastructure and property. Public transport infrastructure will benefit from €250 million investment earlier than that, by 2030.
