Summary of Conference Content

This weekend conference explained the whole concept of modular housing. In the rapidly changing housing market and with the rise of new technologies like 3D printing, future homeowners are rethinking what defines a home, while builders are rapidly changing their approach to the ways homes are built.

Another one of these technologies is the modular home. Modular houses are units assembled off-site in a factory, using the same standards and regulations as traditional homes. They are built in "modules", which are then assembled and installed on the final site. The main advantage of modular housing is speed: homes can be assembled on site in as little as four hours. They come in an array of forms, from adapted pre-fab units to regular-looking bungalows. As the name suggests, they are actual houses, for all intents and purposes – meaning they provide a much greater sense of normality for families than a hotel room or hostel. Modular homes are a type of prefab. Prefab is short for "prefabrication": a catch-all term for a unit which is built in a factory, partially or entirely, before being assembled on site. What is the point of a modular home? Sometimes, dream homes can become a reality much faster than you think. Modular houses allow you to construct a home on a plot of land, often faster, cheaper and of equal or better quality than traditional stick-built homes.

It's now more than ever modular housing is appropriate in a time of housing crisis.
